REACH OUT AND TOUCH SOMEONE. . .

I was feeling guilty about not making 12th-Step calls so I asked my sponsor about it.

"There are many ways we can carry the message," he replied, "besides making 12th-Step calls."

"For instance?" I asked.

"Just by being sober you are carrying the message. When people see how you have changed, they are impressed and they may wonder what happened. If they ask, tell them. Another way of carrying the message is by attending meetings. Your very presence there adds strength to the fabric of our fellowship. When you speak and share your experience, strength and hope with others, they will get the message."

"But what about people who are shy and seldom say anything?"

"They too can contribute. Many times the message is carried before and after the meeting. Those who arrange the room and make coffee and cake are setting the scene for newcomers to find confidence and comfort in the laughter and talk among the group members."

"That sounds easier than making 12th 12th-Step calls."

"Well, some of us are just not suited for 12th-Step calls but every one of us can carry the message in some way. One of the easiest ways is to call people on the phone just to say hello, especially if they have been ill or you haven't seen them for a while."

"That sounds like a good idea."

"Yes. Or you can drop them a note or send something interesting you have clipped from the paper or a magazine. Basically, it's just keeping in contact. Reach out and touch someone."

"But what about helping the newcomer?"

"That, of course, is vital. It's a matter of life or death in many cases. I need to do all I can to help new members -- visit them, give them literature, listen to their story, be compassionate, take them to a few meetings and keep in touch. I try to get them off to a good start by showing my enthusiasm for our fellowship."

"So there are many ways to carry the message."

"Right. I just have to be ready when the opportunity comes. If I am willing,

the Higher Power will send me plenty to do. I speak from experience. I just have to be ready and willing to respond when I hear the call. I need to be ready to reach out and touch someone."

CENTRAL SERVICE OFFICE COMMITTEE MEETING -- CLUB 12, JULY 21, 1985

Donna T. of the Alamo Heights Group, meeting chairman, introduced new GSRs Jesse B. of the Frontier Group and Margaret of the Mobud Round Table Meeting.

Jim D. presented CSO Administrative Board reports as follows:

FINANCIAL: Sunny M. has completed putting the CSO books on the CSO office computer and has resigned in order to be free to travel. Due to an impending rate increase in literature, the CSO has purchased an excessive amount of literature. Thus, this month's statement reflects a deficit. CSO contributions are down; special emphasis was given to the 60-30-10 handout on suggestions for distributing groups' money.

HOSPITALS AND INSTITUTIONS: Sylvia O. reported that Brookwood Recovery Center has been asked to be put on the H & I list for Saturday night speaker meetings. Groups volunteered for August H & I meetings. (See schedule at end of minutes.)

PENAL: Don S. stated there was very little to report.

PUBLIC INFORMATION: Jerri McC. will mail in her report.

EDITORIAL: Absent.

MAILING: Al M. present, no report.

A visitor from California shared with the GSRs how extra money for hospitals and jails was collected simply by putting a pink can on the table at meetings. He reported this was very helpful with literature purchases.

OLD BUSINESS:

Jim W. reported to the GSRs on the August 31 miniconference. (See Page One of this issue of the Nightcap.)

NEW BUSINESS:

Donna T. asked the GSRs to consider candidates for financial chairman. Donna also reported that there is a problem with the office's copier. It is not equipped to handle big jobs, such as the Nightcap, and breaks down frequently. The service contract has expired and the renewal will cost about \$900 per year. It was felt that the reason the machine is exhausted is due to printing the Nightcap. At the suggestion of the board, bids were solicited for printing the Nightcap by various print shops. A motion was made, seconded, and approved authorizing CSO to farm out the Nightcap printing to the lowest bidder.

ABOUT ALCOHOLISM

The Myth and the Reality

(From: Under The Influence: A Guide to the Myths and Realities of Alcoholism, Dr. James R. Milan and Katherine Ketcham, Bantam Books, 1983.)

MYTH: Alcohol is predominantly a sedative or depressant drug.

REALITY: Alcohol's pharmacological effects change with the amount drunk. In small quantities, alcohol is a stimulant. In large quantities, alcohol acts as a sedative. In all amounts, however, alcohol provides a rich and potent source of calories and energy.

MYTH: Alcohol has the same chemical and physiological effect on everyone who drinks.

REALITY: Alcohol, like every other food we take into our bodies, affects different people in different ways.

MYTH: Alcohol is an addictive drug, and anyone who drinks long and hard enough will become addicted.

REALITY: Alcohol is a selectively addictive drug; it is addictive for only a minority of its users, namely, alcoholics. Most people can drink occasionally, daily, even heavily, without becoming addicted to alcohol. Others (alcoholics) will become addicted no matter how much they drink.

MYTH: Alcohol is harmful and poisonous to the alcoholic.

REALITY: Alcohol is a normalizing agent and the best medicine for the pain it creates, giving the alcoholic energy, stimulation, and relief from the pain of withdrawal. Its harmful and poisonous after effects are most evident when the alcoholic stops drinking.

MYTH: Addiction to alcohol is often psychological.

REALITY: Addiction to alcohol is primarily physiological. Alcoholics become addicted because their bodies are physiologically incapable of processing alcohol normally.

MYTH: People become alcoholics because they have psychological or emotional problems which they try to relieve by drinking.

REALITY: Alcoholics have the same psychological and emotional problems as everyone else before they start drinking. These problems are aggravated, however, by their addiction to alcohol. Alcoholism undermines and weakens the alcoholic's ability to cope with the normal problems of living. Furthermore, the alcoholic's emotions become inflamed both when he drinks excessively and when he stops drinking. Thus, when he is drinking and when he is abstinent, he will feel angry, fearful, and depressed in exaggerated degrees.

MYTH: All sorts of social problems - marriage problems, a death in the family, job stress - may cause alcoholism.

REALITY: As with all psychological and emotional problems, alcoholics experience all the social pressures everyone else does, but their ability to cope is undermined by the disease and the problems get worse.

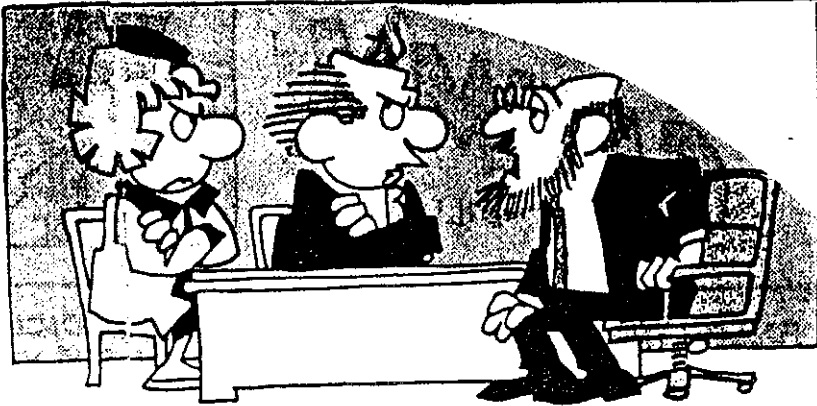
MYTH: When the alcoholic is drinking, he reveals his true personality.

REALITY: Alcohol's effect on the brain causes severe psychological and emotional distortions of the normal personality. Sobriety reveals the alcoholic's true personality.

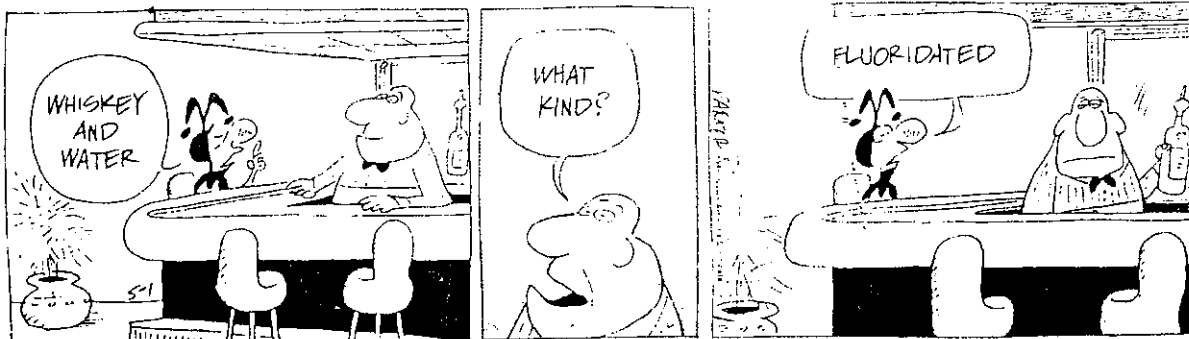
