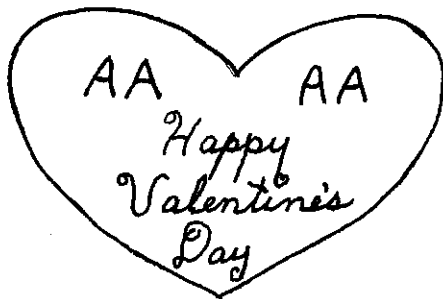

GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING MINUTES

JANUARY 15, 1989

The meeting was opened at 6:30 p.m. with the new Chairman, Wilson P., presenting an introductory talk explaining his role and the purpose of this meeting. The Serenity Prayer was followed by John P. reading the Twelve Traditions. The Sign-In Sheet was passed around; two new GSR's were introduced. Literature on the table was pointed out and all encouraged to carry copies back to their groups. After the Statement of Participation was read, the minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved without corrections or additions. Volunteers for after-hour phone duty were obtained (see list below). There were 55 persons present.

Committee reports were as follows: Wayne B., Finance Chairman, gave a very comprehensive report of the Income Statement and Balance Sheet for December and for the year 1988; he commended the CSO employees for their work in keeping accurate records of all finances. James H., H&I Chairman, requested volunteers for taking meetings to the various facilities that AA serves. He also thanked everyone for their cooperation for the past 18 months as this was his last month to hold this position. Tom B., Public Information Chairman, reported that his committee has been active, however, more volunteers are needed. The PI committee meets the second Wednesday of each month at 6:30 p.m. in the Hope Room at Club 12 and anyone interested is welcome. Jim W., Convention Chairman, was absent but had sent flyers for the upcoming convention. Jack S., Mailing Chairman, was absent; however his report was in the Board Meeting Minutes.

OLD BUSINESS: Wilson announced that the Al-Anon Office does not wish to be included in our new meeting directory, however, has requested an asterisk be placed beside AA meetings when an Al-Anon meeting is held at the same time and place. Standing Committee Chairmen have been appointed for 1989 with no change except Hoyt S. will replace James H. for H&I. The Nominating Committee Chairman is Ray A.; two other members will be appointed from 1-E and 1-F.

NEW BUSINESS: Paul B. volunteered for vice-chairman of the H&I Committee. All GSR's were encouraged to tell his or her group that THE NIGHTCAP is free to anyone that wishes to receive it--please keep address current with the CSO.

CSO REPORT: The 4-day holiday "open house" had a poor turnout. 1302 issues of the January NIGHTCAP were mailed with only 12 being returned. December telephone calls totaled 774 (21 less than November). Cards were mailed to all GSRs for the January 15 Gen. Mem. Meeting. Richard P., CSO employee, had his hours reduced to 5 per day. Dee S., CSO Manager, will get salary increase to \$540 per month. Mileage reimbursement for manager has been increased to 24¢ per mile. Needs directory changes immediately following this meeting.

TO THE SAN ANTONIO AREA AA GROUPS AND INDIVIDUALS

The Central Service Office has set a goal to increase dependence on contributions for service expenses and to rely less on income generated from the sale of literature in the coming year. During the calendar year of 1988, our total expenses were \$82,961.54 and our total contributions were only \$23,692.85, leaving \$59,268.69 that was made up through interest income, office kitty, Weekend in SA convention, etc., but mainly mark ups on our literature prices. This policy has been discouraged by the General Service Office in New York because much of what we sell is to non-AA entities. This can be viewed as receiving money from outside sources which would break our tradition of being self-supporting.

We are asking that you consider increasing your donations as groups and as individuals.

3. Share your personal reflection on the passage you've chosen as follows: Paragraph 1--be sure to write out the passage, giving the correct title of the source along with the page number. Paragraph 2--will consist of your own reflection. YOUR MANUSCRIPT SHOULD BE TYPED AND DOUBLE SPACED. IN THE EVENT YOU DO NOT HAVE A TYPEWRITER, PLEASE PRINT VERY CLEARLY AND LEGIBLY ON ONE SIDE OF THE PAPER ONLY.

4. Your entire manuscript should be no more than 150 words.

5. Please include your name and address in the upper right corner of the manuscript (this information is confidential and for office purposes only)

6. Should your manuscript be accepted for publication, no fee will be paid, nor will your name be acknowledged in print.

7. Should your manuscript be accepted for publication, you will be asked to sign an agreement with AA World Services, Inc., publisher of Conference approved literature.

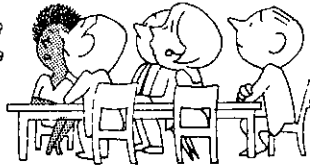
The Second Tradition

For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority . . . a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants . . . they do not govern.

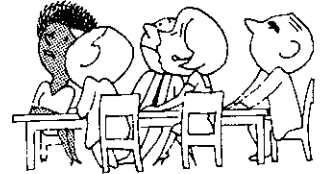

"There's only one way to do it and I'll tell you what it is..."

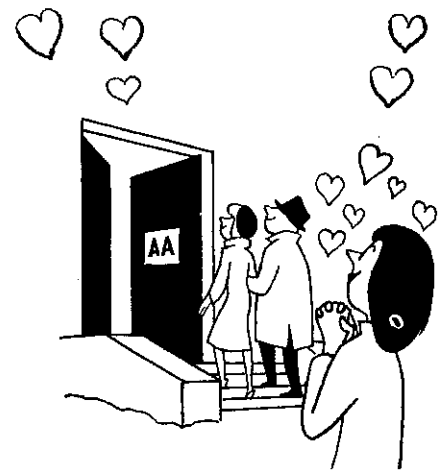
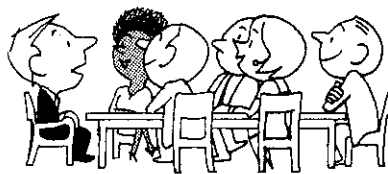


"...furthermore, we'll take our money and establish a fund... I'll manage it..."

A.A. is both a democracy and, in Bill W.'s words, "a benign anarchy." A group elects its own officers—who have no power to *order* anybody to do anything. In most groups, most of the slate rotates out of office at the end of six months, and new officers are elected.

If a group wants to be a part of the whole A.A. service structure, it elects a G.S.R. (general service representative, with a two-year term). G.S.R.'s elect area committee members and then join them in electing a delegate from their area to the annual General Service Conference. The Conference is about the closest approximation of a government that A.A. has; it produces opinions on important matters of policy; it approves the choice of some trustee nominees for the General Service Board and directly elects others. But neither the Conference nor the board can give

orders to any A.A. group or member.

Then who's in charge around here? A.A. is a spiritual movement, and so the "ultimate authority" is the spiritual concept of the "group conscience." Its voice is heard when a well-informed group gathers to arrive at a decision. The result rests on more than arithmetic, a "yes" and "no" count. Minority ideas get thoughtful attention. What about that annoying character who's always sure she's right? Better listen—maybe, just this once, she is right. If she's wrong, then she will—if she remembers the First Tradition as well as the Second—go along with the decision of the group conscience. Does this notion seem too cloudy? Let's think back to our first meetings. The presence we newcomers felt in those rooms was the same as the group conscience. And it was *real*—welcoming us in, setting up no barriers of rules. . . .
