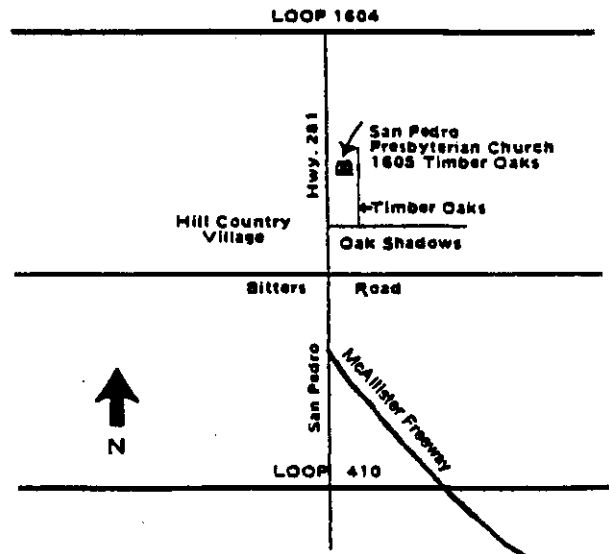

CSO GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING  
CLUB 12, JULY 17, 1988

# When a Meeting Is Not a Group

"The A.A. group has been called the basic unit of our Fellowship and the foundation upon which A.A. stands," delegate Jack C., Southern Minnesota, reminded Conference members. "Perhaps that is why we so zealously guard our definition of a group. There's such a proliferation of different kinds of meetings that we fear our message will be diluted."

He explained that, while all A.A. groups hold meetings, not all meetings are A.A. groups. The A.A. group as we usually think of it, he said, fulfills six points defined by the group conscience of A.A. in the U.S. and Canada: 1) All members of the group are alcoholics and all alcoholics are eligible for membership; 2) As a group, members are fully self-supporting; 3) A group's primary purpose is to help alcoholics recover through the Twelve Steps; 4) The group has no outside affiliation; 5) The group has no opinion on outside issues; 6) The group's public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion, and maintains personal anonymity at the level of press, radio, TV and films. Also listed by the General Service Office are specialized groups — for men, women, gays, young people, doctors, etc. — which hold meetings in which only recovery from alcoholism through the A.A. program is discussed.

"Some A.A.s," Jack says, "meet clearly as A.A. groups; some just hold meetings — to discuss some problem in addition to alcohol, such as drug abuse and smoking; and still others gather together as family groups that include A.A.s and nonalcoholic family members and friends." Jack notes that "the most important area of distinction is singleness of purpose. The groups defined as A.A., along with the specialized groups, consist of alcoholics only and, consequently, can profess to one purpose: helping alcoholics recover from alcoholism. Also, because their memberships consist solely of alcoholics, these groups may contribute to the support of A.A. service entities throughout the service structure. However, the 'family gatherings,' which may include nonalcoholics and thus dilute A.A.'s singularity of purpose, are considered meetings, not groups. Their contributions, coming as they must partly from non-A.A. members, cannot be accepted by the various service entities of the Fellowship."

It is also important, Jack cautions, to understand that not every entity calling itself Alcoholics Anonymous is in fact A.A. "Some treatment centers call their aftercare A.A.," he says, "yet their meetings are restricted to alumni of the facility. Such meetings frequently include nonalcoholic drug addicts and do not participate in carrying the message as suggested by A.A. This is a clear case of institutional affiliation and disqualifies these meetings from holding group status."

Why does A.A. take care to make such distinctions? The answer may be summed in one powerful word: identification. When the chips are down, A.A. experience shows the alcoholic need to identify with others — to speak the "language of the heart" as Bill W. put it — is a requisite to lasting recovery.

Importantly, the need of other "addicts" for a primary identification appears as strong. This is one reason why A.A. gladly cooperates with other mutual help organizations. By letting them adapt our program to their purpose, we can fulfill ours: to stay sober and help other alcoholics to achieve sobriety.

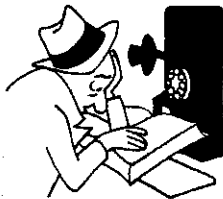


**The Eighth Tradition**  
*Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional, but our service centers may employ special workers.*



Spiritual as it is, A.A. remains very much of this world. The Eighth Tradition, like the Seventh, focuses on a vulgar five-letter word that isn't actually mentioned in either: money. Many of us have had to explain to some cynical prospect, "No, I'm not a social worker. I don't get paid for talking with you. I'm doing it because it's the best way to stay sober myself."

This does not mean, of course, that the idea of turning professional has never entered any A.A.'s mind. In the lean years, Bill W. did think of becoming a lay therapist to earn money through his experience in helping alcoholics. But, with a strong nudge from the group conscience, he soon realized that he could never hang out a shingle reading "Bill W., A.A. Therapist, \$10 an Hour"! It became clear to

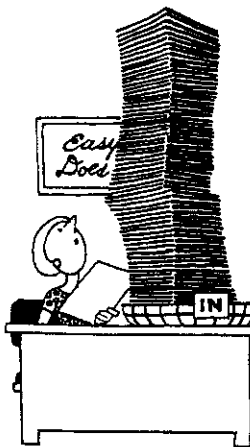


the early members that no A.A. should ever ask or accept payment for "carrying this message to somebody else, person to person and face to face."

But new questions arose as membership grew and the word of hope spread, sending thousands of alcoholics in search of A.A. The first intergroups or central offices were usually manned by A.A. volunteers; now, most such offices are so busy that full-time employees are needed as well. Naturally, A.A.'s are better suited to such jobs than are nonmembers—but are these A.A.'s then being paid for doing Twelfth Step work? No. In the office, they are just paving the way for this work. Arranging to get a sick drunk into a hospital, telling a shaky newcomer where the nearest meeting is tonight, they are helping to make it possible for that alcoholic to hear the message "person to person and face to face."

A similar development has taken place at the Fellowship's "headquarters." Once a tiny office for one co-founder (Bill) and one secretary, it has grown into the present General Service Office, fully staffed, with a big mailroom keeping the lines of communication open throughout A.A. worldwide. The employees, both A.A. and nonalcoholic, are paid on a scale comparable to that in profit-making enterprises, so that the office force can function dependably. And the A.A. staff members are in exactly the same position as the A.A. intergroup employees. Suppose you drop in at G.S.O. one day when you're in New York. Staff members who pause to chat with you may have been working on next year's Conference or corresponding with a group in your home area, helping it to carry the message more effectively. For that, they are paid with biweekly checks. But you may also hear them mention to other staff members plans for taking a newcomer to a meeting in the evening or for giving an A.A. talk to a neighborhood group the next week. For that, they are paid only with their own continuing sobriety.

In these office jobs and in other assignments, members are actually paid for their business and professional skills. Working at a G.S.O. desk, on Conference-approved books and pamphlets, or on the Grapevine, these A.A.'s use their abilities as correspondents, managers, writers, editors, artists, proofreaders—as well as their understanding of A.A. from the inside. On occasion, volunteers have given their time and talent to all these services, and their contributions are deeply appreciated. But what if the Fellowship decided that all such assignments should be handled *only* by unpaid volunteers? In present-day A.A., there's too great a volume of work to be done in spare hours here and there, and only the rich or the retired could afford to work full-time. If we tried to find in this limited group people qualified for particular tasks, obviously the field would be narrowed down—too often, down to nobody at all.

There would be another problem in using volunteers alone: It seems ungrateful—

or, at least, it's socially awkward—to criticize or reject a job done for free. But paid jobs for A.A. get quite a going-over! Take our literature, for instance (like this pamphlet). Whatever the subject, we want to be sure that each piece expresses as clearly as possible the view of the group conscience of A.A. as a whole. So any new project must first be approved by the Conference. Once it is in process, the Literature Committee of the General Service Board keeps a careful eye on it at every stage. Frequently, drastic changes are required. The "finished" product then must be okayed both by that committee and by the Conference Literature Committee, and further revisions are often—

"Now wait a minute!" some old-timer may interrupt. "What's going on here? Didn't Dr. Bob say, 'Let's keep it simple?'" . . .

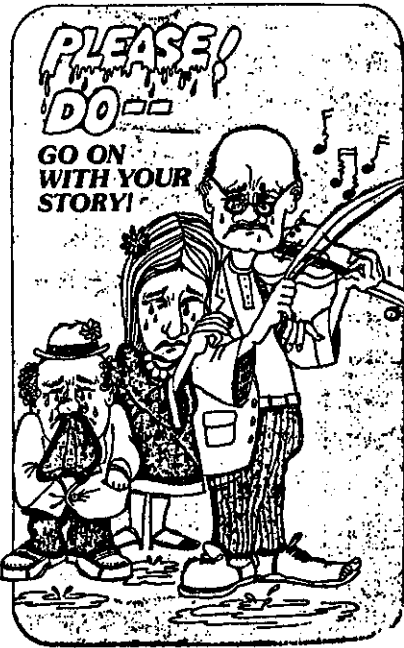

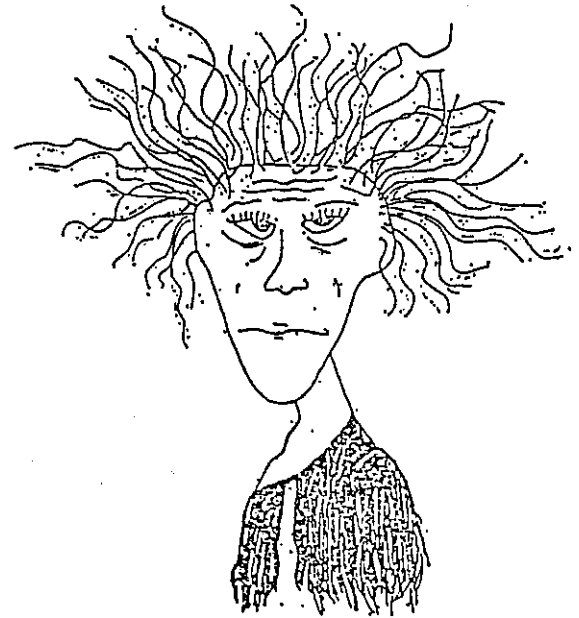

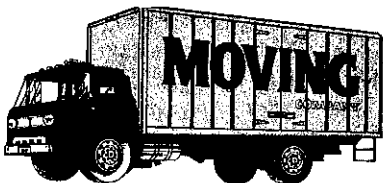
