GSR MEETING MINUTES
Club 12, Dec. 16, 7:00 p.m.

Administrative board chairman Al D. called on the following chairmen for reports:

Financial report -- Jack E.: Jack noted that the Central Service Office had a deficit of \$857.30 for November. Large literature purchases and three paydays for CSO office employees instead of the usual two paydays were given as reasons. Jack noted that the CSO is ahead of where it was this time last year.

Hospital and institutions report -- Sylvia O.: Sylvia reported that Detox (Bexar County Medical Holding Unit) is moving Jan. 1 from 622 Dolorosa to 1217 N. Frio (at Frio & Poplar streets) at the far northeast corner of downtown. The new facility will house 92 patients, far more than the old facility. Both voluntary patients and patients sent from the county jail will be treated there.

Detox administrators have requested that the AA community bring AA meetings there on Monday, Thursday, and Saturday nights.

Sylvia also reported that Audie Murphy Veterans Administration Hospital administrators have requested that the Central Office coordinate the 3 p.m. Friday "AA orientations" which have been held for several years at the VA. In the past, the meetings have been brought by individual AA members.

Penal committee report -- Don S.: Don reported on prison visits and said he was assured that action would be taken soon on applications for prison visitation from San Antonio AA members. He said that on many applications, AA members had left blank a question about whether the applicant had been convicted of a felony and therefore were returned unprocessed. Don said that having been convicted of a felony in the past does not preclude approval for prison visits.

Carolyn P., also of the penal committee, visited the Women's Unit and reported a severe shortage of AA literature there. Some women, she said, have over six months' sobriety in AA and do not have a Big Book. She said that groups might want to donate books through the CSO.

Public information report -- Bob W.: Bob reported that he and his committee had addressed over 3,500 students during 1984. During December, he visited classes at Churchill, South San Antonio, MacArthur, and Central Catholic high schools. Two AA members also appeared anonymously on the local television program "Kaleidoscope." Bob is looking for responsible volunteers interested in speaking at schools.

Editorial report -- Janis H.: Janis said the Nightcap will now contain a new monthly feature, "Group of the Month". She needs a volunteer to alternate with Jeanne W. as co-editor of the feature. Each co-editor will select and write about a different group every two months. The feature will include the group's history, telling how it got started and giving as many interesting personal details as possible. Also, Janis hopes all GSRs will encourage sales of the Nightcap.

Mailing report -- Al M.: Al re-emphasized the need for Nightcap subscribers to let CSO know when they move. He said the January Nightcap will be mailed late due to the holidays.

Al D. noted that this was his last meeting as CSO administrative board chairman, and he said thanks to everyone for their help during the year.

Speaker will be Father Sam M. of Houston, whom Danna said is a well-known speaker in the Northeast and Eastern states. Ticket price will include supper and a dance.

Al D. pointed out the Danna had a big write-up in the Sunday San Antonio Light.

Clara P. announced that the State Hospital Christmas Party had been a big success, and thanked everybody for their support.

Fred D. of the Downtown Group announced that his district (1D) needed a DCM and volunteered to serve as DCM if he were elected. He was elected.

A new directory of San Antonio AA meetings will be published in January. Changes for the new directory will be taken through Jan. 4.

Jeanne W., new district Grapevine representative, asked GSRs to take a letter back to their groups to encourage Grapevine subscriptions.

Southwest Texas Area Conference chairman Jim B. noted that the conference would be Oct. 4,5, and 6 at El Tropicano Hotel. Tickets, at \$30, will include a banquet and dance on Saturday night.

DCM REPORTS:

1A DCM James P. announced that 1A GSRs will meet at 2 p.m. Jan. 14 at the Winners Club.

1B DCM Rich R. reported three new groups and two new meetings in his district. He said he had attended group conscience meetings twice at Group 12 on request to explain the GSO Guidelines for groups meeting in clubs. Jim M., GSR of the Gentlemen's Group, read a letter stating that since the board of directors of Club 12 has ruled that no autonomous AA groups are allowed to meet at Club 12, his group was moving to a new location at 315 W. Nakoma. The letter described what his group felt the issues were.

1C DCM Jack E. -- No report.

1D DCM Fred D. -- No report.

1E DCM Jim B. said a 1E GSR meeting was held on Dec. 16 at the Haven. He said Wilford Hall is accepting no new patients until Jan. 1. He said that the Juvenile Program at San Antonio State Hospital is experimental.

Check with Central Service Office to keep posted on the new locations of these groups.

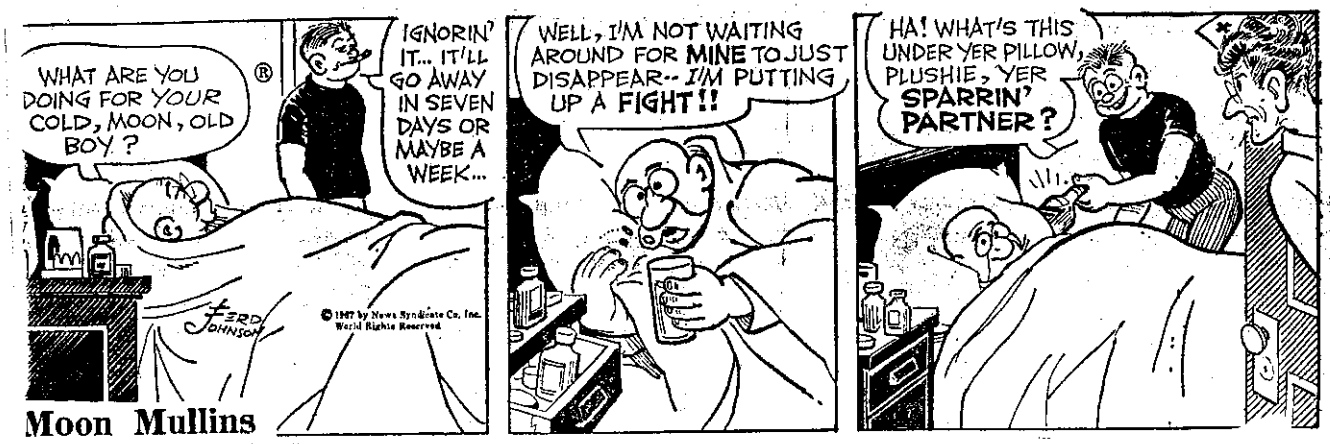
NEW LIFE GROUP ADDS A SECOND MEETING

The New Life Group, which has been meeting at St. Patrick's Catholic Church, has added an 8:15 p.m. Sunday meeting.

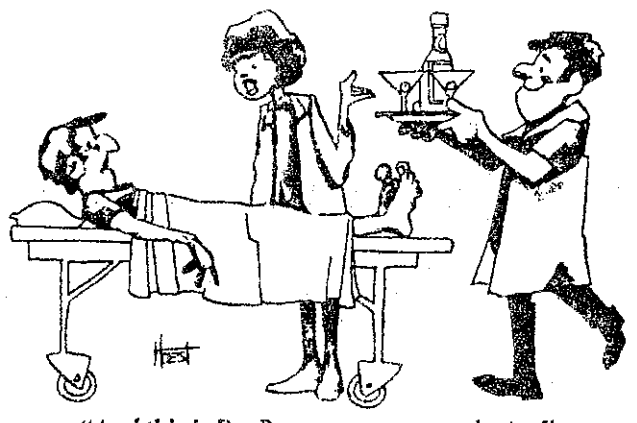
The group, which is bilingual, previously had only a Tuesday night meeting. Both are open speaker meetings.

My name is Bill. I'm an alcoholic. This is my story.

I started drinking in my early twenties and I enjoyed it tremendously. Drinking was an important part of my life. It made me feel good.

I had a rather high opinion of my leadership abilities and expected great success in the business world. For a few years I did rather well, but was drinking more and more. When my business deals began to fall apart, I drank even more.

My old feelings of confidence and success began to fade and I retreated into the

bottle. Time after time I would swear off and promised my wife I would never touch another drop.

But shortly after my last pledge to quit, I came home drunk. Why did I do this? Where was my will power? I began to wonder if I were crazy. My brain raced uncontrollably and there was a terrible sense of impending doom. Should I kill myself? I knew I was a failure.

But -- I reasoned that a couple of bottles of booze would bring oblivion.
