The meeting directory is printed every day in order to insure that members have the latest meeting information.

How can you help to keep it current?

- ♦ Call in all changes for your Group. Have a designated person to do this report.
- ♦ Review the directory on a regular basis. Advise the Office of any needed corrections.

Adopt-A-Rack Program

Frequently Asked Questions

What does it mean to Adopt-a-Rack? When you or your AA group commits to Adopt-a-Rack, you are agreeing to pay \$10 for the rack & supplies, place it at a location where alcoholics come into contact with professionals (see the Adopt-a-Rack brochure for examples) and check the rack quarterly to keep it filled. **OR**, the PI/CPC committee may have an "orphan" rack already located that you can adopt and just needs periodic checking and filling!

What is the best way to find a location to place a rack? Think about where you first learned about A.A. Was it from a counselor, doctor, clergy member or treatment center? Your chances of getting permission to place a rack are increased if you know or use the service provider. You are also more likely to have success with an independently owned and operated facility. The PI/CPC committee is actively working to establish relationships with larger organizations such as hospital systems, schools, VA facilities and probation/parole offices.

What if we do not have a facility in mind to place a rack? The committee often has racks placed without an adopting group to maintain them. We may be able to assign you a rack that has already been placed and strive to designate one that is located for you to conveniently maintain. Email us at cmte.litrack@gmail.com and ask to adopt an "orphan" rack.

How do we ask permission to place a rack? We've included a letter to professionals in the folder you can duplicate and disseminate. Ask the service provider directly (for example, the doctor or counselor) and they will likely connect you with their office manager for details on the rack placement.

What if they don't want a rack, but would like some individual literature? You can obtain some free literature from CSO and give that to them, or ask them which pamphlets they would like. Your group conscience may need to be consulted to pay for an ongoing literature expense.

What is included with the rack, and do we have any choices of pamphlets?

Initially, each rack will be stocked with 90 free "A.A. at a Glance" pamphlets in English and/or Spanish, your group just needs to let a committee member know how many of each. Also included will be 30 "Alcoholics Anonymous Help Line" business cards and a folder with information helpful to you and the facility where the rack is placed. There are a variety of free pamphlets with which to re-stock the rack. Alternately, you or your group may choose to re-stock with pamphlets for purchase at a nominal cost from Central Service Office (call CSO at 210-821-6325) or the General Service Office (go to www.aa.org). Further, the contact person at the facility where the rack is placed may have specific pamphlets he or she would prefer inserted. A list of many pamphlets is attached and in the folder for professionals.

How much does a rack cost, and who do we pay? The rack and initial insertions cost \$10 payable to Central Service Office. Bring a completed Adopt-A-Rack Request form in person or mail to:

Where do we pick up the rack? You will pick up the rack from CSO, 8804 Tradeway, 78217.

I am an individual A.A. member and would like to Adopt-a-Rack rather than go through my home group. Is this ok? That is fine, but you will bear a somewhat greater responsibility doing it on your own. You will be responsible for ongoing maintenance of the rack. If you work through your group, you will have an ongoing support team to help you if you are unable to maintain the rack over time.

How does cooperating with the professional community (CPC) fit into our Traditions? AA has been working with professionals from the beginning. Without the help of non-alcoholics such as Dr. Silkworth, Sister Ignatia and the Reverend Sam Shoemaker, A.A. might never have gotten off the ground.

The **Fifth Tradition** reminds us of our primary purpose, that of carrying the message to the alcoholic who still suffers. CPC work "...is an effective way to carry the message to the sick alcoholic." (CPC Workbook, p. 5)

The **Sixth Tradition** cautions us to be thoughtful *how* we interact with professionals. "We should never endorse, finance, or lend the AA name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property, and prestige divert us from our primary purpose." We can cooperate, but be careful not to affiliate.

Tradition Ten also advises us that we should have "...no opinions on outside issues; hence the A.A. name ought never be drawn into public controversy." ***We are encouraged to be mindful what we say*** when interacting with professionals and the non-alcoholic community.

Tradition Eleven states "Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion; we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio, and films." The CPC workbook distinguishes public relations as *individual networking* with professionals who work with alcoholics: "C.P.C. work can begin when individual A.A.s reveal their membership to their doctors or drop a quiet word in the ear of a pastor, priest or rabbi that an A.A. member is available to the congregation. Groups participate in CPC by welcoming professionals and future professionals to open meetings... Committees on the area or local level actively seek ways to make contact with professional people and set up programs to increase knowledge and understanding of Alcoholics Anonymous." (page 6)

And finally, **Tradition Twelve** emphasizes that, "Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our Traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities." In writing about this tradition in *The Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions*, Bill W answers the question, "How anonymous should an AA member be?"

"Clearly, every A.A. member's name—and story, too—had to be confidential, *if he wished* When opportunities to be helpful came along, he found he could talk easily about A.A. to almost anyone. These quiet disclosures helped him to lose his fear of the alcoholic stigma, and spread the news of A.A.'s existence in his community. Many a new man and woman came to A.A. because of such conversations.

"But it became apparent that the word-of-mouth method was too limited. Our work, as such, needed to be publicized. The A.A. groups would have to reach quickly as many despairing alcoholics as they could. Consequently, many groups began to hold meetings which were open to interested friends and the public, so that the average citizen could see for himself just what A.A. was all about. The response to these meetings was warmly sympathetic. Soon, groups began to receive requests for A.A. speakers to appear before civic organizations, church groups, and medical societies. Provided anonymity was maintained on these platforms, and reporters present were cautioned against the use of names or pictures, the result was fine." (Pages 185 and 186)

So, the literature rack program and other CPC work we do help carry the A.A. message, while being conscientious to protect the future of Alcoholics Anonymous.

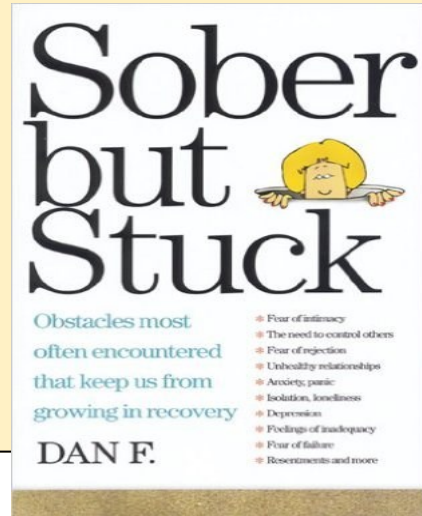

Anonymity

In Alcoholics Anonymous we talk a lot about anonymity. In the next three issues of the Nightcap we will share with our members a writing that Bill W. did for the January 1946 Grapevine. This is a long article and we will present the entire article in a three-part series. Please note that all Grapevine articles require permission to reprint.

A Tradition Born of Our Anonymity

AA's Traditions, Bill wrote, were "hammered out on the anvil of experience." Here, from an early Grapevine, Bill shares some of the experience that led to the adoption of our two anonymity Traditions - From the January 1946 Grapevine

Though we no longer fear the stigma of alcoholism as we once did, we still find individuals who are extremely sensitive about their connection with us. A few come in under assumed names. Others swear us to the deepest secrecy. They fear their connection with Alcoholics Anonymous may ruin their business or social position.

At the other end of the scale of opinion, we have the individual who declares that anonymity is a lot of childish nonsense. He feels it his bounden duty to cry his membership in Alcoholics Anonymous from the housetops. He points out that our AA Fellowship contains people of renown, some of national importance. Why, he asks, shouldn't we capitalize on their personal prestige just as any other organization would?

In between these extremes, the shades of opinion are legion. Some groups, especially newer ones, conduct themselves like secret societies. They do not wish their activities known even to friends. Nor do they propose to have preachers, doctors, or even their wives at any of their meetings. As for inviting in newspaper reporters--perish the thought! Others groups feel that their communities should know all about Alcoholics Anonymous. Though they print no names, they do seize every opportunity to advertise the activities of their group. They occasionally hold public or semipublic meetings where AAs appear on the platform by name. Doctors, clergymen, and public officials are frequently invited to speak at such gatherings. Here and there, a few AAs have dropped their anonymity completely. Their names, pictures, and personal activities have appeared in the public prints. As AAs, they have sometimes signed their names to articles telling of their membership.

So, while it is quite evident that most of us believe in anonymity, our practice of the principle does vary a great deal.

Of course, it should be the privilege, even the right, of each individual or group to handle anonymity as they wish. But to do that intelligently, we shall need to be convinced that the principle is a good one for practically all of us; indeed, we must realize that the future safety and effectiveness of Alcoholics Anonymous may depend upon its preservation. Each individual will then have to decide where he ought to draw the line--how far he ought to carry the principle in his own affairs, how far he may go in dropping his own anonymity without injury to Alcoholics Anonymous as a whole.

The vital question is: Just where shall we fix this point where personalities fade out and anonymity begins?

As a matter of fact, few of us are anonymous so far as our daily contacts go. We have dropped anonymity at this level because we think our friends and associates ought to know about

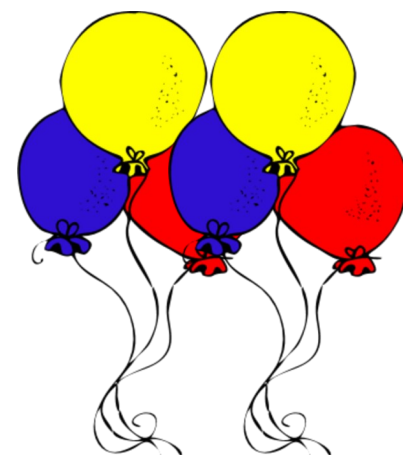

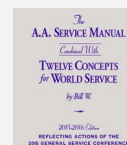

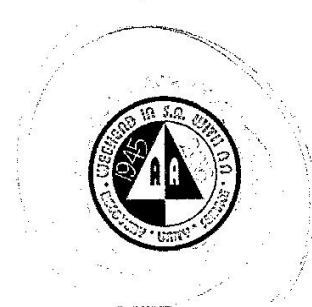


Tradition Six (long form)



Problems of money, property, and authority may easily divert us from our primary spiritual aim. We think, therefore, that any considerable property of genuine use to AA should be separately incorporated and managed, thus dividing the material from the spiritual. An AA group, as such, should never go into business. Secondary aids to AA, such as clubs or hospitals which require much property or administration, ought to be incorporated and so set apart that, if necessary, they can be freely discarded by the groups. Hence such facilities ought not to use the AA name. Their management should be the sole responsibility of those people who financially support them. For clubs, AA managers are usually preferred. But hospitals, as well as other places of recuperation, ought to be well outside AA-and medically supervised. While an AA group may cooperate with anyone, such cooperation ought never go so far as affiliation or endorsement, actual or implied. An AA group can bind itself to no one.
