THIS COULD BE YOUR GROUP: I AM an alcoholic. I belong to a group in Charlotte, N.C. In all of our group meetings, whether open or closed, the secretary or the presiding member asks if there are any new members, guests or visiting AAs. The visiting AA is asked to introduce himself to the group and to say a few words if he cares to. When the program chairman has concluded the program and turns the meeting back to the secretary for closing, the secretary again asks if there are any visiting AAs who were not recognized at the beginning of the meeting (for the benefit of those who might have come in late) and as before, these are asked if they would like to say something. Immediately after the closing prayer, our members introduce themselves to the visitor and in turn introduce him around to the rest of the members. He is offered coffee and cake and generally made to feel at home and at ease. More often than not, one of the members will ask a few members and the visiting AA to "drop by for some coffee or coke" on the way home.

The week ending Saturday, June 25th, I was attending a convention in a large eastern city. My first act on arriving was to phone an AA friend whom I had had the pleasure of meeting at the N. Car. State Convention in Asheville last May, where she had been a guest speaker and had made one of the outstanding talks of the convention.

I ASKED her where and when AA meetings were held. I attended two, missing convention meetings in order to attend AA--a sacrifice I was more than willing to make. The first meeting that I attended was excellent; fine speakers, good ideas and opinions were heard and exchanged--one couldn't have heard better AA talk anywhere. I fully expected to be introduced to the group as a visiting AA from Charlotte and I was looking forward to telling the group what an excellent meeting they had had and how much it had meant to me, an AA away from home and on a convention at that. Before I knew what had happened, we were on our feet closing with the Lord's Prayer.

I STOOD around for a bit but no one made any effort to speak to me so I went up front and complimented the program chairman on her meeting. Several times we were interrupted while she spoke to other members, turning her back on me without an "Excuse me" or "Pardon me." She finally did present me to three ladies--simply because they almost stood on my toes. Quite abruptly she walked away. I was not asked to partake of any refreshments. I stood around like a fish out of water. I was completely ignored--not another soul spoke to me. I definitely was burned up at that group's complete lack of friendship, fellowship and hospitality. I left, and then remembering that I didn't know where to locate a cab to take me back to the hotel, I returned and asked the first man I saw where the nearest phone was to call a cab. Curtly, I was told that I could find one across the driveway.

I CALLED my friend the next day and related the above. She was surprised but in effect said that only the South extended the hospitality that I was used to. I reminded her that I was a Northerner (I've lived in the South 12 years) and that the South didn't have a monopoly on hospitality, fellowship or manners. That afternoon I visited the AA Club, the Downtown or Central group. After sitting around for nearly 20 minutes like a bump on a log--again nobody paid me the slightest bit of attention--I finally located the office and introduced myself. What started out very dully turned out to be a very interesting bull session of an hour or more on AA--naturally! The point, though, is that nobody spoke to me; I had to make the first move and break the ice! *After* the ice was broken, everything was swell--they were very hospitable and nice.

THAT evening I attended another group meeting. Had my friend not given me the name of a woman AA to ask for, I'm afraid that it would have been a repetition of the previous group. There again, I had to break the ice--no one spoke to me, welcomed me or asked me where I was from (although I had my convention badge on my lapel with my name and home city on it in type large enough to be read across the room!) I had to make the effort and ask for this lady. Unfortunately she was not there but I was asked, "Can I do anything for you?" I explained that I was a visitor. Then I met some AAs and from then on everything was in the groove, particularly when I was asked, "Do you know--?"

MY point in writing this article is this: Where was the hand of AA fellowship? I felt like an outcast. Had I been one of those unfortunates who can't quite seem to get and stay on the Program, I would have gone out after that first meeting looking for the nearest bar and, brother, I would have gotten gloriously drunk--I could have found fellowship at the bar and a darn sight more friend-liness than was shown me after the first meeting--at least that is the way stinking thinking could have figured it out.

It seems to me that AA is much more important away from home. A person is among strangers--he needs the understanding fellowship that AA *should* be able to give him. No one understands a drunk like another drunk--whether they are drinking or sober, thanks to God and AA. In a strange town with time on one's hands, AA meetings and the fellowship that should go with those meetings will help to keep the visiting AA sober. AA got us sober and it seems to me that we are individually and collectively falling down on our 12 Steps if we fail to make a visiting AA at home by extending the right hand of fellowship, friendliness, hospitality and courtesy.

MAY I suggest, humbly, that all groups make it a point to recognize visiting AAs, that you do as much as possible towards making their visit in your city or town a happy one so that they will look forward to returning and renewing AA friendships. We all do a lot of 12th Stepping--we go out and get a drunk, sober him up and get him to attend meetings, thereby keeping him sober and happy. You wouldn't intentionally do anything to make an AA mad so that he would go out and get drunk, would you? Then why would you do anything that might risk a visiting fellow AA's sobriety? Extend your hand in fellowship to the visiting AA and you won't ever regret it. "But for the Grace of God" you might be that visiting AA.

CONFERENCE-APPROVED LITERATURE

Editor's note: The "Conference" referred here is the General Service Conference, which meets annually in New York, consisting of the GSO staff, trustees, and area delegates. Included in the business of this conference is the approval of new, and changes (if any) of current A.A. literature.

"Conference-approved" - What It Means to You

The term "Conference-approved" describes written or audiovisual material approved by the Conference for publication by G.S.O. This process assures that everything in such literature is in accord with A.A. principles. Conference-approved material always deals with the recovery program of Alcoholics Anonymous or with information about the A.A. Fellowship.

The term has no relation to material not published by G.S.O. It does <u>not</u> imply Conference disapproval of other material about A.A. A great deal of literature helpful to alcoholics is published by others, and A.A. does not try to tell any individual member what he or she may or may not read.

Conference approval assures us that a piece of literature represents solid A.A. experience. Any Conference-approved booklet or pamphlet goes through a lengthy and painstaking process, during which a variety of A.A.s from all over the United States and Canada read and express opinions at every stage of production.

How To Tell What Is and What Is Not Conference-approved. Look for the statement on books, pamphlets and films: "This a A.A. General Service Conference-approved literature."

Not All "A.A. Literature" is Conference-Approved. Central offices and intergroups do write and distribute pamphlets or booklets that are not Conference-approved. If such pieces meet the needs of the local membership, they may be legitimately classified as "A.A. literature." There is no conflict between A.A. World Services, Inc. (A.A.W.S.—publishers of Conference-approved literature), and central offices or intergroups—rather they complement each other. The Conference does not <u>disapprove</u> of such material.

G.S.O. does develop some literature that does not have to be approved by the Conference, such as service material, Guidelines and bulletins.

Pastor is on vacation. Massages can be given to the church secretary.


The ladies of the church have cast-off clothing of every kind and they may be seen in the church basement Friday.

The ladies Bible Study will be held Tuesday morning at 10. All ladies are invited to lunch in the Fellowship Hall after the B.S.




