Interview with the Author of "The Independent Blonde

Fifth in a series of articles on authors of Big Book stories

Continued from the August edition of the Nightcap.

When I came into AA I was about thirty-nine years old. That was in 1945. There was another woman who was as young as I was, and they picked us to go to hospitals and drying-out places because we were younger and presentable. In those days, if you were a drunk from a rich family, they put you away. You were hidden in hospitals and all kinds of places. So she and I bought little hats with flowers on them and we had little black dresses and pearls, and that's how we'd go. I was very naive; I said, "Gee, there's bars on the winand no doorknobs." I saw so many young, young rich women, incarcerated by their families.

Once we went to the apartment of Miss X [a celebrated actress] and she told us such wonderful stories, we forgot why we were there. We didn't have the nerve to tell her that she was a drunk. Later she did get sober.

Did you take literature on Twelfth Step calls?

There wasn't much literature. We'd just go and talk and be friendly and say how long we were in AA and where to go to meetings. But our intensity when we were talking to drunks was very effective, because they knew how we felt. They knew that we cared about them. And nobody had cared about them in so long. So that's how it worked for us. We didn't have any spiel of any kind. We'd say, "You'll be okay, and you'll go to meetings with us and we'll come and get you, and if you have any trouble, call us right away." It was very simple but very effective.

I didn't like the families in the beginning. I was mad at the families. I wouldn't talk to anybody but the alcoholic. A friend of mine said to me, "Nancy, I think that it's time that you begin to accept families." And I said, "Do I have to?" She said, "I think that it would be a good idea." I respected her but I thought, I'll think it over but I'm not ready yet.

I had never felt like I was anything in my whole life, that I had anything to give and then here I was told that I had something to give someone--well, I could hardly wait to go on those Twelfth Step calls. I didn't care if somebody lived in Philadelphia or Hoboken or Timbuktu, I would go. I was so eager to give what I had. I went right from the First Step to the last Step. For me it was just wonderful. I got in with people and I cared for somebody. You see, I had never cared for anybody, not even myself. When you care for somebody, you begin to heal yourself. You don't even know it.

I left home when I was fourteen. My mother died when I was three, my father remarried when I was fourteen, and my step-mother threw me out. When you're thrown out, you don't feel like you're anything. You know something's got to be wrong with you or they wouldn't have thrown you out. And they tell me that psychologically I felt abandoned by my mother. So here I was in AA and there were people who told me I had something and that they had the same thing that I had--you can't imagine how important that was.



Correctional Facilities Committee in San Antonio (A SAMSO Committee)

The Correctional Facilities Committee is going strong in San Antonio, and we can use your help. You are needed!!

Your experience, strength and hope might be the difference in whether an Inmate will listen or not. You have something to give. The 12th Step is your step.

The need for Sponsor By Mail is one area where we most need help. Our increased attendance at seven Prison Units in our Area 68, and the Bexar County Jail, and the two San Antonio Treatment Facilities Lockup Units, have helped to fuel this need. We give Desire Chip cards out with the P. O. Box to our Committee. We tell them if they want a Big Book (soft cover), or a Sponsor By Mail, to write and ask. At this time we are receiving approximately 15-20 letters a month.

If you want to get involved with one of the Service Committees, the CFC Committee might be just right for you, or if you need to further your Service Commitment, please contact us.

This is a sample of a letter written to an inmate who had stayed sober for a while in AA, almost a year, and had worked the T Steps up to Step 8. He then drank again and ended up in prison because he couldn't stop.

Letter

The CFC Committee is an AA Service Organization, which is a part of the AA Worldwide Service Structure. As a part of AA, we are not allied with any sect, denomination, politics, or organization, and not affiliated with the courts. We are fully self supporting through our own contributions.

The thing that happens to many potential recovering alcoholics, and I happen to also be a drug addict, is that after a short time in AA, they fail to grow and enlarge their Spiritual life. The steps should be worked as a drowning man would reach for a life jacket-with the desperation of a dying man. The Spiritual Life that we talk about is not a theory, or just a good idea; it must be lived. Each day is a day in which we must carry the vision of God's Will into all of our activities. "How can I best serve Thee-Thy will (not mine) be done." These are thoughts that must go with us constantly. We can exercise our will power along this line all we wish. It is the proper use of the will. That is on page 85 of the Big Book. I suggest you read the book as though you were trying to get a plan for living out of it. That is what it has become for me. "A design for living". It is called that several times in the book.

I also came to AA with a ton of issues that I couldn't carry the weight of any more. I first had to get sober; we call it First Things First. The book says that first we must straighten up Spiritually, and then we will straighten up mentally and physically. Being away from drugs and alcohol, if you choose to, is a good start. The rest will be up to you. I am glad they have Recovery Programs where you are. Take advantage of them.

Read the book, Pray, try to Meditate, and if you have a Chaplain or Counselor there that will listen to your inventory, go to them and get it off of your chest.

AA will be there for you when you get out, but you must give yourself to it with complete abandon.
