The Marymont Group celebrated their 9th Anniversary on April 24, 1984! Congratulations!


Former Jesuit PAUL (Oblate Group) is now an active priest in the Amarillo Diocese.

PUBLIC INFORMATION REPORT - Bob W. was absent. Al D. reported that Bob is working hard with different schools in the area and is working on some T.V. and radio spots for A.A.

HOSPITAL AND INSTITUTION REPORT - Sylvia, the prospective chair for this committee, asked that Raleigh Hills Wednesday Night meeting be placed on the Hospital List. Fred explained the duties for the position of chairperson - to oversee that groups who volunteer to bring meetings follow through, and to have some back-up people in case someone does not - to Sylvia. Al D. asked Sylvia to attend the Administrative Board Meeting to discuss matters further.

OLD BUSINESS - 39th Anniversary of A.A. in S.A. - Fred D. announced that due to the late start he had some difficulty finding a place that was large enough and not already booked for the celebration. After an exhaustive search, the Alzafar Shrine Temple on 1604 was booked. Because of the distance, Fred will try to arrange round trip bus transportation for the people from the ARC, SASH, Goliad, and possibly from Club 12 for the price of \$1.00. The anniversary will be on April 28 (Saturday), with fellowship from 5:30 to 6:00 p.m., Supper from 6:00 to 7:30 p.m. and speaker at 7:30 p.m. (Note: The week of March 19, Jim Williams of Fort Worth agreed to speak.)

The ticket price is \$6.00 and Fred explained that this is the break-even price. The tickets will be handled like the mini-conference; if a person can buy a ticket for himself and/or someone else, do so--if not, come anyway. Fred gave 20 tickets


GSR Question - Fred answered the question of whether or not a person can hold two different offices representing two different groups. A person cannot be secretary to one group and GSR for another.

- We drank to get more confidence and became afraid.
- We drank to make conversation flow more easily and the words came out slurred and incoherent.
- We drank to diminish our problems and saw them multiply.
- We drank to feel heavenly and ended up feeling like hell.

THE CHAIN

There is a curious and beautiful similarity, in my imagination, between the food chain of the oceans and the nourishment for our lives available to us in A.A. Anyone who has been exposed to the sea and its environs soon learns that there is a marvelous, mystical and delicately interlocked sequence of nutrients that begins with one cell plankton and ends with common bait fish. That chain is the vital life support system for the tremendous fish population. The oceans are very rich in these food chains and they are controlled by changes of temperature, tides and salinity amongst other things.

And so in A.A., there is available to us a rich source of nutrients for our minds and bodies. These too, are sometimes invisible and mysterious. We come to the programs hungry for relief, for change and for those actions and attitudes that will heal our wounds, soothe our frustrations and give us new life. We are taught that, if we stay, we will find the understanding, the growth and contentment we've been looking for; the food chain for our hungry souls.

As we progress, however slowly, each new understanding leads to new curiosities and growth. Each day, each step and each new lesson leads us towards an ever enlarging, ever richer source of contentment. This source of enrichment in the program of Alcoholics Anonymous is unlimited as it is in the ocean food chain. We will never learn all there is to know about the A.A. way of life. As the ocean continues to replenish its food supply through its mysterious formula, the A.A. program continues to enlarge its meaning and rewards for us as we find them.

Perhaps this marvelous and sometimes mysterious source of new life for alcoholics is fed by the continuous arrival of new members and their experiences that we share. Maybe, as members mature, they add their unique and individual concepts to the A.A. story. And, certainly, the old timers add their wisdom to the richness of the program. And so the chain is established within the A.A. program from the newcomers, through the immense variety of members at various stages of their growth, to the older, more mature and wiser members. This chain offers the vital life support system to each alcoholic as he moves through the program. No matter what stage he is at in the program, the right kind of nourishment is there for him to have, if he wants it.

If this comparison between the life support systems in the oceans and our A.A. program has any truth or purpose, it is because our Higher Power created them for us to use. Our own ability to recognize and use this source of enrichment is another gift, another promise kept and another miracle taking place within the program of Alcoholics Anonymous.

THE EARLIEST BEGINNINGS (Part One of a Series)

Last year the Houston Intergroup Office sent the Central Service Office a packet of copies of correspondence between early San Antonio AAs and the New York office. Donna T. has summarized the material, which will run as a series in the Nightcap.

We are celebrating the 39th anniversary of AA in San Antonio, putting its beginnings here in 1945, after World War II.

However. . .

AA actually made its first, albeit brief, appearance, in San Antonio in 1941. Then the fellowship appears to have largely died out during the war.

After the war, as we know, it reappeared to stay.

The earliest beginnings:

Less than two weeks after the appearance of the now-famous Jack Alexander article in the Saturday Evening Post on March 1, 1941, the New York office received its first inquiry from San Antonio.

The letter-writer was Jack Disosway, who described himself as "a fellow sufferer for a great many years." He said that he had found that "a good therapy . . . is in helping others" and he requested literature and information about how to contact a local group.

Ruth Hock, General Service Office Secretary in New York, answered his letter by April 1, expressing regret that there was "No AA fellowship in San Antonio" and offering "to extend all possible cooperation by mail."

Ruth immediately began referring San Antonio inquiries about AA to Jack.

Jack sent for a copy of the Big Book on April 23. On May 19 he received some pamphlets and reprints from Ruth.

Jack wrote to thank her for the material. He wrote, "Our group is still wet behind the ears. However, we have great hopes, the two of us here at the present time, of becoming a factor in the lives of a great many here."

He added that the fledgling AAs had the support of "a person who is of great influence in the community, an Episcopal minister of one of our larger churches." The minister turned out to be the Rev. Everett Jones.

"He meets with us each week, and is terribly interested in our work, seeing

in it, of course as we do, the hand of THE MAN."

The second AA member in San Antonio, Jack D. said, "is doing a fine job for himself in a small hotel job and I feel sure he will never have another relapse."

The man was Henry K., and his place of employment was the old Jefferson Hotel.

On May 26, Jack D. asked that the New York office address AA correspondence to:

Fellowship of AA
Care General Delivery
San Antonio, TEX.

"One reason for our asking this is that San Antonio is a small place, full of racketeers of every sort, and we do not wish to have this thing exploited. . ."

The group started meeting weekly by June 21.

Of a prospect whose name Ruth had sent to San Antonio, Jack D. wrote:

"We really had a hell of a time with that fellow! We have had him sober for two weeks now, after several bad relapses, and last night, for the first time in three years, on his payday, he took his mother and his wife to a picture show! I am as proud of that as if I had laid an egg."

Unfortunately for San Antonio AA, Jack D. moved to El Paso in July of 1941 to work for the American Red Cross.

Henry K. wrote to New York that the little local group was doing all it could but that they couldn't equal Jack D.'s efforts.

"When Jack was here he gave practically all his time to this work," Henry explained.
