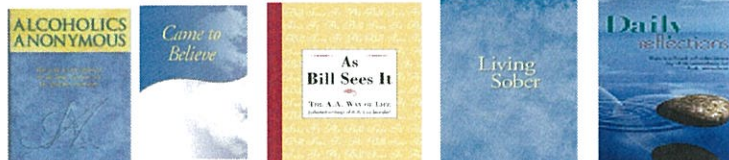

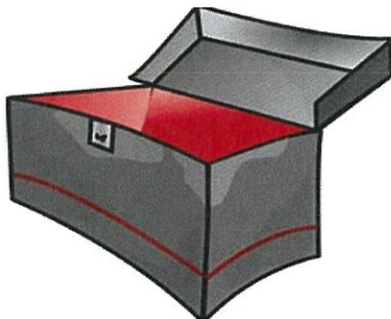

Tradition Four (long form)

And no group, regional committee, or individual should ever take any action that might greatly affect A.A. as a whole without conferring with the trustees of the General Service Board. On such issues our common welfare is paramount.

Who and What

This is a reprint of article in the Nightcap April 1974, written by Zoe C.

AA Comes To San Antonio

Early in April of 1945 Esther E. and a Bishop of the Episcopal Church in Houston contacted Dr. Everett H. Jones (now Bishop Jones) of the St. Mark's Episcopal Church in San Antonio for the purpose of starting a group of Alcoholics Anonymous. At Dr. Jones' invitation they came to San Antonio and met in his office.

Four people joined AA as a result of this meeting. On April 11 they rented the lower floor of an old building, formerly a store, at the corner of Fourth and Taylor Streets. This was the first permanent meeting place for alcoholics in San Antonio.

By the time I joined, on October 8, 1945, the original four had grown to seventeen members, a few of them "off and on". Of those seventeen, only one man, who asks to be anonymous, and I are living and dry, never having a slip.

Our first meeting place had the bare essentials: A table for the speaker to stand or sit behind, facing the audience, and a number of chairs. There was a little gas plate for making coffee in a bucket which we drank from tin cups. There was a toilet off the kitchen for our use.

But I remember what a haven it seemed, as some of us would spend hours together staying sober and hoping for new "recruits". We had a telephone installed and put an ad in the paper giving our phone and Post Office Box numbers.

I was the third woman to join, but by the close of 1945 our group was increasing steadily as more men and women came in. By the end of 1946 it was apparent that we ought to branch out and form new groups.

How gratifying it is to have been able to participate in and watch the growth of our Fellowship for more than twenty-eight years. We must meet discouragements and disappointments, but we must continue to "carry the message" to those who still suffer. There will always be A.A.

**Everett H. Jones, Retired Bishop
Episcopal Diocese of West Texas
April 1974**

Partial reprint of article in Nightcap, June 1974.

After Pearl Harbor and the outbreak of World War II our members scattered and this small beginning came to an end.

In April, 1945, at the urging of several people who knew of our earlier attempts, I held a meeting in my office. (By this time I was Bishop of West Texas and had my headquarters in San Antonio) We had all heard of Esther E, who had been a strong A.A. member in Houston and was now living in Dallas. We got in touch with her and she graciously agreed to come help us, She spent several days and spoke at several meetings. From that date to the present time A.A. has had continuous existence in the San Antonio area. We now have 38 A.A. groups in the San Antonio area with approximately 1500 members.

As the movement grew we learned of the national Council on Alcoholism and invited Mary Mann to come to San Antonio and speak to us. Shortly after her visit we formed a local council and it has continued to have a very active educational influence in the community.

One aspect of A.A. has been especially strong in San Antonio, namely the spiritual emphasis. Clergymen have been most helpful in interpreting the program, and some churches have become active rehabilitation centers. Twice a year a week-end retreat is held for members of A.A. and Al-Anon, sponsored by the Episcopal Church but open to all denominations.

It has been an invaluable experience for me to have this long and close association with Alcoholics Anonymous. While not an A.A. member I feel close to all A.A.'s and I have learned much from them.. In the early days when people knew little about the program a woman in San Antonio was asked what A.A. was all about. She replied, " I don't know, but when I see what it has done for Bishop Jones I know it is a good thing" She was right: It has done much for me.

GENERAL GUIDELINES FOR ALL SPECIAL NEEDS ACCOMMODATIONS

Respect for the dignity of others is the foundation for all our efforts to carry the message to alcoholics with special needs, with emphasis on identification rather than on how we are different. As one deaf A.A. put it, "I'm just an alcoholic, like everyone else here. I have the same need to be a 'worker among workers' and not be singled out for special treatment. If you can just make the program available to me, I'll do what I have to do to work it." The goal is to include all alcoholics in the wonderful experience of belonging to a group and partaking of a full range of benefits of membership. Beyond helping those in your own group or committee, others may be informed about carrying the message to alcoholics with special needs through workshops and presentations at A.A. gatherings, such as area assemblies, conventions, conferences, round-ups and Regional Forums.

CARRYING THE MESSAGE TO A.A.s WITH PHYSICAL DISABILITIES AND/OR CHRONIC ILLNESSES

Our Fellowship includes A.A. members who are brain injured, confined to their beds with a chronic illness, or who use wheelchairs, walkers or crutches. Members of a group may feel stymied when first faced with these out-of-the-ordinary challenges but, in fact, there are many accommodations which can be made so that alcoholics with special needs can be active, participating members of a "regular" group. Some adjustments are simple and some are more complicated—but all are possible. Often A.A.s take a meeting to an A.A. member who is home- or house-bound. "I can't tell you," one hospitalized A.A. reported, "what a difference it made in my mental and emotional state when those six people showed up in my room carrying the message of A.A. and all the love and support of our Fellowship. And they did it twice a week for three months, until I was able to make meetings again! I was so down in the dumps before; I really had sort of given up—and, to be honest, I had started thinking I might as well have a drink, since I was dying anyway. But hearing the experience, strength and hope of others in the program inspired me to fight both my illnesses—the cancer and my alcoholism. I don't know what I would have done without A.A. at that low point in my life." For members with physical challenges who aren't confined to bed, A.A.s in their group often drive them to and from meetings, install wheelchair ramps over steps to the meeting room, and arrange the room so that there is ample space for wheelchairs or walkers. It is important to identify meetings accessible for wheelchair users in local meeting schedules. It is also important to make sure restrooms at the meeting place are wheelchair accessible. Services and material available for members who are chronically ill and/or have limited ambulatory ability include the Loners/ Internationalist Meeting (LIM), a newsletter for A.A. members who are in isolated areas, at sea, or home- or hospital-bound (known as Homers) and stay in touch with other members by mail and newsletters. Central Service Office Representative

The Central Service Office Representatives (CSOR) is at the very core of the structure of the Central Service Office (CSO).

Each AA group within the San Antonio Metro Area may elect a member to serve as the group's Central Service Office Representative. Through the Central Service Office Representative's monthly meeting, the groups are kept informed of office activities. The meetings allow the Central Service Office Representative to voice opinions and or inquiries of his/her group.

The Central Service Office Representative oversees the actions of the Board of Trustees of the CSO, and has the right to override any Board decisions, amendments or changes to the CSO bylaws as proposed by the Board of Trustees. These are made available to the Central Service Office Representatives at the Central Service Office Representative meeting which follows the initial presentation of the amendment or change by no more than sixty (60) days, and must be ratified by a vote of two-thirds of the voting members present at the Central Service Office Rep meeting. The Central Service Office Reps are responsible for the yearly elections of the Board of Trustees in November. Refer to the By-laws on the election process.

The Central Service Office Rep serves as a vital link to maintain two-way communication between the groups and the CSO. The Central Service Office Representative takes the responsibility for keeping the group informed on CSO matters and provides CSO with up-dated information, group contact name, address, and phone number. The Central Service Office Representative keeps the CSO advised of any meeting changes, additions, etc., of their group.

Central Service Office Reps remind their group that the CSO's purpose is to serve the AA groups of the community, and that financial contributions to CSO are voluntary and not a condition to receive this service.
