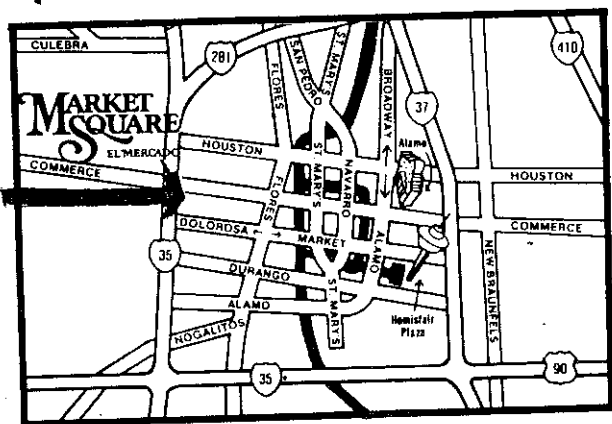
The Night Owls Group now meets Saturday as well as Friday at the Winners Club. Open meeting, 10 p.m.

Fred D. Reports on the Pre-Conference Assembly

Several topics concerning the well-being of Alcoholics Anonymous in the Southwest Area were discussed and commented upon in New Braunfels recently.

An impressive turnout of one hundred or more concerned and informed AA members - 30 from San Antonio - listened and learned.

The purpose of the Pre-Conference Assembly is to give the Delegate, Jim R. who represents the AA groups of the Southwest Area at the General Service Conference, a feel for what is and is not being accomplished by these groups here in South Texas.

The General Service Conference meets annually in New York City in April. The Conference consists of all AA Delegates, Trustees, and the staff of the General Service Office (GSO). During the meetings these well-informed alcoholics and non-alcoholics (who are members of the Board of Trustees) sit down and take the Fellowship's inventory.

The General Service Conference is a working week, for those involved, not a pleasant, casual, sight-seeing trip to the Big Apple.

Even though most of us realize our Fellowship was brought about by and is governed by a loving God, as It may express Itself in our informed Group Conscience, the Conference prevents the Fellowship from being misguided by an uninformed Group Conscience.

This is extremely important to those of us who love and cherish this program and who through service work try to safeguard the program for those who are being born today and will need our program twenty or thirty years from now. So much for one day at a time.

To give you an idea of some of the business which took place -

After some discussion both pro and con, a vote was taken concerning the opinion of

the Southwest Area, through the representative GSRs, on the subject of drug addicts (who are not alcoholics) taking part in AA.

The exact statement that was voted on reads as follows: "Non-alcoholic drug addicts do not meet AA's one membership requirement - 'the desire to stop drinking' - and therefore are not eligible for AA membership." Ninety-five percent of the GSRs supported this statement.

If you will read this statement carefully, we did not vote to deny any dually-addicted persons membership. The point is AA is for people whose primary problem is alcoholism and these are the people AA is designed to help.

So much for avoiding controversy. Enjoy your resentments, those of you who don't agree. That was the vote and if you weren't there to state your opinion, maybe you will see the wisdom of service work later on in your recovery.

So, to wrap this up, sobriety in AA beyond the group level can be both informative and exciting. The communication line between the group and the Conference is vitally important and, if your group does not have an informed General Service Representative, volunteer yourself - come to the monthly GSR meeting on Sunday night April 21 at 7 p.m. at Club 12.

Finally, there will be two more Service Assemblies this year - one for the Delegate's report on the Conference (probably in May) and another for an important election assembly held in San Antonio in October.

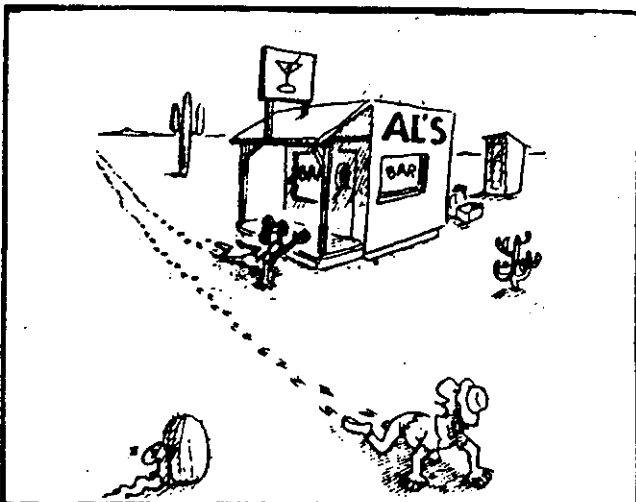

Sorry folks, forgot your religious views are your own. We do have a group that meets on Wednesday nights at 7:00 that originally thought it would be a support group for Religious, but since their habits (goofed again) are clearly identifiable to other members of AA, they decided to just be an "old time AA group."

The Oblate Group meets at the student center behind the college, located between Blanco Road and San Pedro, on Oblate Drive.

The round table discussion includes all topics (occasionally even sex), but according to Brother Danna, religion is never discussed.

The Boerne Group has elected a new GSR, Johnny S. The New Hope Group has moved into 1B; it meets in a halfway house on Mistletoe Street.

The GSRs in 1B voted that as a district we were opposed to signing court-ordered attendance slips, but would support a central meeting held for court-ordered attendance.

The GSRs also had no objection to the redistricting plan for a new subdistrict (1F) made up of Spanish-speaking groups in San Antonio.

I visited the Medical Professions group and read the Quarterly Report from GSO about the statement that has been proposed for inclusion in several pamphlets suggesting that nonalcoholic drug addicts are not eligible for AA membership. The Medical Professions group voted unanimously that they opposed that statement; their opposition was reported to the Area Delegate.

The next District 1B GSR meeting will be at 7 p.m. April 18 at Club 12.

In the early 1970s, after at last acknowledging to myself that I was an alcoholic, I joined a group of admitted alcoholics who were dedicated to helping others achieve sobriety.

One night, at the close of the Tuesday meeting for newcomers, we got a call from the landlady of a transients' hotel in a part of town known as Wino Gulch. Would someone come talk to a man lying drunk in one of the rooms?

Two of us volunteered to go. When we reached the hotel we were led to a squalid little room where a grizzled oldster lay on the bed in a stupor. *What's the use of talking to this man at all?* I wondered. But my partner, an old hand at such visits, patiently talked to the semiconscious form on the bed. He explained that he himself had once been considered a hopeless drunk — but that by turning his life and will over to a Higher Power, he had gained both sobriety and serenity. "I'm leaving my card," my partner said. "I'd like you to attend a meeting at this address."

"That was a real waste of time," I grumbled as we departed.

"You never know," my partner said cheerfully. "God's always at work."

At our next meeting, a shaky but sober young man came up to us. "Thank you for coming to Wino Gulch that night," he said. "You saved my life."

We stared in astonishment. "We saw the old man on that bed very clearly," my partner said. "It wasn't you."

"That's right," the young man said, holding out the card we had left. "But I heard every word you said. I was under the bed."

Alcoholic employees who undergo treatment should be forgiven for pre-treatment alcohol related misconduct, a U.S. court says. The court found that the Department of Defense failed to accommodate an employee when, in deciding to fire him, it took into account both his pretreatment alcohol related behavior and post-treatment absences from work unrelated to alcohol. The court said that holding pre-treatment transgressions against him violated the Rehabilitation Act of 1973's legislative perception of alcoholism as a disease. (U.S. News & World Report, March 11, 1985, p. 77).

Dr. John L. Phipps was appointed Executive Director of the ARC of Bexar County, effective February 26.

The ARC is located on Southton Road, just outside Loop 410, and is a halfway house for male alcoholics.

Dr. Phipps said that the principal service of the ARC is to provide support for men who had "hit bottom," were jobless and without families. The ARC provides shelter, food and clothing and counseling. Participation in AA is emphasized.

## UNDER THE INFLUENCE

The book "Under the Influence," by Dr. James R. Milam and Katherine Ketcham (Bantam Books), clearly points out that the accumulated evidence from all the life sciences positively indicates that physiology, not psychology, determines whether a drinker will become addicted to alcohol or not. The alcoholic's genes, enzymes, hormones, brain and other body chemistries work together to create his abnormal and unfortunate reaction to alcohol. This concept has not been and is not now understood or accepted by many alcoholism professionals who seem committed to the concept that alcoholism is, at least in part, caused by social, cultural, and psychological factors and is therefore treatable through mental health methods such as various psychotherapies and behavior modification techniques. --From a review
