GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING MINUTES  
NOVEMBER 19, 1989

The meeting was called to order at 6:40 p.m. by Wilson P., Chairman, with the Serenity Prayer. The Twelve Traditions were read by Bob T. The Check-In Sheet was passed around and six new GSRs introduced themselves. After the "Statement of Participation" was read, the Secretary read the previous meeting's minutes which were approved after one correction. After-hour telephone volunteers were obtained for December (see list below). There were 67 persons in attendance.

Committee reports were as follows: Finance, Al D. gave a very comprehensive report of CSO's current finances. Hospitals & Institutions, Hoyt S., Chairman, asked for volunteers to carry the message to various H&I's for the month of December (see list below). Don N., Public Information, reported on the various groups that sent speakers to several high schools and said that CSO will give calls directly to person responsible for various types of requests for speakers received; Char McM. reported on the seminar given for clergymen in which more than 70 members participated. Convention, Vangie H. reported that six speakers have been lined up for the Weekend in SA Conference, but one more is needed; also more volunteers are needed to help with conference.

OLD BUSINESS: Ray A., Chairman, Nominating Committee, presented slate of nominees for election of three new Trustees who were Lalo A., Don B., Olivia C., Raymond F., Richard G., Doug G., Charlie K., and Sharon T. Each one present gave a short summary of service work they had done, plus their sobriety date. Ballots were distributed, after no nominations were received from the floor. Final count of votes showed the three new trustees to be Lalo A., Doug G., and Charlie K.

Doug G. announced that 21 persons have paid deposits for the charter to the International Convention and that anyone wanting registration forms to contact their GSR or CSO.

NEW BUSINESS: Clara H., GSR for SASH Group, invited anyone interested to attend a meeting at 10 a.m. on Monday at Logan Hall, at SASH, to discuss purchasing of airconditioner for the auditorium. CSO received 791 telephone calls during office hours with 201 reported by answering service for a total of 992 for October. Reminder cards were mailed for the November General Membership Meeting. CSO will be closed on November 23rd for Thanksgiving.

DCM REPORTS: 1-A: Donna T. reported 75 persons attended the Workshop on Sponsorship; Mac McC. will be the new DCM. 1-B: Bev H., Alternate, announced that they will have a meeting on Saturday at 9:15 a.m. at Club 12. 1-C: Jeanne B. announced they had had a meeting prior to this meeting and asked all DCM's to stay after GMM for a meeting. 1-D: Will have a meeting after the GMM for all GSRs in this district. 1-E: Absent, no report. 1-F: Yolanda F. announced that a meeting was held today to elect an alternate, but did not get one; will have a mini-type workshop on December 17th; the Cinco de Mayo group will start up again and will meet on Saturdays at 1 p.m. at the Winners Club. 1-G: Tom McM. discussed the treasury and announced that a meeting of the GSRs in this district was held prior to this meeting, where meeting greeters and future workshops were discussed.

Last summer, unfortunately, Elmer died. A mutual friend has given me your name and I wonder if you would care to take Elmer's place on my next tour?

This gives them a chance to get their problems discussed while it protects their anonymity.

# Weeding out the defects

Often while working in the garden I am struck by the similarity between gardening and working the Twelve Steps, particularly the ones dealing with defects.

While I push the hoe through the tops of the weeds, I know that in a few weeks' time they will come back; just as when I feel I have dealt with a defect, and I turn my back on it for too long, it will return and need to be dealt with all over again. I know in both cases that if I don't hoe the weeds, or deal with the defects, on a regular basis, then I will need to do a lot of hard digging.

Sometimes, though, I can't tell the weeds from the baby plants, or the defects from the baby assets; so in that case I have to either leave them to reveal their true colours, or hoe through the lot just in case. I may even consult someone more experienced than myself, if my pride doesn't get in the way.

I feel often, when I ponder this problem while pottering in the garden, that the best way would be to implement some positive planting. To grub out the plants that no longer fulfil a useful purpose, and to plant those that do, ones that suit me. Maybe, also, if I try planting some positive assets, love, tolerance, patience, discipline, responsibility, just maybe they will outgrow my defects if I keep knocking the defects on the head.

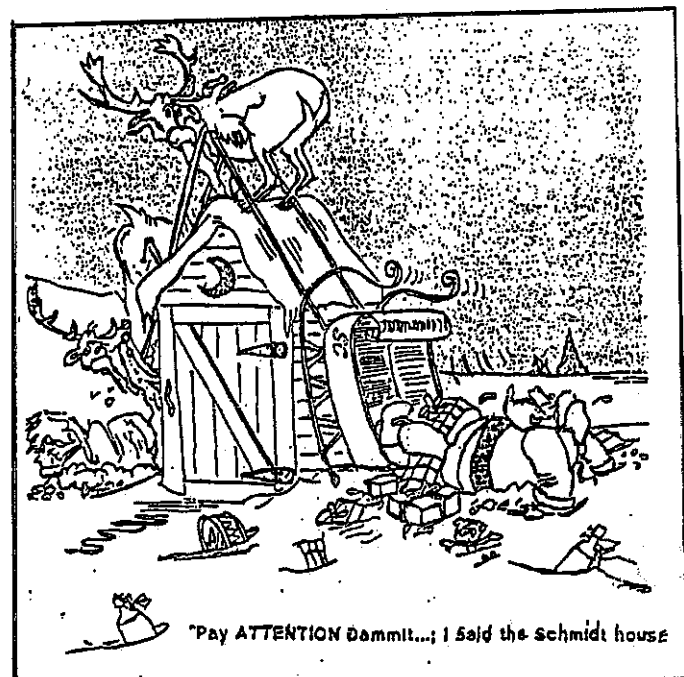

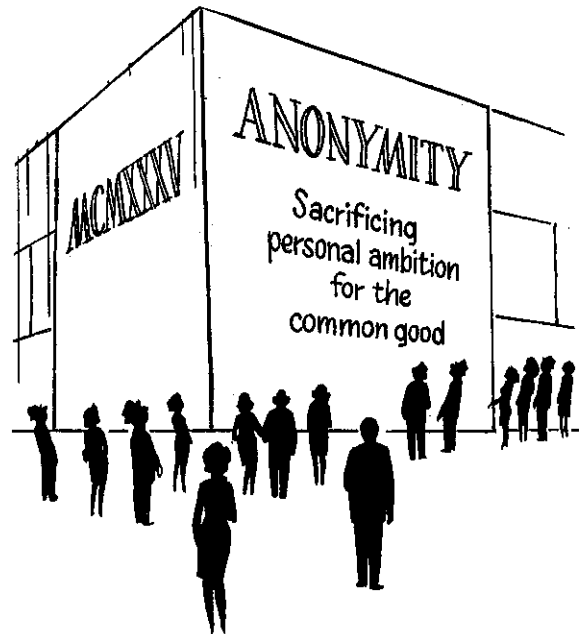
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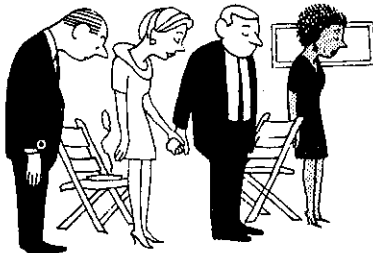
# The Twelfth Tradition

*Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our Traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.*

Let us always remember that anonymity—not taking credit for our own or others' recovery—is humility at work.



Anonymity, as we observe it in A.A., is at root a simple expression of humility. When we use the Twelve Steps to recover from alcoholism, we are *each* trying to achieve real humility, to put our self-respect on a solid base of truth, rather than on fantasies about ourselves. When we use the Twelve Traditions to work together in A.A., we are *all* trying to achieve humility: as individual members, by recognizing our true place in A.A.; as a fellowship, by recognizing A.A.'s true place in the world.



Tradition One reminds each of us that we are not recovering on our own, that we should control our personal desires and ambitions in order to guard the unity of our group and our Fellowship. We ought not (Tradition Two) fancy ourselves as big shots in A.A., no matter what office we hold.

All of us are just alcoholics together, and in our groups we are not entitled (Tradition Three) to rule on the qualifications of other alcoholics seeking the same help that we've had. Yes, a group needs humility, too. It may make its name public, but in the *spirit* of anonymity it should see the Whatever Group as merely part of a bigger whole (Tradition Four), careful in every enterprise to consider the welfare of all the other groups that make up A.A. In both group and individual activities, we should remember what the full name of our Fellowship is. It does not represent any established religion, nor is it a new religion. We are not evangelists or gurus out to save humanity; we are anonymous alcoholics trying to help other alcoholics (Tradition Five).

In the rising battle against alcoholism, we ought not let our pride in A.A. mislead us into linking our Fellowship with other agencies, in order to bid for a share in their power, prestige, and funds. If we keep Traditions Six and Seven in mind, we will instead direct all our efforts toward A.A.'s own unique purpose.

When we go on Twelfth Step calls, we should not tell ourselves how noble we are for doing such valuable work without pay. The meaning of Twelfth Step work cannot be measured in money (Tradition Eight), and we *have* received advance pay for it, in coin of far greater worth—our very lives. In the same Tradition, it's suggested that a service center maintains A.A. humility by paying its employees decent wages—rather than considering A.A. so virtuous an outfit that employment there is a favor.



When we are given special responsibilities within A.A., Tradition Nine defines these as opportunities to *serve*, not titles to flaunt. The humility of the Fellowship itself is safeguarded by Tradition Ten, with the refusal to set ourselves up as general authorities, swinging our collective weight around in the public arena.

We do not want to sell our program as a "surefire remedy" in the extravagant terms of a promotional campaign (Tradition Eleven), nor dramatize it by identifying noted people in A.A., thereby implying that recovery has been for each of us an individual accomplishment. As Tradition Twelve reminds us, we have something stronger than our human personalities to rely on. Our principles come first—and they are not our own invention. They reflect eternal spiritual values. With this Tradition, both as individuals and as a fellowship, we humbly acknowledge our dependence on a power higher than ourselves.
