GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING MINUTES

MARCH 18, 1990

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 p.m. with a moment of silence followed by the Serenity Prayer, by Bob T., Chairman. The 12 Traditions were read by Eva. There were four new GSRs present. A total of 58 persons attended the meeting. After the "Statement of Participation" was read, the secretary read the minutes of the previous meeting which were approved as read. Al D. presented the financial report for the month February. After-hour telephone volunteers were obtained (see list below) and the Chairman stressed the importance of volunteers remaining at home during their volunteered time.

Committee reports: H&I Chairman, Eileen G.V., asked for volunteers to take meetings to the hospitals and institutions (see list below). PI Chairman, Don N., reported the meeting at Medical Center is going well. Anyone interested in participating, call Patricia at 697-9175; the Special Projects subcommittee is going fine; Public Schools visited were South San Antonio Schools, Holmes, Judson, PTA Health Fair, and UTSA Health Fair. Judicial subcommittee is in the formation stage. 36 Lutheran Ministers were contacted; Young, Sober, & Free Group carried the message to Kennedy High School; budget for 1990 literature submitted for \$800. Jail Committee Chairman, John B., reported the meetings at the jail have doubled; needs old Grapevines and requested they be left at CSO; wants to re-start women's meetings and needs women volunteers for new jail--requirements are 1 year sobriety and no felonies--time of meetings is negotiable. If interested, call CSO, leave your name and phone number which will be passed on to John. Convention Committee Chairman, Vangie H., reported 276 pre-registrations have been received; volunteer turnout has been fabulous; brightly colored banners with each AA Group name will be hung in the ballroom.

OLD BUSINESS: Mac McC. reported 35 seats have been taken on the charter to the International Convention. The rest must be relinquished by April 4. If you want to go on this Charter, call Rennert Travel and ask for Nancy.

NEW BUSINESS: Chairman reminded everyone that we are expected to pay for coffee that we drink at this meeting.

Buying smoke-eaters, separating smokers from nonsmokers, or having a no-smoking General Membership Meeting was presented by Robin G. After some discussion, this was tabled until the April meeting when it will be on the agenda.

CSO REPORT: CSO received 751 phone calls with 323 received after hours = 1,074 total; 1408 copies of THE NIGHTCAP were mailed for March--21 returned; reminder cards mailed for GMM.

DCM REPORTS: 1-A: Mac McC., reported commending CSO at the pre-general service conference; all DCMs from District 1 were there; had a meeting of his GSRs and had a good turnout. 1-B: Richard O. reported his district will have a meeting right after this meeting. 1-C: Knut H. reported that Jeanne had resigned due to health reasons, so a new alternate is needed. Had a meeting just before this one. 1-D: Brenda H. attended the conference in Victoria and only one of her GSRs was there. Had a meeting discussing topics from pre-general service conference. St. Hedwig meeting has folded; La Vernia meeting is going great. 1-E: Jon K. reported a new meeting in Devine at 8 p.m. is going well--has 12 newcomers. 1-F: Yolanda F. reported that her alternate held their meeting and tabled everything; the Hispanic meeting held in Schertz has folded; thanked everyone for supporting the Spanish meetings in District 1. 1-G: Tom McM. reported that the next District Workshop will be held May 5. The Area Delegate, Bob McG., will be there to give his report from the General Service Conference. All DCMs will have a meeting right after this one. Had list of topics discussed in Victoria.

IT'S THE ONLY WAY TO FLY

Next fall, when you see geese heading south for the winter, flying along in V formation, you might be interested to know what science has discovered about why they fly that way. It has been learned that as each bird flaps his wings, it creates an uplift for the bird immediately following. By flying in a V formation, the whole flock adds at least 71 per cent greater flying range than if each bird flew on his own. (People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they are going quicker and easier because they are travelling on the thrust of one another.)

Whenever a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to go it alone and quickly gets into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird immediately ahead. (If we have as much sense as a goose, we will stay in formation with those who are heading the same way we are going.) When the lead goose gets tired, he rotates back to the wing and another goose flies point. (It pays to take turns doing hard jobs with other people.) The geese honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep up their speed. (What do we say when we honk from behind?)

Finally, when a goose gets sick, or is wounded by gunshots and falls out, two geese fall out of formation and follow him down to help and protect him. They stay with the stricken goose until he is either able to fly or until he is dead, and they then launch out on their own or with another formation to catch up with their flock. (If we have the sense of a goose, we will stand by each other like that.)

IF YOU'VE HAD A SLIP

If you've had a slip and you're back, you don't have to be consumed with shame. The important things are (1) that you are back and (2) that you realize you made some mistakes in the program. If you've had two slips and you're back, the same things apply and you should be aware that you may be establishing a negative pattern. If you keep on having and you're back, face up to it; you are doing something wrong and you are headed for disaster. A recovered alcoholic is not supposed to have slips. When you're listening to a speaker talk about a slip, listen for the cause: skipping meetings, not joining a group, not speaking, not getting into the Steps, or whatever. You can learn from a negative example, but don't learn the wrong thing: Slips are not part of the AA program of recovery any more than a second heart attack is part of the recovery from the first. Those who've made it back again can tell you how it gets worse. And then there are those who don't make it back.

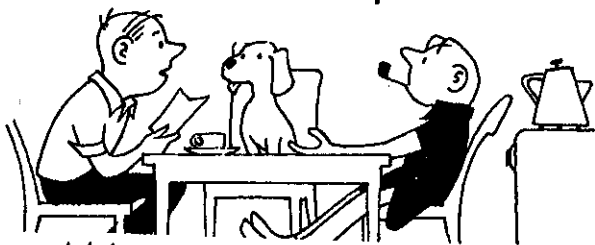

HILL COUNTRY ROUND-UP

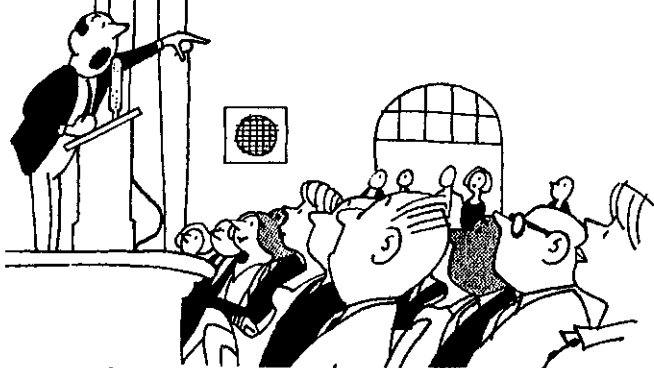

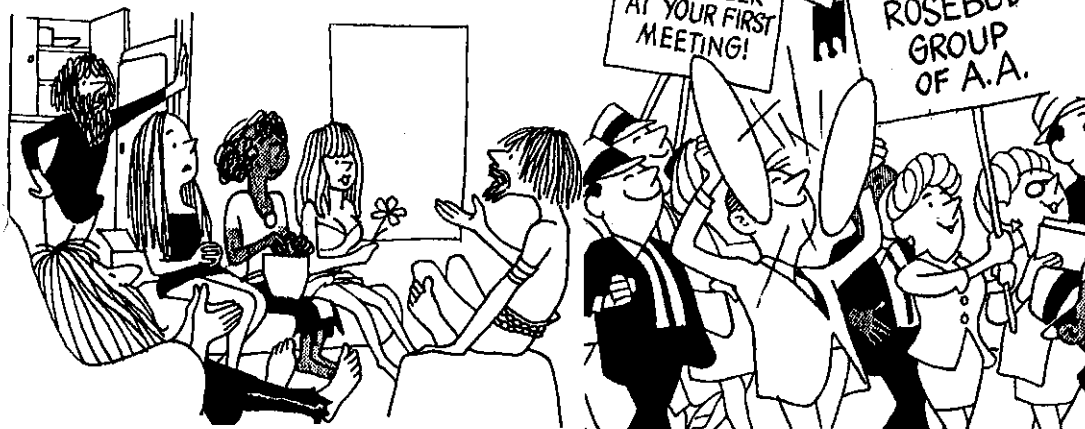

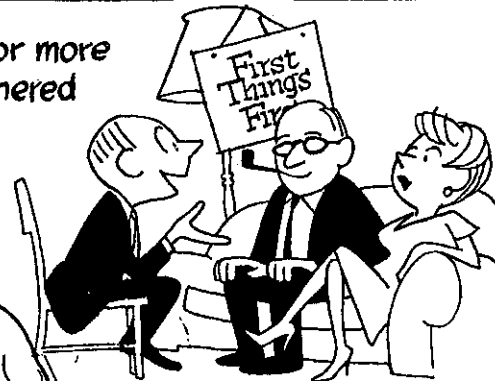

## The Fourth Tradition

Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or A.A. as a whole.

But wherever two or more alcoholics are gathered together to practice A.A. principles, it is an A.A. group if they say it is.



And you are a member if you say you are!



A member who does any amount of traveling finds the A.A. spirit much the same everywhere. But apart from this inward kinship, there are vast differences among groups. Here, the traveler finds three members discussing the Steps in somebody's living room; there, 300 listening to speakers in a church auditorium. In one part of the U.S., respectful silence greets the speaker who begins, "My name is Ann, and I am an alcoholic." In another, everybody happily shouts, "Hi, Ann!" And in many other places, she may introduce herself with her full name—at a one-hour meeting or a 90-minute meeting. In each neighborhood in every part of the world reached by A.A., the local group is free to work out its own customs.

As always, freedom brings responsibility. Because each group is autonomous, it's up to each group to avoid any action that might harm A.A. And there *have* been such actions—or this Tradition would be unnecessary. "Implicit throughout A.A.'s Traditions," Bill W. wrote, "is the confession that our Fellowship has its sins. We admit that we have character defects as a society and these defects threaten us continually."

Blown up to multiple size, the Big Ego may inspire one group to take over all the public information work for its area, without consulting any of the other local groups. Once the group has decided, "We have all the answers," the lid's off. The group may then decide that, let's say, the Eleventh Tradition is an outdated technicality: "This is a competitive age! We're going to come right out and give A.A. some good, vigorous promoting!" To the general public, this one conspicuous group is A.A. Its antics reflect, not only on the ignored neighboring groups, but on the entire Fellowship.

In a way, the Fourth Tradition is like the Fourth Step: It suggests that the A.A. group should take a yearly inventory of itself, asking about each of its independently planned actions, "Would this break any Tradition?" Like the individual member who chooses to make the Steps his or her guide toward happy sobriety, the wise group recognizes that the Traditions are not hindering technicalities—they are proved guides toward the chief objective of all A.A. groups. . . .

A Person fell into a pit and couldn't get out. Several people came by and each, in turn, looked down into the pit.

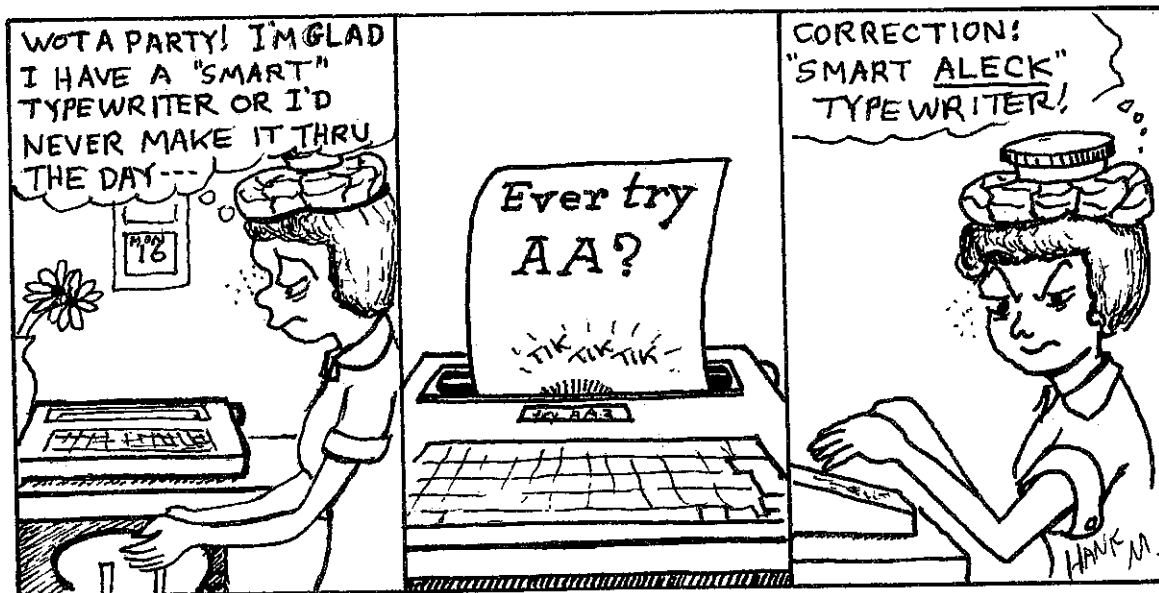

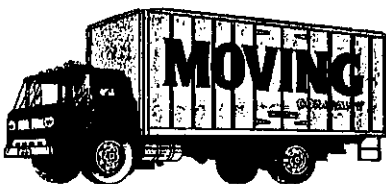
