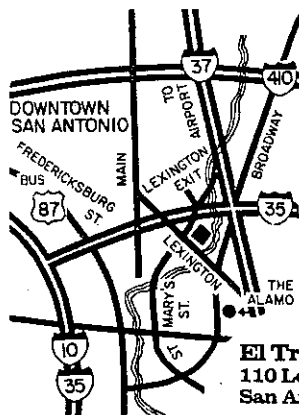

It has been nearly 3 years since your Central Service Office began distributing THE NIGHTCAP free of charge to anyone who asked for it. The reason for the action was to keep the general membership better informed of local AA events and CSO activities.

This objective has certainly been met. About 6 months prior to "free" distribution, the subscription rate was reduced from \$12 per year to \$5. At that time there were approximately 500 people receiving THE NIGHTCAP. Last month we mailed out 1,350 copies.

Both printing and mailing costs have increased since 1986. When free distribution of THE NIGHTCAP was started, it was anticipated that increasing group contributions would keep pace with increasing costs. THIS HAS NOT HAPPENED. In fact, group contributions to CSO in 1988 were 5 percent less than 1987 contributions.

Some groups contribute nothing to the operational costs of your Central Service Office. If all groups accepted responsibility for the AA service structure, and supported it in the spirit of the AA pamphlet "Supporting the AA Support System," there would not be a problem.

The CSO Board of Trustees continually reviews income and expenses. If group contributions do not increase on a sustained basis, it may be necessary to revert to a subscription charge for THE NIGHTCAP. We hope this action is not necessary, but a decision must be made by August 1989. Reaction to this article will certainly influence the decision.

GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING MINUTES

MARCH 19, 1989

The meeting was opened at 6:35 p.m. by Bob T., Vice-Chairman, with the Serenity Prayer. The Traditions were read by Steve. Fifty-four persons were present, including 6 new GSRs. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved with no corrections. After-hour telephone volunteers were obtained (see list below).

Committee reports were as follows: Wayne B., Finance, presented a very comprehensive report and answered questions; Hoyt S., H&I, reported some problems with Metropolitan Hosp. but has resolved same--obtained volunteers for taking meetings to various H&I's; Robin L., PI, reported that 167 persons were spoken to in February by 21 volunteers; also, over 400 letters were mailed out to the clergy last week; John B., Jail, reported that now that the old jail is renovated, they are going to begin working with drug addicts before they want a program for alcoholics--he also asked for old Grapevines to be brought to CSO for the jail. Jim W., Convention, reported that 255 pre-registrations have been received; Vangie needs volunteers for registration; Debbie is in charge of hosts & hostesses; he will see about getting the use of parking lot belonging to Baptist Church; the banquet will be held at 6:15 p.m. on Saturday on the 3rd floor in the Continental room; coffee drinkers will be asked for \$3 for entire weekend. Jack S., Mailing, absent (report in CSO Report).

OLD BUSINESS: All taken care of in convention report.

NEW BUSINESS: Subscription fee for THE NIGHTCAP was discussed and article read which will be published in next issue. Responsibility of after-hour telephone duty volunteers was stressed and hand-out provided for GSR's regarding same. Pre-General Service Conference Workshop will not conflict with the April General Membership Meeting scheduled for April 16.

CSO REPORT: February phone calls totaled 925; 284 after hours; 1341 issues of THE NIGHTCAP were mailed for March at a cost of \$106.44 postage--18 returned. Reminder cards sent to GSR's for this meeting.

DCM REPORTS: 1-A: Donna T. reported 42 people attended last workshop; the next workshop is tentatively set for May 3; will have regular monthly meeting on 1st Sat. of each month at 1:30 p.m., Winners Club. 1-B: Sam R. announced his district's meeting on Sat. following this meeting at 9:15 a.m., Club 12--they are studying the Traditions. 1-C: Dean V. announced they co-sponsored workshop with 1-A & had meeting before tonight's meeting; discussed future workshop topics. 1-D: Vacant. 1-E: Absent. 1-F: Jose G. announced that a district meeting will be held on April 2nd at 3210 W. Commerce.

# The Fourth Tradition

*Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or A.A. as a whole.*

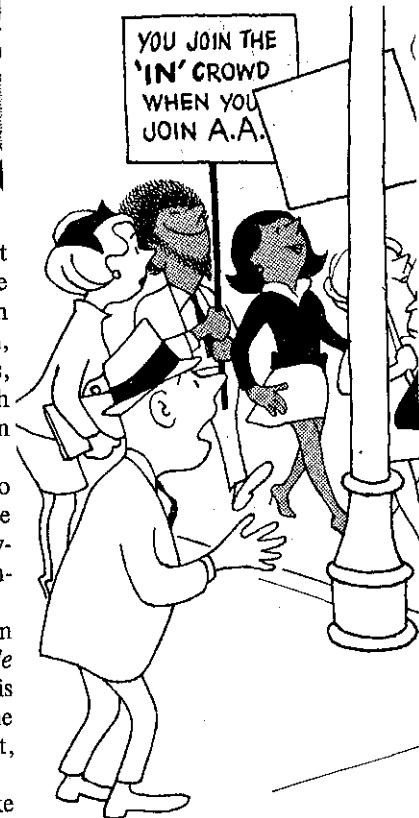
But wherever two or more alcoholics are gathered together to practice A.A. principles, it is an A.A. group if they say it is.



And you are a member if you say you are!



YOU JOIN THE 'IN' CROWD WHEN YOU JOIN A.A.



A member who does any amount of traveling finds the A.A. spirit much the same everywhere. But apart from this inward kinship, there are vast differences among groups. Here, the traveler finds three members discussing the Steps in somebody's living room; there, 300 listening to speakers in a church auditorium. In one part of the U.S., respectful silence greets the speaker who begins, "My name is Ann, and I am an alcoholic." In another, everybody happily shouts, "Hi, Ann!" And in many other places, she may introduce herself with her full name—at a one-hour meeting or a 90-minute meeting. In each neighborhood in every part of the world reached by A.A., the local group is free to work out its own customs.

As always, freedom brings responsibility. Because each group *is* autonomous, it's up to each group to avoid any action that might harm A.A. And there *have* been such actions—or this Tradition would be unnecessary. "Implicit throughout A.A.'s Traditions," Bill W. wrote, "is the confession that our Fellowship has its sins. We admit that we have character defects as a society and these defects threaten us continually."

Blown up to multiple size, the Big Ego may inspire one group to take over all the public information work for its area, without consulting any of the other local groups. Once the group has decided, "We have all the answers," the lid's off. The group may then decide that, let's say, the Eleventh Tradition is an outdated technicality: "This is a competitive age! We're going to come right out and give A.A. some good, vigorous promoting!" To the general public, this one conspicuous group *is* A.A. Its antics reflect, not only on the ignored neighboring groups, but on the entire Fellowship.

In a way, the Fourth Tradition is like the Fourth Step: It suggests that the A.A. group should take honest inventory of itself, asking about each of its independently planned actions, "Would this break any Tradition?" Like the individual member who chooses to make the Steps his or her guide toward happy sobriety, the wise group recognizes that the Traditions are not hindering technicalities—they are proved guides toward the chief objective of all A.A. groups. . . .

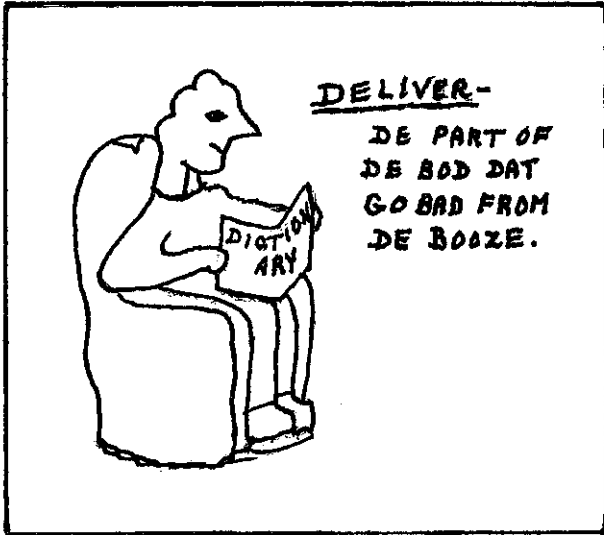

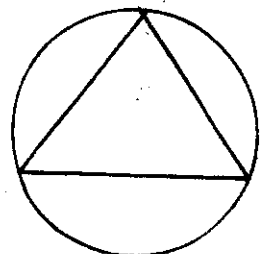

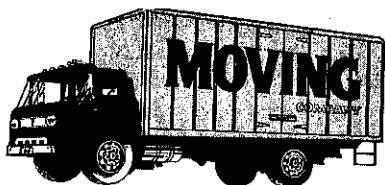
