


Char S. passed away on February 19th.

This is a reprint of article written by Char for her home group on July 13, 2005.

WOMAN'S BIG BOOK STUDY GROUP

History 7/13/05

Our group originally began with the name Foxey Ladies. Several women from the Foxhall group made a decision to start a women's meeting. That decision turned into action, June 30, 1992, at an organizational meeting at the Pig Stand Café at 9:30p.m.

Nine ladies were in attendance. Julee C. became our first treasurer and Kim H. our first secretary. Char became our temporary GSR till we elected Elisa J. in February. Louanne S. was elected our COR. Char had already checked out a location at St. David's Episcopal Church (1300 Wiltshire Blvd). The church was happy to have us and we continued to meet there every Wednesday at 7:00p.m., for the next four (4) years.

It was decided to be a closed 12x12 Step Study. Later, group conscience decided to add the Traditions and apply them to relationships because all of the men in our lives were sick and dysfunctional. Finally, we decided to have a business meeting after one month to see if the format was what the group wanted.

A coffee pot and supplies were donated by a group that had folded and rent was ony 25% of the collections

Our first meeting was on July 8, 1992. Eight Foxey Ladies were in attendance. Each of us read a couple of paragraphs until we finished Step One. The chairperson commented then opened it up to the group for discussion till everyone had shared. Seven dollars was collected that first night.

On October 16, 1992 the General Service Office in New York recognized us as an official group and assigned us a group service number (#D-44-02433-(68)-(19).

We started doing service work and supported groups and conferences, but the first time we really got into and served the A.A. community is when we hosted the District 19 workshop on April 24, 1993. Sandy C. (Alternate Area 68 Delegate) was our guest speaker and shared about the A.A. service structure.

Along the way, the group conscience decided to have monthly business meetings the first Wednesday of each month and to celebrate birthdays the last Wednesday of the month. This was suggested by our longtimer, Dee S., who joined our group with her 30+ years of sobriety about six months after our beginnings. In the beginning we had from 12-18 women per week and had a great diversity of age and sobriety from one month to 35 years.

On July 7, 1993, we switched from a 12x12 study to a Big Book study, because we have mastered the 12x12J The monthly chairperson reads one paragraph from the Big Book per week and comes prepared with a discussion and has looked up the meanings of pertinent words in that paragraph.

Foxey Ladies celebrated yearly anniversaries every July for the next four years. Traditionally, we open our anniversary meeting to the A.A. community and have a male speaker, refreshment and lots of good fellowship.

After four years the church came to us needing us to change our day because of a conflict they had with one of their meetings. We decided not to change the day of our meeting, but to look for a different location.

For the next nearly two years we were at a church on the corner of New Braunfels and Primrose. During this time our group dwindled down to only 3 or 4 in attendance at the most.

Group conscience eventually sent us out for another location, and we have been here at the Alamo Heights Methodist Church ever since, which has been the last seven years. Our regular meeting is held in the Bell Room downstairs.

We were not at this new location long when our GSR, who will remain anonymous, kept after the group about changing our name. She was tired of being teased at the district and Interdistrict meetings. Never the less, thru group conscience Foxey Ladies became the Woman's Big Book Study Group a little over six (6) years ago. Our regular attendance is 20-30 women at each weekly meeting.

The group has always been involved in service, and in 2000 we started a little conference, "A Day In Recovery" which continues today. This year, the Rush Hour and Young and Done groups have joined us in sponsoring this conference.

Shared Experience From an A.A. Member

Working with Elder Alcoholics

"Reaching out to elderly alcoholics has been a passion of mine for a number of years. Partly it's because of my own age — I'm 75 and I understand the challenges of staying sober while you are aging. In particular things like loss of health and mobility, financial insecurity, the death of loved ones. It isn't easy. "Forming an Accessibilities Committee is a good start. The committee can send out letters to health fairs and geriatric physicians and assisted living centers. I decided to focus on senior centers. Senior citizen centers are generally pretty easy to approach. Most of the staff let us put literature, Big Books and Grapevines in their libraries. We took panels into senior centers, for seniors and staff alike — sometimes they weren't alcoholics, but knew that so-and-so was at home drinking too much. "Another approach people can use is to start a Seniors in Sobriety (SIS) meeting, or at least designate certain meetings Senior Friendly (SF). Seniors isolate themselves, they don't identify, they retreat, they decline. They need to know they are welcome. When I got sober it was the 'meeting after the meeting' that was so important, one alcoholic talking to another. This is what seniors need — another person to talk with about sobriety and these special challenges older people face."

Whether extending the hand of A.A. to elders already sober in A.A. or to elder newcomers, Accessibilities Committees help insure A.A.'s program of recovery is available to anyone who has a desire to stop drinking, regardless of their age. Such service could include the following:

- Coordinating schedules and member participation to provide home meetings in person, by phone, or over the Internet for elderly or homebound members of A.A.
- Providing assistance and information to support transportation of the elderly to meetings, whether door-to -door or from the parking spot to a chair.
- Gathering and passing on local, shared experience for types of meeting formats used in elder care facilities, community senior centers, and home settings.
- Gathering and passing on local, shared experience for guidelines and suggestions for working within elder care facilities.
- Conducting workshops on any of the various topics that relate to this service area.
- Having a contact person who calls if someone has missed a few meetings, whether they are elderly or not. If they are sick or incapacitated in some way, the liaison can offer help to get them to meetings or have a meeting brought to them.

It is always beneficial to include committee members who have accessibility challenges and provide information for them and others in accessible formats.



Q. Why do AA members use tokens, medallions, and chips to mark sobriety? When did that practice start?

A: The chip system is thought to have begun in Indianapolis in 1942. The tradition is believed to have started with Doherty S., who originally brought A.A. to Indianapolis. Doherty himself, in a letter to Bill, seems to indicate the practice originated in Indianapolis in 1942.

Nell Wing wrote in 1962 about the history of the chip system: "...The chip system might have begun in Indianapolis....reference was made in a letter from Doherty to the start of giving out 'chips' and 'tokens.' This was in 1942. I imagine this would be about right, because most of the early groups started in 1940 and it would take about a couple of years to think of anniversaries and marking any time of sobriety. I asked Bill about this and his memory is that the system started in Indianapolis."

In *Dr. Bob and the Good Old Timers,* it indicates that Sister Ignatia in Akron, working at St. Thomas Hospital, also used medallions: *"Sister Ignatia gave each of her newly released patients a Sacred Heart medallion, which she asked them to return before they took the first drink. She would occasionally give out St. Christopher medals as well..." (page 195).*

We don't know precisely who started this system first, or when and how it spread to other groups. As with many things in AA, the exact nature of the history eludes us!


