CENTRAL SERVICE OFFICE OF SAN ANTONIO

MEMBERSHIP:

Every A.A. group in the San Antonio Metropolitan area may be a member of the Central Service Office of San Antonio. They exercise their membership by sending a CSO representative to the monthly meeting at the Central Service Office on the third (3rd) Monday of the month at 6:00pm.

CSO REPRESENTATIVES:

The Central Service Office Representative (CSOR) is the very core of the Central Service Office. Each A.A. group within the San Antonio Metropolitan Area may elect a member to service as its CSO representative. This allows the groups to vote on issues, voice opinions, and/or inquiries on behalf of their group. The CSOR oversees the actions of the Board of Trustees and has the right to override any Board decision. They inform the CSO of the groups needs and inform the group of the services provided by the CSO. They encourage membership in the CSO committees and inform them of financial needs.

HELP LINE (210)828-6235:

The goal of the CSO board is to have an A.A. member always answer a call for help or information in the San Antonio Metropolitan area 7/24/365. This requires we have volunteers for the after-hour calls, forwarded to their personal phone. The CSO telephone committee is responsible for this service. The CSO telephone committee provides training. We can always use new phone volunteers

New Business - Group needs to elect a CSOR Representative as liaison to the Board of Trustees to take information about our meetings..





A.A. Service Manual /Twelve Concepts for World Service

We continue to explore the A.A. Service Manual. This is one book that should be in every Group library. It is full of information. It is very inexpensive. If you want to explore this book before you put one in your Group's Library, there is a copy in the Fellowship Room Library at Central Service Office (CSO) at 8804 Tradeway, San Antonio, TX 78217, open to all AA members.

Topic Two: Two Corporations - Continued from November

The General Service Board is responsible for the General Service Office and the Grapevine. (In the <u>January issue of the Nightcap</u> we will explore the General Service Office.)

The General Service Board takes care of its administrative duties through two corporations, The A.A. World Services Inc., and the A.A. Grapevine, Inc.

In this issue of the Nightcap, we are looking at the second of the two corporations that are responsible for administrative duties of the General Service Board.

<u>Corporation Two</u>: A.A. Grapevine, Inc.

How does A.A. Grapevine, Inc. function? It functions through a corporate board. (Your Central Service Office in San Antonio functions through a corporate board.)

The Corporate Board currently has nine directors

- Two general service Trustees
- Two regional or at-large trustees
- One Class A Trustee
- Three nontrustee directors
- An Executive Editor / Publisher who is president of the corporation. Is an A.A. member

The board meets quarterly. They consider agenda items such as:

- Circulation
- Finance
- Publishing Operations for both the Grapevine and the LaViňa

It holds 4 additional meetings a year as a planning committee of the whole.

The Chairman of the Corporation is always a trustee. And the chairmanship rotates each year between a general service trustee and a regional trustee. Directors are elected each year and may serve four consecutive one-year terms, with two exceptions: regional trustees serve for two years, nontrustee directors who are elected trustees may serve four additional years in that capacity. All directors are voting members of the General Service Conference, which meets for one week in April, and serve on **The Grapevine Office:** The executive editor/publisher has oversight responsibility for Grapevine and La Viña operations and reports directly to the Grapevine Corporate Board. There are several members of the Grapevine team: The Controller, senior editor of La Viña, the web editor, office manager, juior accountant, production associate, customer relations coordinator and two part-time editorial assistants.

How is A.A. Grapevine supported? A.A. Grapevine's goal is to be supported by the revenue it receives through the sales of it's books and other publishing items.

Grapevine does not accept any contributions from Groups or individuals and does not accept monies from ads or memberships. Funds come from the sales of its subscriptions and other items sold.

The Grapevine has become self supporting, but the La Viña is still considered a "service" piece and is supported by funds from the General Service Board.

The Magazines and other items that Grapevine Publishes and sells

The A.A. Grapevine carries its message in a variety of media. Items that have been published in the Grapevine are presented in one or several of the following forms of media: Magazines, CD's, books, audio Books, MP3s, pocket calendar, wall calendar and service items such as the Serenity Prayer and A.A. Preamble signs. Bulk magazines sales are encouraged.

Why are the Two Corporations Separate?

Bill W. addressed this question in his essay on Concept XI in Twelve Concepts for World Service questions: "Why can't both of them be consolidated into the General Service Board?" Or, "Why can't the Grapevine be merged into AA World Services, Inc., thus placing all active Headquarters operations under a single management?" These questions have already been discussed under previous Concepts. We have concluded that the General Service Board is an unsuitable vehicle for an operating corporation; that because the Grapevine is such a dissimilar operation, and because we ought not concentrate too much moey and executive authority in a single entity, there should be no merger of AA World Services and The AA Grapevine. Upon these points we seem well agreed-at least, as of now.
