Night Cap

April 1980 Front Page

In 1941, a San Antonio Episcopal Priest read the now famous Jack Alexander Articles* and thus was planted the seed for the founding of Alcoholics Anonymous in the Alamo City, 35 years ago.

The Rev. Everett H. Jones, "our honorary alcoholic", as he affectionately came to be called by San Antonio's early AA members, was Rector of St. Mark's Episcopal church in 1941, when he worked with a small group of ex-problem drinkers to bring AA to San Antonio for the first time ever.

Although the initial attempt to establish a group here was not successful, their efforts led to the founding of Alcoholics Anonymous in San Antonio four years later, on Apr. 12, 1945.

During those pioneering days, the disease Alcoholism had not yet been given its name by the American Medical Association. Anyone who drank to excess, then, was considered to be an outcast of society, with about the same social status as a Leper exiled to a First Century cave in the wilderness.

Jones must have puzzled over naming it, too, having worked with two problem drinkers for some time, both members of his congregation. But he learned from the Alexander piece that Houston had an AA Group. Here was help only a relatively short motor trip away.

Interview With the Author of "Physician, Heal Thyself!

Dr. Earle's story "Physician, Heal Thyself!" appeared in the Second and Third Editions of the Big Book. Dr. Earle was interviewed by telephone at his home in California by a Grapevine staff member.

Continued from April Nightcap

Now, do I think there is a supreme being, a God? Sure I do. Of course. But do I have any religious beliefs? No. Religion demands that you do certain things and my life in AA isn't like that. AA is a very loose-jointed organization. People say there is only one way to work the program. That's crazy. We talk about the "suggested" Steps, which are guides to recovery, not absolutes. Chapter five of the Big Book says "no one among us has been able to maintain anything like perfect adherence to these principles." If we had all the members of AA standing here, everyone would have a different idea what AA is all about. Bill's idea was different from Dr. Bob's, yours will be different from mine. And yet they're all based on one thing and that is: don't drink, and use the Twelve Steps in your own way.

Do you sponsor people differently now than you did years ago?

I don't think I do. Maybe these days sponsees tend to talk about not only their drinking but a little more about the relationship problems, and so we get into conversations about their wives or sweethearts and some emotional problems.

So whatever changes you find in AA, you're not uncomfortable with them?

Well, some AA groups have turned into kind of psychological forums and that isn't AA to me. Maybe it is, I don't know. But here's the way I feel about it, correct or incorrect: AA is my family, and every family has a mix of people in it. Every family has people who are braggarts who think they know everything--every family does. Every family has people who whine all the time--every family. And every family has people who go out and do very well and succeed at the art of living. So when I hear the whiners--well, they're kind of a bore, but on the other hand, a family always has boring whiners in it.

Did your marriage change after you got sober?

Oh my God, yes--I've been married four times. I was sober about fifteen years before I got divorced the first time. I'd been married thirty years. It was a marriage that was not very successful. My wife and I went on different paths, but we were victims of the idea that good boys and girls don't get divorced. Finally I said to Mary, "You know, I think we ought to get divorced," and she said, "I think so too. We don't have much in common." So we had a very sensible, quiet, straight-forward divorce. But you can't hang from the rope for thirty years and not miss it when it's cut down. So, after that I got married twice for very short times to two very fine women, good friends of mine today. Then I had a long time when I wasn't married and then I met my current wife and we've been married fifteen years. She's sitting right here, by the way, working on the computer.

Is there any Step that is a particular help to you?

Local AA member becomes our Regional Trustee for the Southwest Region of the U.S.

Yolanda F., (Yoli), an active member of Alcoholics Anonymous in San Antonio for many years, was elected Regional Trustee for the Southwest Region of the United States at the recent General Service Conference in New York. The Southwest Region covers Texas, Arkansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, Kansas, Colorado and New Mexico.

"What is a Regional Trustee", you ask?

There are eight regional trustees, six from the United States and two from Canada, who serve four successive annual terms. No trustee "represents" a geographical section; but all trustees represent the Fellowship as a whole. Regional Trustees bring to the general service board's discussions a regional A. A. point of view and experience that is invaluable.

Candidates are proposed by each area and voted using the third legacy voting procedure. The elected candidate's "resume" covering professional, business and A.A. service qualifications is submitted to GSO by the area delegate.

Yoli has been active in A. A. service in San Antonio and the Southwest Texas Area 68 throughout her sobriety. Her first home group was the 24 Hour Group. Then she called Grupo Sante Fe her "home" for over 20 years. She was GSR for Grupo Sante Fe and DCM for District 01F. During that time District 01F wrote the first proposal with the help of the SWTA 68 Delegate, Bob McG., to have a Grapevine magazine written in Spanish. A letter was sent to them declining this proposal. That didn't stop them. A second proposal was written later with the help of the SWTA 68 Delegate Sandy C. This one was accepted and La Vina was on its way. Yoli has also served as the SWTA 68 Bilingual Chairperson, Grapevine Chairperson for SAMSO and was "pulled from the hat" as SWTA 68 Alternate Chairperson. As SWTA 68 Chairperson, Yoli and a number of A.A. members including Mary S. and the Delegate at the time Roger L., proposed to have a uniform translation of the Spanish Big Book. It was approved by the Conference and brought to fruition in the 3rd edition of the Spanish Big Book. Yoli served the fellowship as SWTA 68 Panel 50 Delegate from 2000-2002. Her home group for the last 3 years has been the Hope Group. She will start her new service as Regional Trustee Sunday, April 26, following the end of the General Service Conference. "No" is not in her vocabulary. Let's all extend congratulations and well wishes in her upcoming endeavors.
