Be host to A.A. friends, especially newcomers. If you don't have a place where you can throw a formal party, take one person to a diner and spring for the coffee.



Keep your A.A. telephone list with you all the time. If a drinking urge or panic comes—postpone everything else until you've called an A.A.



Find out about the special holiday parties, meetings, or other celebrations given by groups in your area, and go. If you're timid, take someone newer than you are.



Skip any drinking occasion you are nervous about. Remember how clever you were at excuses when drinking? Now put the talent to good use. No office party is as important as saving your life.



If you have to go to a drinking party and can't take an A.A. with you, keep some candy handy.



Don't think you have to stay late. Plan in advance an "important date" you have to keep.



Worship in your own way.



Don't sit around brooding. Catch up on those books, museums, walks, and letters.



Don't start now getting worked up about all those holiday temptations. Remember— "one day at a time."



Enjoy the true beauty of holiday love and joy. Maybe you cannot give material gifts—but this year, you can give love.





Making Peace with the Holidays

This Christmas Eve, a lonely newcomer learned that choosing joy was the way to go

Blessed with the gift of desperation, I continued to take the simple actions I had learned in AA. I kept trudging through my daily recovery routine as if my life depended on it. It did. I maintained daily meeting attendance. Over a few months in AA, I took on a couple of small commitments that kept me in the fold. These commitments were at meetings that were all within walking distance of my home as I had no car. I learned early in recovery that keeping commitments is a crucial part of staying sober. I later discovered that keeping commitments was an essential part of developing good character.

One of the responsibilities I had volunteered for was to serve as an alternate secretary for a new AA meeting. My turn to chair the meeting happened to land on Christmas Eve. When that night came, the sky drizzled rain off and on. With my Big Book in hand, I pulled a kitchen trash bag over my old woolen sweater and walked to the meeting place about two miles away. I tramped through the wet streets past homes decorated with lights, ornaments and all the reminders of family and the joy of the season.

The walk gave me time to think about my ghosts of Christmas past. My father had died on Christmas Eve, not too many years before. My drinking and drug abuse ruined many other holidays before and after his death. The holidays were excuse for days of drinking without guilt or restraint. The days ended up dreadful and lonely as I reinforced my December misery each year.

I arrived at our meeting place early. The room was dark, empty and cold. I opened the doors and turned on the lights and organized chairs for a small group. It was a new meeting and had not yet developed a group of regulars. I made a small pot of coffee and sat alone in the room, waiting for the heater to kick in.

I watched the clock as the meeting time came and went. With no place to be, I sat and looked at the meeting format and the slogans on the walls. I just continued to sit.

After a while, a man came into the room. He appeared to be 60-something, with graying hair and a gray mustache. He was neatly dressed in a reindeer sweater and slacks. He was an alcoholic. He had just come from a Christmas party, he told me.

Together, we began the meeting with the usual rituals. We read the opening pages. We agreed on gratitude as the topic, and we shared our experience, strength and hope with each other. It was nice. We ended the meeting with the Serenity Prayer and a hug. We wished each other a merry Christmas. After we were done, he gave me a ride back to the recovery home.

When I went inside, I saw most of the residents sitting sullenly, eating pie donated by sober former residents. I ate a slice of pie, said my prayers and crawled into bed. The next morning, I woke up sober. I did not die from loneliness and the world did not come to an end.

That holiday experience changed me. I learned early in recovery that I needed to change everything if I was to remain sober—and everything included my attitude. So I worked on changing my attitude about the holidays. Like them or not, the holidays came every year. I'm not going to make them go away. Did I want to experience misery, sorrow, grief and loneliness every December? Give me the serenity to change the things I can, I thought.

In the years that followed, I chose to put my "magnifying glass" on the joy so many others experience during the holiday season. I could be part of it if I chose, or I could choose not to. I have made that choice every year since 1984.

The memory of my first sober Christmas Eve stays with me today, and I still visit that recovery home nearly every holiday season. Thirty-six sober Christmas Eves later, I share this memory for someone I will likely never meet.

This year I'm spending Christmas Eve with my brother and his daughter and her daughter and my sober wife. They have never seen me drunk. Days before coming into AA, I stole money from my brother that he needed to provide for his infant daughter. That was my bottom.

Tonight, they are feeding me, and we are all celebrating and loving each other the way I imagined families did the night I kept my commitment to be at that meeting. It's my choice: merry Christmas or not. It's up to me.



ARCHIVES CORNER

"There is an island of opportunity in the middle of every difficulty"

In these odd times, the Archives Committee hopes you are all safe and well.

History is being written as it is happening. We are all involved. History is what happened. Memory is how it affects us. How it made us feel. This pandemic has changed our sobriety. The way we share fellowship and where and how we attend meetings; how we serve the suffering alcoholic. Humans need humans. As a committee we would be negligent not to record this time.

San Antonio's history book was written more than 10 years ago. Is your group in the book? Very few groups submitted information. Where does your group begin? How important is your group's history? Our best reference is the Nightcap. There is a huge gap between 1955 and 1972 when it was not published.

Does your group fill this gap? With so many groups starting and folding, when and why did your group begin? What made you stay and call it home? How much does it matter? It has been said that we live in the shadow of giants. Who are or your giants? Which old-timers have you held dear?

What will we remember? Our stories are lost if not audio recorded or written down. Some day when we are all gone, who will tell our story? As Archivist, I am gratefully tasked to preserve your most precious memory, your story. Your stories shared help complete the collective history of Alcoholics Anonymous in San Antonio.

When we remember where we came from, what it was like, what happened and what it is like now, that will be **our story**.

Yours in grateful service, Tami Slater, Archivist San Antonio Archives **Step 12.** Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics and to practice these principles in all our affairs. Step 12

Living Step 12 is the most rewarding practice I have ever had. I call it living because I get to help others every day if I choose. There is nothing like seeing a person with dead eyes come back to life and start enjoying life again. To watch families, get back together, this does not happen every time, but it does happen, even if the family does not reunite the Alcoholic is still on their way to a happy and fulfilling life.

The main thing I have learned in helping others is I have to make sure I keep my own program on a solid foundation. It is far easier to work on someone else's problems than work on my own but I must keep my spiritual condition in fit condition or I am of no use to anyone and all I am sharing is the disease of alcoholism.

Tradition 12 – Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.

In the *Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions*, we learn that "the spiritual substance of anonymity is sacrifice." While the practice of personal anonymity may have sprung from our early members' fears of public contempt, it has transformed over time into a guiding principle of humble selflessness from which we can truly serve. We maintain anonymity not to protect ourselves, but to protect our program of recovery and ensure its survival for the still suffering that have yet to find our message of hope.

Maintaining anonymity clarifies that it is the message that is important, not the messenger. Anonymity has evolved into the great equalizer in Alcoholics Anonymous. No matter where we, as individual A.A. members come from, what neighborhoods we live in, or which ways we earn a living, all those distinctions are left behind when we enter an A.A. meeting. Differences are dissolved in the rooms of A.A. where we admit we were powerless over alcohol and we discover a common solution. Anonymity enables us to keep the me's out of it.

In the beginning of my sobriety, it was suggested that I listen for the similarities during the meetings. Building on that foundation, I was later taught to practice the principles – acceptance, honesty, humility, service – and to pay no attention whatsoever to the personalities. Sponsors advised that oldtimers were not to be put on pedestals, that our leaders were truly servants, and that love and tolerance was our code. I came to understand that there is nothing personal about the hand of A.A., and that is a good thing. I was welcomed not because of who I am, but because of what I am – a hopeless drunk who cannot stay sober of my own accord. Now, with an ardent desire to stay sober and abiding gratitude for what has been freely passed to me, I get to pay it forward and share A.A.'s message of hope when anyone, anywhere asks for help. The principle of anonymity is a foundation stone, a unifying force that guides us to practice humility and foster spiritual fitness. How blessed we are in Alcoholics Anonymous!






