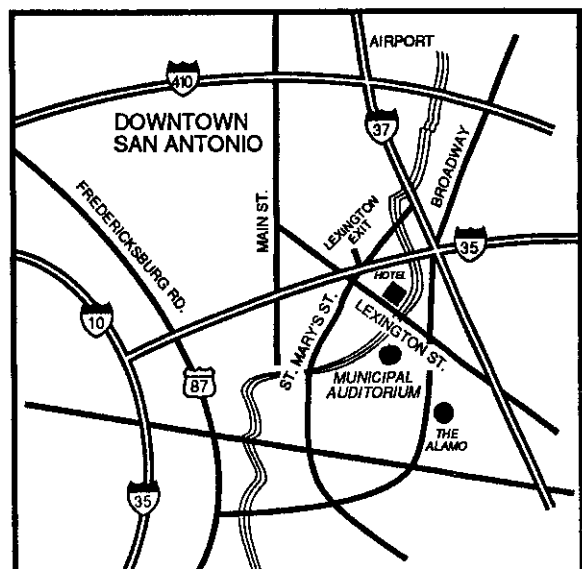

GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING MINUTES

March 17, 1991

The meeting was opened with the Serenity Prayer by Lalo A., Chairman, at 6:30 p.m. The Twelve Traditions were read by Randy. The check-in sheet was circulated and 62 persons were present, including two new GSR's, Annie from Northwood and Sherry from Sunset. After the "Statement of Participation" was read, the minutes of the previous meeting were accepted as printed in the March issue of THE NIGHTCAP. The financial report was presented by Al D., which spawned few questions. Volunteers for after-hour phone duty were obtained (see list, below).

Committee reports were as follows: Eileen, H&I Chairman, absent--Mary O. asked for volunteers to go to various hospitals and institutions (see list below). Don N., PI Chairman, absent, Eric C. reported that Nimitz Middle School was visited last month. Flynn J., Jail Chairman, absent. Bill T., Convention Chairman, brought fliers and explained the layout of the auditorium where all meetings will be held. He announced that baby-sitting will be available during speakers meetings; Debbie G. is in charge of the Hospitality Room which will be in the Exhibit Area and donations of food are needed. Bill needs more volunteers for various jobs. The hotel has confirmed that it will be open by April 2; T-shirts are selling well and registration is going well. Old Business: None.

New Business: Lalo asked John P. to explain CSO's proposed incorporation. John explained that CSO has never been incorporated, and that for liability purposes, the Board of Trustees has voted that it should be. The lawyer who attended the last board meeting will do the legal work free of charge. After much discussion, Knut H. moved that CSO go ahead with the incorporation; Rocky B. seconded the motion which carried by majority vote.

CSO Report: CSO mailed 1540 copies of the March issue of THE NIGHTCAP and 32 were returned. Ninety-eight reminder cards were mailed for the General Membership Meeting. The number of telephone calls received at the office during February was 755 and 328 were received after hours, making a total of 1,083. An increase in literature prices will be effective 4-1-91--new price lists will be brought to the next GMM, April 21, 1991.

DCM Report: Knut H., DCM, District 17, announced that the Fresh Start Group meets on Sunday at 8 p.m. at Wurzbach and Ironside. The SWTX Area Pre-General Service Conference will be held at the Holiday Inn in Victoria, March 23-24. The Area Delegate will be going to New York in April to discuss issues on how we feel, and will appreciate input from the groups. Jim W., from Dallas, will speak at the Holiday Inn at 8 p.m. on March 23.

Announcements: District 1-A reported their workshop on 3-16-91 (which was erroneously reported as an "Interdistrict workshop" in the March NIGHTCAP) was most successful with 73 attendees who drank 14 gallons of coffee and ate 6 dozen donuts.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 7:25 p.m. with The Lord's Prayer.

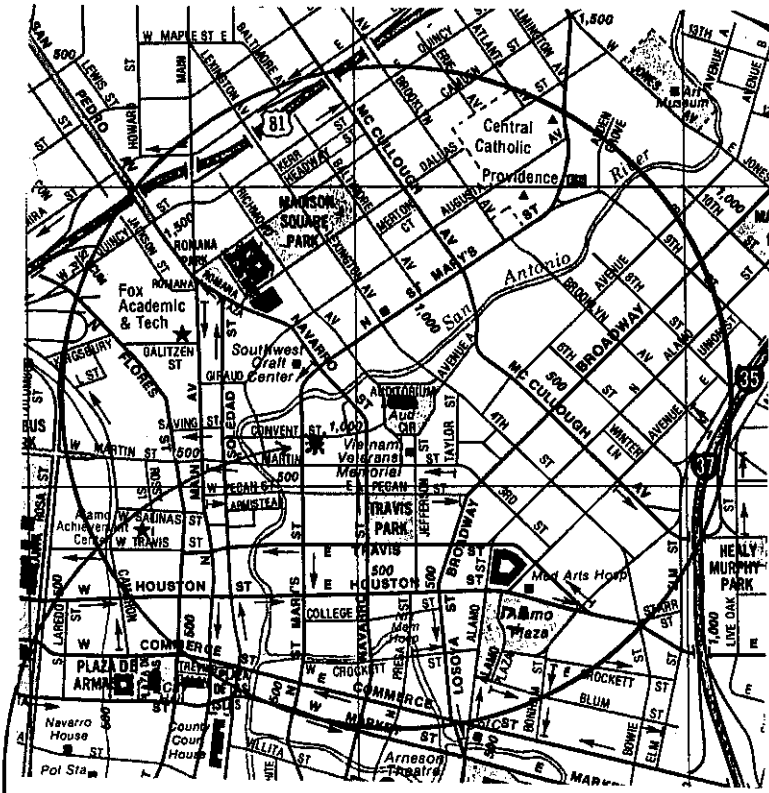

I don't remember when I met Charlie, it might have been over at the old Goliad Group, but I do remember how much I admired him from the first time I heard him talk. You see, Charlie had gone on much further in his alcoholism than I had. He had actually slept under bridges, in public parks and in Hobo Jungles and had ridden freight trains, and panhandled all across America. Charlie had a thousand stories he could tell about his adventures with alcohol and you knew when he told them that they were true. That was one of the things about Charlie, I don't think he ever told a lie, he took his sobriety seriously, and when he told a story he always included the down-side caused by his alcoholism. I always laughed at the way he pronounced alcohol, "al-ke-hall."

Charlie told one story where he was living in a Hobo Jungle, back east, when a hobo came in and told about a town in Oregon that was a good deal for "alkies." He liked the story so much that he hopped the next freight going west and in a couple of days was in that town in Oregon. He said all the bars in town had a custom, the first drink, a double shot, was on the house; bars lined both sides of the three downtown blocks. So, he (and other alkies) would start out each day with a trip into each bar to get those free double shots and by the time they finished with the third block, they were ready to sleep the rest of the day. They would stagger into the public park and sleep until the next morning. Charlie said this town became famous in the Hobo Jungles and it wasn't long before the town was flooded with alkies, so the police would only allow them to stay one day.

Charlie urged and helped get Al-Anon started at the old Goliad. He always supported Al-Anon and went to bat for them more than once. He was group chairman of the Goliad a few times and did an excellent job. He helped an awful lot of people in the Program with small loans, clothing, furniture, etc., but he never told anyone about it. I bought a sweater from him about a month before he left, because it had "Colorado" on it. When I told him my wife was from Colorado, he gave me a Denver Bronco's hat to give to her. She saw him later to thank him and he told her that he was getting rid of a lot of things and was getting his things in order. She felt that he was expecting something to happen to him.

Charlie was a good friend and a good man. I'll think of him when anyone tells a hobo story or talks about "al-ke-hall." He is probably in the company of many of his friends who also left us many memories, and they have formed a group called "The Heavenly Friends of Goliad."

Reserve me a chair, Charlie, and someday I hope to join your group and again thank all of you for my sobriety and the good life you and the Program allowed me to have.

## Concept IV

Throughout our Conference structure, we ought to maintain at all responsible levels a traditional "Right of Participation," taking care that each classification or group of our world servants shall be allowing a voting representation in reasonable proportion to the responsibility that each must discharge.

The principle of "Right of Participation" is built into the General Service Conference through the Conference Charter. Voting members include not only delegates, but also the trustees, and the directors and staff members of A.A. World Services (i.e., G.S.O.) and the A.A. Grapevine.

In the same way, the boards of these two operating entities include as voting members not only trustees, but also nontrustee directors and paid administrators and staff members.

The chairperson of the General Service Board appoints nontrustee members to the standing committees in order to have the advantage of their expertise, and staff members serve as committee secretaries. "There are no 'superiors,' no 'inferiors,' and no 'advisers.'" New trustees on the General Service Board and new directors of the A.A.W.S. and Grapevine boards are sometimes surprised to see paid executives, staff members and outside accountants attending the board meetings. They are invited because of A.A.'s "Right of Participation." Thus, the trustees and directors "are put into direct communication with these workers, who...feel wanted and needed. Although they do not vote, these workers may freely participate."

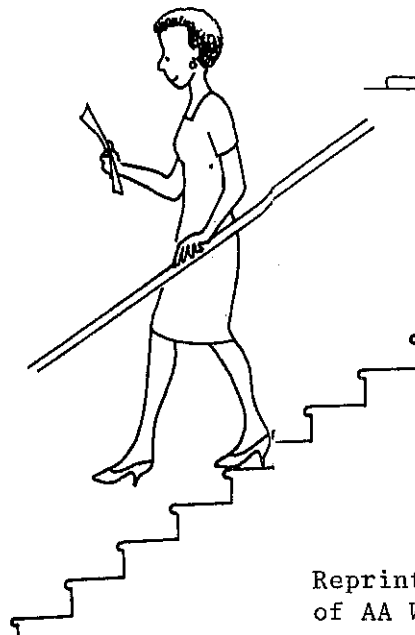
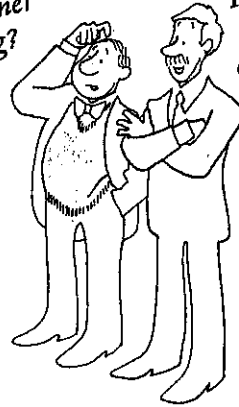
Bill warns against the possibility of new delegates or trustees trying to "weaken, modify or toss out" the "Right of Participation." He cites arguments by delegates to take away the trustees', directors' and staff members' votes at the Conference. "Certainly," he says, "our trustees and service workers are not less conscientious, experienced and wise than the delegates."

"It is vital," he continues, "to preserve the traditional 'Right of Participation,' in the face of every tendency to whittle it down."

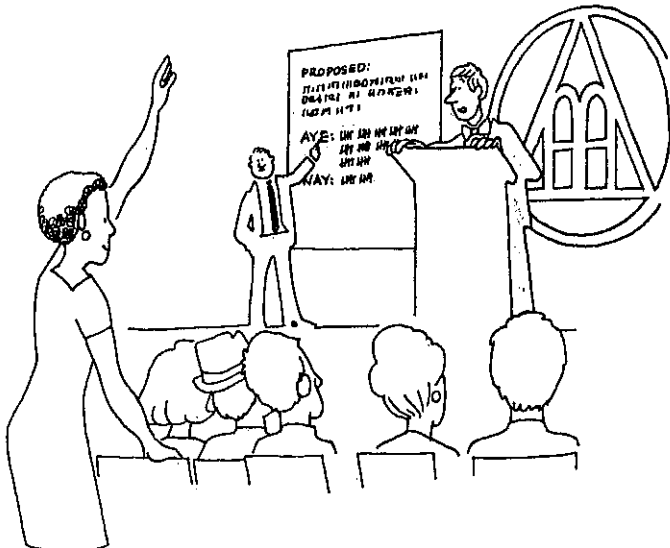
Finally, there is a spiritual reason for the "Right of Participation." All of us desire to belong. In A.A., no members are "second class." The "Right of Participation" therefore reinforces Tradition Two, that no member is placed in "ultimate authority" over another. We perform our service tasks better "when we are sure we belong—when our 'participation' assures us we are truly the 'trusted servants' described in Tradition Two."

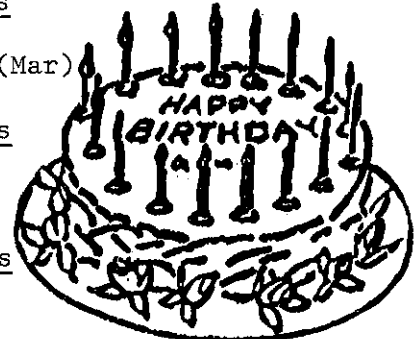

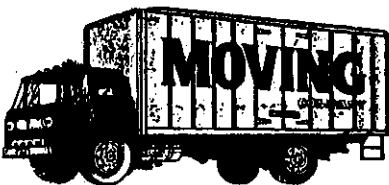
