GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING

December 18, 1988

MINUTES

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by Darlene B., Vice-Chairman, in the usual manner. Wilson P. read the Twelve Traditions. New GSR's were recognized; literature and handouts were pointed out. Statement of Participation was read. Minutes of the last meeting were approved as published in the December NIGHTCAP. Volunteers for after-hour telephone duty were obtained for January (see list below). There were 34 persons present.

COMMITTEE REPORTS: Finance--Al D. presented the Income Statement and Balance Sheet, in the absence of the chairman, for the month of November (all GSR's were encouraged to take a copy back to their group). H&I--James H., Chairman, asked for volunteer groups to carry the message to various facilities in January (see list below). PI/CPC Chairman was absent. Jail Chairman, John B., reported that the old jail is being refurbished and have requested AA meetings be brought in. It will be ready sometime in February. At present, there is a total of 6 male AA members taking the meetings to the jail, so we will need more male volunteers to serve this facility. The Juvenile Detention Center also wants AA meetings. More on this later. Mail--Chairman absent, no report. Convention--Jim W., Chairman, present and reported that La Mansion del Norte has over priced us on everything. He is negotiating with the El Tropicana. Convention dates are March 31, April 1 & 2, 1989.

OLD BUSINESS: It was reported that the minimum cost for a booth at the American Correctional Assn's Winter Conference is \$800 so CSO and the SW Area will not participate. New AA meeting information needs to be in to CSO by January 1 to be printed in new directory. The Al-Anon Office was sent a letter on Nov 16 asking if they wanted to be included in the directory and share the cost. As of this date we have had no response.

NEW BUSINESS: The new Board Chairman, Wilson P. and Vice-Chairman, Bob T., were introduced. It was announced that three group representatives will be needed for the 1989 nominating committee--this will be discussed at the January meeting. The Editorial Committee has been abolished as this job is in the Office Manager's job description and is the CSO's responsibility to publish a monthly newsletter. Wilson P. moved and Richard O. seconded the motion to change the time of this meeting back to 7 p.m. Vote was taken after discussion and majority wanted to keep the meeting time of 6:30 p.m. Time will stay as is.

CSO REPORT: A new contract has been written with the answering service which will save \$25 per month and we will be allowed 300 calls for \$55 rather than 200 for \$80. In November CSO received 795 calls with 203 after-hours. CSO mailed out 1292 issues of the December newsletter plus 5 going out of the U.S. Only 21 have been returned for wrong mailing address at a cost of \$5.25. One postcard sent to GSR's reminding them of this meeting was returned for wrong address. Old after-hour telephone folders were asked to be returned to CSO--new guidelines sheet has been prepared with new phone number for answering service included.

DCM REPORTS: 1-A, Absent, no report; 1-B--reported for Sam R. by Sharon that there will be no meeting on this Saturday; 1-C--Dean V. present, no report. 1-D--Vacant; 1-E--Jim B. gave report on Jan 14 meeting (see front page of NIGHTCAP for details). 1-F--Absent, no report.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: CSO will be closed Dec 26 & Jan 2; will have "Open House" Dec 27-30; have received \$25 donation for refreshments. Villa Rosa group will have a Christmas Party on December 20. Pete H., Chairman of the CFC, announced that they need donations and would like to have a representative from each group attend their meetings that are held on the second Monday of each month at 7 p.m., 130 Saipan and need more volunteers to take meetings to Huntsville TDC.

TWO DAYS AT A TIME???

I was getting very impatient with my slow progress in AA, so I asked my sponsor what I could do to speed it up.

He looked at me with a pitiful gaze, typical of sponsors, and spoke: "Are you willing to go to any length to speed up your recovery?" "Sure," I replied, "I'll do anything."

"All right. Here's what you can do," he explained with an evil smile on his face. "First, you will have to stay awake a lot more hours than you do now. That means you will cut down on sleep to 3 hours a night. That allows you time to go to 14 meetings a week and to study the Big Book at least an hour a day. I want you to forget about 'Easy Does It' and stay in motion every one of your 21 waking hours. Sponsor as many people as you can--at least 20. Lead meetings at least three times a week and be available for 12th Step calls night and day. In other words, I want you to live two days at a time!"

I was stunned by his program but impressed because he had lots of sobriety, so I knew he was right.

"Okay," I said joyfully, "I'll do it!" He looked at me with that same pitiful gaze that I was used to. I waited eagerly for his response.

"SIT DOWN," he commanded. I sat. He continued, "You are sicker than most of us, believe me. You are a 'sick sister.' You want to live 2 days at a time and you can't handle one day at a time. Simmer down! You are making progress slowly which is all you can manage right now. So, cool it. Your Higher Power is in charge. All you have to do is the footwork. Cooperate. Do your best each day and things will get better and better."

My balloon was punctured. I collapsed inside. It was no use fighting!!

I had to live ONE DAY AT A TIME!

JEWELS FROM THE JAIL

Hi, everyone! My name is Tina K. I was first introduced into the AA program in the Bexar County Jail--here in good old SA, after I was busted in May of '86. I used to go to the jailhouse meetings not just for the coffee, but to make it look good on my record. During the year of '87, I was in and out of jail on M.T.R.s (motions to revoke probation) four times. Every time I made sure I attended every AA meeting I could while I was in jail. Each time I attended their meetings, I really wondered if this program would ever work for me. But when I would be released I grew weak, and I would have a drink waiting for me outside.

Well, in March 1988, I was picked up and told I was going to TDC. This time I went to the AA meetings to try to find an answer, to try to find a better way of life. I was tired of the same old results. Getting out, and drinking, only to wind up back in jail. Anyway, I went to TDC in May and was released in September on parole to a halfway house in Beaumont. While in prison, I continued to go to my AA meetings, with each time learning I can change. I'm out of prison now for 3 months. I've had to deal with alcohol right in front of my face, but I've stood my ground. I've gone to a trade school as well. I had been working in bars for 19½ years but now I'm a certified truck driver. To be honest I have to admit I'm afraid to drink again because I know what I was like when I was a drunk. I like my life now. I've been sober for 10 months. I'm learning a whole new way of life after being a drunk for 18 years. I feel like a "babe in the woods" and I love it. So everyone hang in there, this program really does work if you work it. I also want to give special thanks to Lynn, Karla, and Dianne for taking the time to carry the message of the AA program to us in the county jail. For without them, I would never have found this program.

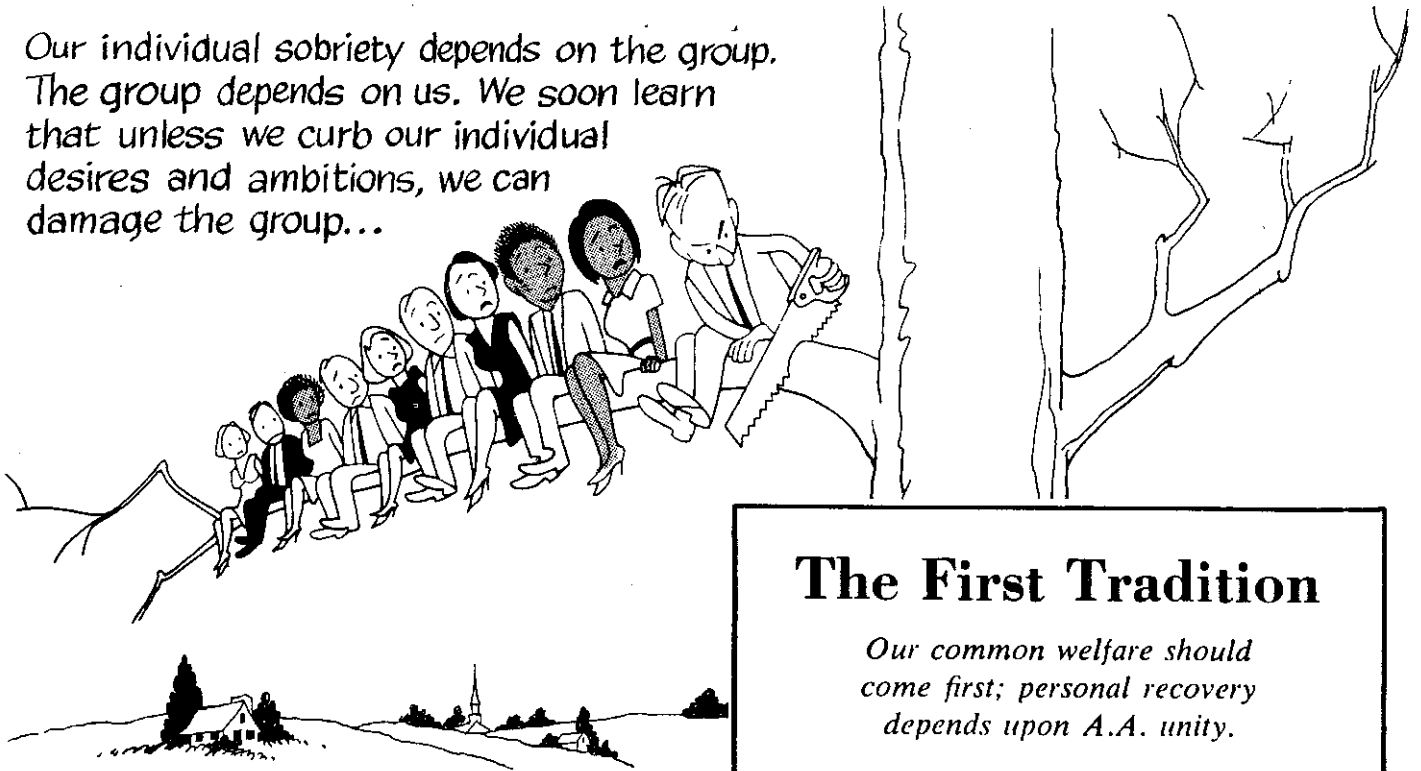

If you are willing to give a ride to a meeting or to return telephone calls to those who just want to talk, then you are fulfilling your part of the contract as a Twelfth-Stepper.

If you want to volunteer, please fill out one of the forms your GSR gets at the monthly General Membership Meeting and send or bring it to the Central Service Office. Or, come by the CSO and fill one out. You are needed by those who are still suffering!

The First Tradition

*Our common welfare should
come first; personal recovery
depends upon A.A. unity.*

Our brother the noisy drunk affords the simplest illustration of this Tradition. If he insists on disrupting the meeting, we “invite” him to leave, and we bring him back when he’s in better shape to hear the message. We are putting the “common welfare” first. But it is *his* welfare, too; if he’s ever going to get sober, the group must go on functioning, ready for him.

Yet he is only one rare aspect of the problem. When we do get sober in A.A., we shed a few small bits of the Big Ego: We admit, “I can’t handle alcohol, and I can’t stay away from it on my own.” Fine so far! Then we find there is plenty of that Ego still with us. It may lead us to take other members’ inventories and to gossip about their supposed shortcomings. It may lure us into hogging the floor at every discussion meeting.

Oh well, it’s a selfish program, isn’t it? After all the miseries of active alcoholism, why shouldn’t we indulge ourselves a little? We all know one good reason why we shouldn’t: Self-indulgence of this kind is an immediate personal danger; it threatens the individual’s own sobriety. More than that, it threatens the very basis of our sobriety—the unity of the A.A. group. For a self-righteous gossip *can* damage the mutual trust that is vital to every group. And a compulsive talker *can* ruin the effectiveness of a discussion meeting—“I’ve stopped going to that group. Nobody but Joe can get a word in edgewise.”

When A.A. was very young, the first members clearly saw the preservation of its unity as a life-or-death matter for themselves and for the alcoholics still unrecovered. The First Tradition states this aim, and it is the common aim of all Twelve Traditions. When A.A. reached the age of 35, the aim was restated in the theme of the 1970 International Convention:

This we owe to A.A.’s future:

To place our common welfare first;
To keep our Fellowship united.
For on A.A. unity depend our lives,
And the lives of those to come.

Each of the other eleven Traditions explains one specific way to protect the unity of the Fellowship and the A.A. group. Those early members quickly recognized power-drivers as potential group-wreckers. And they’re still around—the members who are always sure that they’re always right—the members who are happily ready to assume all the burdens of leadership and grimly unwilling to share them, let alone give them up. But a group does need officers. How can we cope with this dilemma? Tradition Two provides the answer. . . .

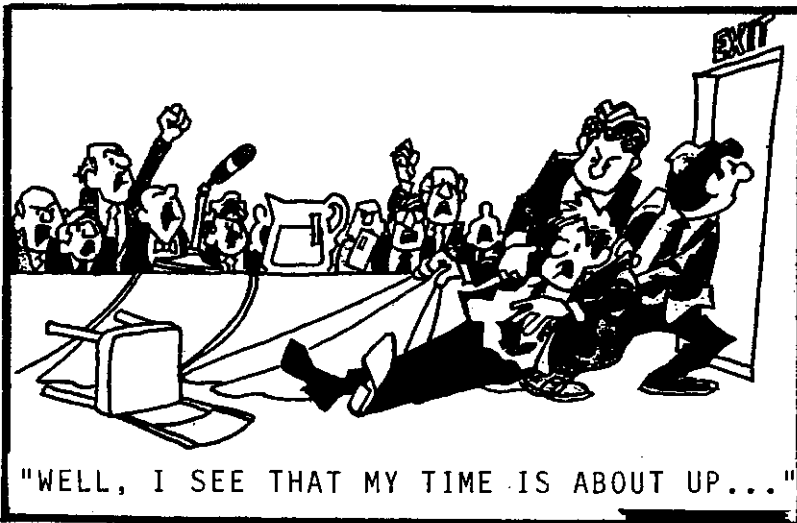

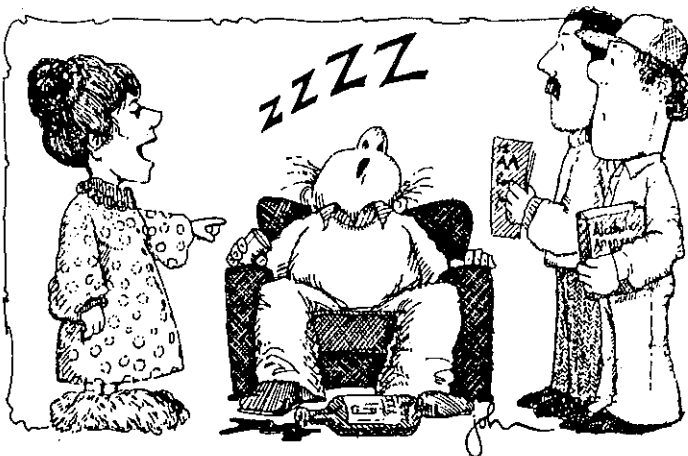

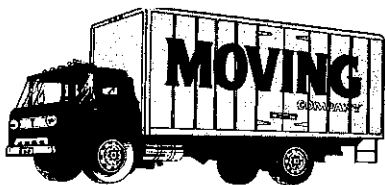
