GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING

MINUTES

December 16, 1990

The meeting was called to order at 6:35 p.m. by Bob T., Chairman, with a moment of silence followed by the Serenity Prayer. The Twelve Traditions were read by Elaine. There were 53 persons present, including 7 new GSRs and two Alternate GSRs. After the "Statement of Participation" was read, the minutes of the previous meeting were accepted as printed in the December issue of THE NIGHTCAP. The check-in list was circulated. The Financial Report was presented by Al D. Volunteers for After-Hours Phone Duty were obtained (see list below). Eileen, Chairman for H&I, asked for volunteers to carry the message to various hospitals & institutions (see list below). Don N., Chairman for PI, absent. Flynn J., Chairman for Jail, reported everything is going well, but needs more volunteers. Bill T., Chairman for Convention, gave a progress report on activities and names of confirmed speakers for same. He needs more volunteers--call Bill T., 828-7865.

OLD BUSINESS: New secretary for this meeting beginning with the January meeting was elected--Jerry S. He was welcomed by all.

NEW BUSINESS: Recommendation for amendments to CSO Policies and Procedures were given to each GSR and COR to take back to his or her group. These amendments will be voted on at the January 20, 1991, meeting. There was some discussion regarding this. Any other amendments will have to be made at another date.

CSO REPORT: Given by Mary O. She reported CSO mailed 1535 copies of THE NIGHTCAP for December with 25 being returned; reminder cards sent to GSRs and others for the GMM; the office received 810 telephone calls during November and 253 reported by the answering service for a total of 1063; a welcoming letter was sent to all new Trustees. Announced that all January Nightcap items must be in CSO by Tuesday, December 18; Open House to be held Friday, December 21, 1 to 5 p.m.; CSO will be closed Christmas Day and New Year's Day. Explanation of the new time periods for the after-hour telephone volunteers was given. Also, the new San Antonio Meeting Directory is available.

DCM REPORT: Tom McM. reported the CFC will hold a chili dinner and meeting on March 2 or 9 to discuss workshop on carrying the message behind the walls. The next meeting of the San Antonio Interdistrict will be held in Kerrville on 19th (the third Saturday of Jan).

ANNOUNCEMENTS: Yolanda F. announced the Hispanic Workshop in El Paso on January 28 and 29 will have an election for South Texas Delegate. The Area Workshop has been changed from January 12 & 13 to January 19 & 20 and will be held in Kerrville at the Inn of the Hills Motel. Trish announced that the Last Call Group meets on Friday and Saturday at midnight at 6676 UTSA Blvd (same place as the Sobriety 101 Group met).

Bob T. and Jan T. were both commended for doing a great job. Lalo A. was introduced as the new Board of Trustees Chairman and the gavel was turned over to him. Larry Y. was introduced as the new Vice-Chairman.

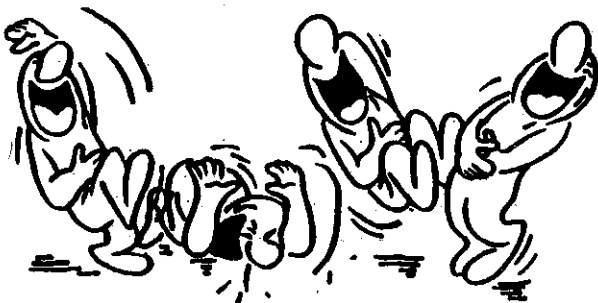
No corrections or additions to the previous months minutes were made; the treasury balance of \$219.82 was reported.

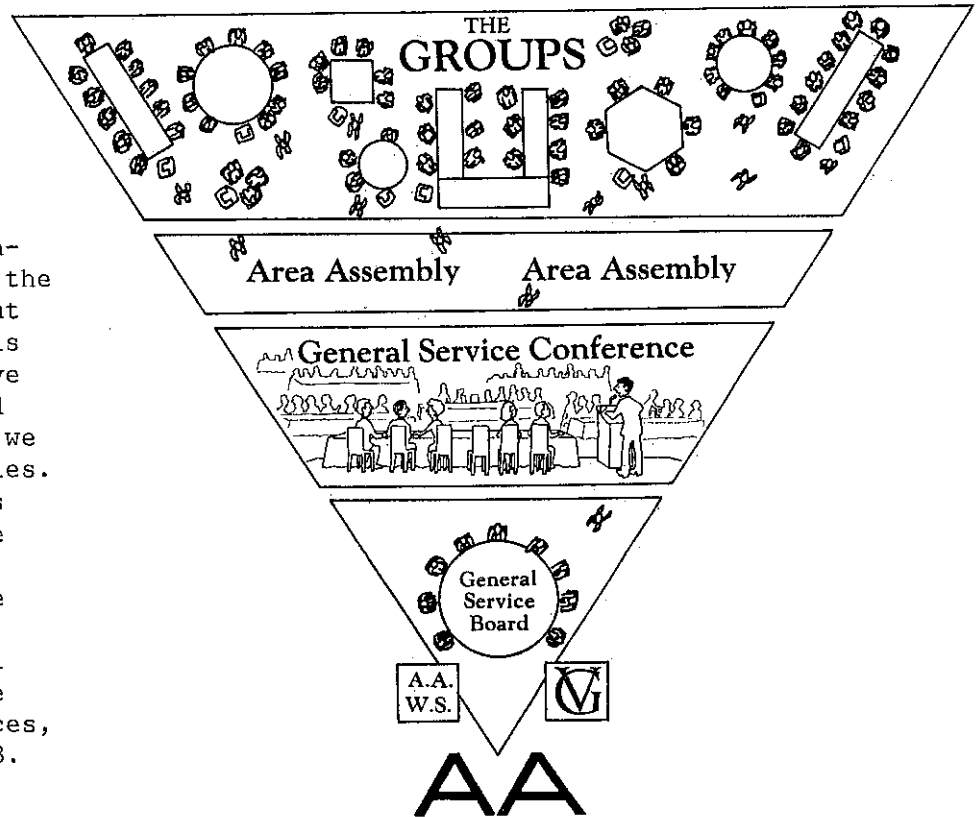

Concept I

Final responsibility and ultimate authority for A.A. world services should always reside in the collective conscience of our whole Fellowship.

THE TWELVE CONCEPTS FOR WORLD SERVICE

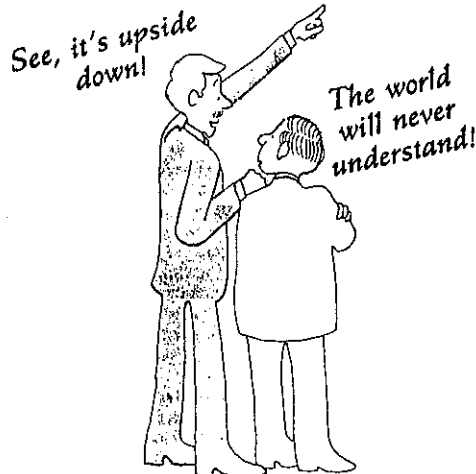
THE NIGHTCAP has been publishing the Twelve Traditions in the corresponding months for about 5 years. We now believe it is time we moved on to the Twelve Concepts. AAWS has published an illustrated pamphlet that we are going to use in this series. We have had to have the pages reduced to make it fit on the 8½x11 page that we use; however, you will be able to see the Twelve Concepts in print over the next 12 months. All of this is reprinted with the permission of AA World Services, Inc. The pamphlet No. is P-8.



Alcoholics Anonymous has been called an upside-down organization because the "ultimate responsibility and final authority for...world services" resides with the groups—rather than with the trustees of the General Service Board or the General Service Office in New York.

In Concept I, Bill traces how this came to be. The first step in 1938 was "the creation of a trusteeship," first called the Alcoholic Foundation, renamed in 1964 the General Service Board. Why? To perform the services the groups could not do for themselves: e.g., uniform literature, uniform public information about A.A., helping new groups get started, sharing with them the experience of established groups, handling pleas for help, publishing a national magazine, and carrying the message in other languages and in other countries. A service office was formed to carry on these functions under the board's direction. Both the board and the office looked to the co-founders, Bill and Dr. Bob, for policy leadership.

In the midst of the "exuberant success" of early A.A., Dr. Bob became fatally ill and Bill asked, "When Dr. Bob and I are gone, who would then advise the trustees and the office?" The answer, Bill felt, was to be found in the collective conscience of the A.A. groups. But how could the autonomous, widely scattered groups exercise such a responsibility?



Over great resistance by trustees and members devoted to the status quo, Bill managed to "sell" the idea of calling an A.A. General Service Conference (see Concept II), and eleven years later Bill was able to declare, "The results of the Conference have exceeded our highest expectations."

This Concept is rooted in Tradition Two, which states:

"For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority—a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern."

The principles of Tradition Two are crystal-clear, Bill asserts: "The A.A. groups are to be the final authority; their leaders are to be entrusted with delegated responsibilities only." The outside world cannot imagine an organization run this way, but Bill calls it "a spiritualized society characterized by enough enlightenment, enough responsibility, and enough love of man and of God to insure that our democracy of world service will work...."

The difference between open and closed meetings

The purpose of all A.A. group meetings, as the Preamble states, is for members to "share their experience, strength and hope with each other that they may solve their common problem and help others to recover from alcoholism." Toward this end, some groups hold both *open* and *closed* meetings.

The difference between the two main types is that *closed* meetings are for A.A. members only, or for those who have a drinking problem and "have a desire to stop drinking." *Open* meetings are available to anyone interested in Alcoholics Anonymous' program of recovery from alcoholism. At both types of meetings, the A.A. chairperson may request that participants confine their discussion to matters pertaining to recovery from alcoholism.

Whether open or closed, A.A. group meetings are conducted by A.A. members. At open meetings, non-A.A.s may be invited to share, depending upon the conscience of the group.

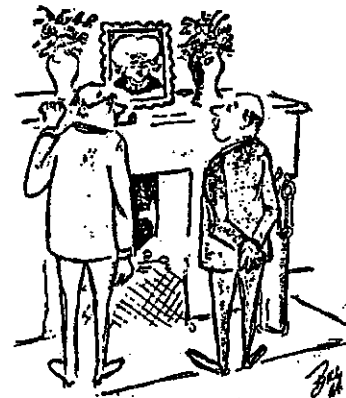

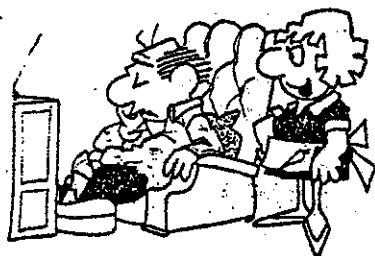

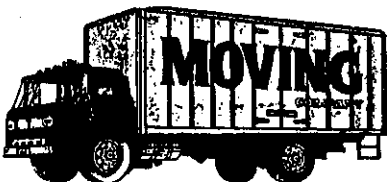
