Young and Responsible...is it Possible???

I rushed in the door of St. David's Episcopal Church, knowing full well I was twenty minutes late to chair the AA meeting on Wednesday July 8, 1992. This wasn't just any meeting, this was our very first gathering of the Foxey Ladies AA group...and I was late for the special occasion...very late! How I was chosen to chair the very first meeting, I do not know. I had 18 months of sobriety and was 18 1/2 years old. (I stress the "1/2" because I needed as many years on me as I could get at that time!) A few of the women from the Foxhall group in San Antonio, Texas, decided we had had it with the men and decided to start a women's AA group where we would be studying the twelve steps and twelve traditions from the 12x12. We had planned and organized our format, found a location for the meeting and named ourselves the Foxey Ladies. I had prepared to chair this meeting on the first step, since that is the first chapter of the twelve and twelve, and was quite nervous about it, yet I was honored that the other members would allow me to be the first chairwoman.

Needless to say, when I ran through the door at 7:20 p.m. that Wednesday evening with my other girlfriend, the meeting had already commenced, and it was being chaired by none other than my sponsor. This was one of those times when I thought I was going to pee my pants when I saw the look on her face, as she looked me up and down in silence, then continued to speak about step one to the rest of the group. No one said one word to me, as I quietly took my seat, still wearing my bathing suit, tank top and shorts from my adventurous trip to Schlitterbahn that day with my girlfriend. I thought I could make it to Alamo Heights from New Braunfels in 45 minutes, except I did not factor in the rush hour traffic on I-35 at 6:15 in the evening. Let me remind you...I was 18....and a half!!! Let me also remind you of my 18 months of sobriety. These were also the days when only medical professionals and business men had cell phones, so I had no way of calling anyone. I remember this because during the first two years of my sobriety, my step dad used to carry around a cell phone bigger than my purse and heavier than my first born child...this is how long ago this was:)

Now, I need to point out the type of sponsorship I had, my home group I was involved in and the principles involved. You may think that this was not such a big deal, that the meeting was chaired by SOMEONE, and that it could all be done without me and that I am not so important. Perhaps the last part of that sentence is true; however, that is not my point. My sponsor had taught me that I was to show up for my sobriety and to show respect for it. When I was to chair a meeting, I was to dress tastefully and attractive, because I was the first person people saw when they walked into a meeting of Alcoholics Anonymous. I was to be a good example, to be responsible for my duties, to show up on time and to do my jobs well, because I was being of service to others and that Alcoholics Anonymous was the most important thing in my life because it saved my life...and I better damn well act like it.

If I was asked to chair a meeting, speak at an AA function, take a meeting to detox, do public information at schools, go into the prisons, or if I was asked to be a sponsor, my answer was always supposed to be "yes", unless I was sick or out of town or at work. I had absolutely no excuse not to be of service when asked. At first this "suggestion" made me a tad resentful, but I soon became excited about being of service to AA and felt like I was a part of something so very special, that I had a family, a God of my understanding, that I belonged and that I was loved.

Finally, it was my turn to speak in the meeting and I apologized profusely over and over again, blaming it on the traffic. Then I may have said some words of wisdom regarding the step, but I am not sure how wise they actually were. Of course no one said anything to me at all, and that was almost worse than if someone had confronted me or questioned me. Because you see, in my heart of hearts, I knew that I was focused on my own activities that day instead of the AA meeting. I wanted to go out with my friend and wear my bikini and get attention from men...I mean...boys (I almost forgot how young I was for a moment!) I did not want to leave early; I wanted to stay until the last possible minute, leaving no room for error. I did not even have time to change into my nice outfit so I could chair the meeting. I think I even left my book at home. I suffered my own consequences without anyone's help. I wanted people to respect me and to be accountable, and this incident certainly did not help me gain any of that. I found out that I wanted to be responsible...even if I was only 18 and in early sobriety. I found out the meaning of integrity and that I was going to have to take specific actions in order to possess that quality.

I am so very proud to say that our small women's AA group has just celebrated its 15 year anniversary. I was involved in the group for the first 5 years, then I moved out of state, but have since been back many times over the years, I always make a bold attempt to attend the anniversary meeting, and I try to make it on time. I am grateful that the other members show up to our meeting and make it a priority for themselves and for the other suffering alcoholics searching for a way out of misery and despair. Today I have 16 1/2 years of continuous sobriety, and I am 33 years old and hopefully more mature now! I still like to go to the pool, wear my bikini and to get attention from men sometimes (especially a certain man), but I make sure that I wear my watch, carry my cell phone just in case, and make it a priority to leave the premises at a decent hour, and get to my meetings on time. If I tell another AA member or a newcomer I am going to meet with them, I make sure I do it, even if I am tired or don't feel like it. I believe with all of my heart that the principles I was taught in the beginning of my sobriety, by my sponsor and my home groups, were the foundation of my AA program today. I still show up when asked, I am a good example to others, I work these steps, I regularly attend meetings of Alcoholics Anonymous, I ask for help, and most importantly I pray to and rely upon a Loving God. I owe my life to Alcoholics Anonymous because I truly believe I would not be alive today if it did not exist. So due to that fact, it is my duty as well as my pleasure, to be responsible to Alcoholics Anonymous, and to live a life of honesty and integrity. I am definitely not perfect; so I continue on my journey to become closer to God, and when I turn around and see the long road which I have traveled, it nearly takes my breath away. I owe my life, my heart and soul to AA, and I am so eternally grateful for my sobriety and my long awaited serenity.

What is the Bridge Program?

San Antonio Bridge Program

AA Bridge Program connects Inside Members with AA in their community upon release. You are asked to be the AA Bridge Volunteer.

When a soon-to-be released inside AA Member contacts us, we match them to an AA Bridge Volunteer in their community. We call you, get the okay, and then send the information along to you. You contact the inside AA Member and arrange to take them to an AA meeting within 48 hours of their release. You are to take them to a minimum of 3 and a maximum of 6 meetings. You help them get acquainted, get phone numbers and perhaps locate a sponsor or a home group. Please note: It is NOT intended that you become their sponsor, even temporarily. It is best if that work is not used in any way to describe your service. Bridge Volunteers are "Bridges" to the local AA community. You introduce them to AA members so they have a base of members to call upon. Lastly, we suggest Bridge Volunteers be active in AA and have a minimum of one year of continuous sobriety

THAT AIN'T IN THE BOOK...


Editor's note: this item appeared in the Central bulletin, Cleveland Central Office, then in the New Reporter, Washington DC. It's offered here as food for thought:

We hear a lot of stuff said in meetings that can't be reconciled with the program as described in the Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous. What follows are some of the things we often hear, along with what the Big Book has to say on the subject.

"We need to give up planning, it doesn't work."

Page 86, paragraphs 3-4: "On awakening let us think about the twenty-four hours ahead. We consider our plans for the day. Before we begin, we ask God to direct our thinking, especially asking that it be divorced from self-pity, dishonest of self-seeking motives. Under these conditions we can employ our mental faculties with assurance, for after all God gave us brains to use. Our thought-life will be placed on a much higher plane when our thinking is cleared of wrong motives. In thinking about our day we may face indecion. We may not be able to determine which course to take. Here we ask God for inspiration, an intuitive thought or a decision. We relax and take it easy. We don't struggle. We are often surprised how the right answers come after we have tried this for a while."


