Opening: Virginia opened the meeting at 5:35pm with a moment of silence followed by the Serenity Prayer. Charles, Steve and Mike read the Twelve Traditions. Lucian read the COR Guidelines. The sign-in sheet was passed around. One new CORs present; Vicki S from Colonies North. Steve made motion to accept the minutes from the last COR meeting as printed in the Nightcap. Seconded by Charles. Motion carried. Virginia asked if everyone received their Nightcap this month. Everyone attending did.

Financial Report: Louie was not present, so Virginia gave the financial report. The report looks good. We are ahead of last year and on budget. Randy pointed out that we are actually behind, if you look at total assets. Charles asked if the difference could be in inventory. Randy said that inventory was down compared to last year. Lucian asked about group contributions. Virginia said that according to the income statement, both group contributions and Nightcap contributions were up from last year for the month of November. Charles asked about member equity, and Randy said it appeared to be down from last year. (I did not catch all the specific dollar amounts that were flying around, so see the Financial Report for specific figures.) The CORs did not have some of the same paperwork that Randy was reading from, so no action was taken. Virginia and the other Board members agreed to discuss it in next month's Board meeting.

The Nightcap Committee Report: Bill H was not present, so Virginia gave the report. Bill would like to have a contest among the CORs to see who can sell the most Nightcap subscriptions this next month. The contest will begin tonight and end at the next COR meeting. The prize is a \$10 gift certificate at the CSO. Please put your name or group name on the subscription form when you sign someone up, so you will receive credit for it. Subscription forms are available at this meeting and at the CSO, and can be returned to Bill H or to the CSO. The Nightcap Committee has set a goal of doubling the number of Nightcap subscriptions (currently 453) by the end of next year. Subscription costs are \$3/year. The Nightcap makes a good gift for sponsees and other group members.

Telephone Service Committee (TSC) Report: Kim reported that the December calendar was filled, thanks in part to a couple of groups taking several timeslots; Colonies North and Group 12. The January calendar was passed around. Kim did not have telephone service work packets at the COR meeting because the CSO is looking into buying a new copier that can handle the large volume when packets are made. We used a professional copy center last time, but we are looking into cutting that expense down with our own copier. Kim explained how "phone duty" works and asked everyone to PLEASE talk to members of their groups about volunteering for telephone service work, or for the Twelfth Step Volunteer List. The Telephone Service Committee needs help creating a core group that will monitor timeslots and act as backups. The CSO will be closed on January 7 for inventory, so we need extra volunteers on that day. Kim or other committee members are willing to come to your group's business meetings to talk about telephone service work. It is important service work, since the phone volunteer is often a caller's very first contact with AA. Kim reminded everyone that the CSO is not paid to answer the phone. We depend entirely on volunteers - individual AA members from local groups all over the area. You do not have to go through your COR to volunteer, although CORs can take a number of slots for their group. Kim's phone number is 522-0488. You can call her directly to take as many timeslots as you want. Virginia F asked where to get packets. See Kim or the CSO for packets. Vicki asked about the Twelfth Step Volunteer List form, because it has a question on it asking if one works for a treatment center. Randy explained the history of that question having been added to the form long ago, to discourage volunteers from "recruiting" for their place of employment. We all agreed that this is no longer the problem that it used to be, so Kim will bring it up in the next Board meeting about the necessity of that question on our Twelfth Step Volunteer sign-up forms.

Old Business: None.

New Business: Virginia welcomed the new Board members; Randy S (who was present), Louis, Madonna and Mary S. Their terms of office will begin in January. At the last Board meeting, Virginia was elected Chairperson and Madonna as Alternate Chairperson. This may change next month. Burt asked for more detail. Virginia said that the election was in question since newly elected Board members voted, but were not actually in office yet. The election will probably be redone at the next Board meeting. Also, Kim will ask Bonnie at the next Board meeting to add a reminder to pass the COR attendance sheet for the minutes (to be printed in the Nightcap).

Announcements: Burt announced that this was his last meeting as the Colonies North COR, and he introduced Vicki S who is the new COR for that group.

Closing: Virginia passed the hat. Closed at 6:10pm with the Lord's Prayer.

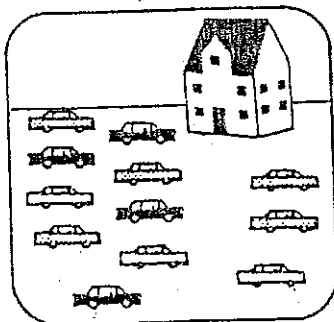

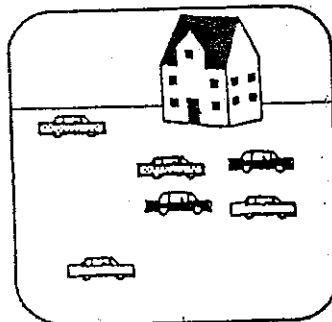
1. Never take a beer to a job interview.

Truly did a clergyman say to me, "Your misfortune has become your good fortune. You AA's are a privileged people."

A REMINDER AND A WARNING.....

They flourished when they helped one another and they died when they abandoned certain timeless principles.

Alcoholics Anonymous was only ten years old when Bill W., AA's co-founder, wrote: "Those who read the July 1945 Grapevine were startled, then sobered, by the account which it carried of the Washingtonian movement. It was hard for us to believe that 100 years ago the newspapers of this country were carrying enthusiastic accounts about 100,000 alcoholics who were helping each other stay sober; that today the influence of this good work has so completely disappeared that few of us had ever heard of it...."

"May we always be willing to learn from experience!" Bill cautioned.

Founded by six drunks in 1840 the Washingtonians had grown in membership to hundreds of thousands in a short twelve years, and then destroyed themselves as an organization and dropped out of sight. By 1852, all that remained of the spectacular power as a method of treatment was the Home for the Fallen in Boston.

In a talk on the Traditions shortly before his death, Bill said that the Washingtonians had done things "which were very

natural to do, but which had turned out to be utterly destructive. And it was this spectacle of the past, brought before us as our Traditions were evolving, that continued that we were probably very much on the right track in this matter of no public controversy, in this question of pay our own bills; in this question of not becoming involved with other enterprises, and so on down the line. And above all, it continued the great protective guide of our anonymity Tradition."

Later, in the book Alcoholics Anonymous Comes of Age, Bill wrote, "In many respects the Washingtonians were akin to AA. Had they stuck to their one goal, they might have found the answer. Instead, the Washingtonians permitted politicians and reformers, both alcoholic and non-alcoholic, to use the society for their own purposes. Within a very few years they had completely lost their effectiveness helping alcoholics, and the society collapsed."

"The lesson to be learned from the Washingtonians was not overlooked by Alcoholics Anonymous. As we surveyed the wreck of that movement, early AA members resolved to keep our society out of public controversy." To a friend he wrote, "I wish every AA could indelibly burn the history of the

Washingtonians into his memory. It is an outstanding example of how, and how not, we ought to conduct ourselves. In a sense, Alcoholics Anonymous has never had a problem seriously threatening our overall unity. Yet I notice that some AAs are complacent enough to suppose we never shall."

Bill also recalled the fate of the Washingtonians before 1500 AAs gathered at the annual banquet in New York City on November 7, 1945. "In short, the Washingtonians went out to settle the world's affairs before they had learned to manage themselves. They had no capacity for minding their own business. The negatives within them overthrew the positives."

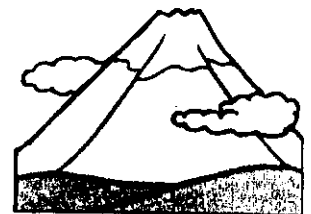
"That won't happen here," Bill urged in closing, "if we remember, publicly and privately, our own simple principles of honesty, tolerance and humility, and that we live only by the grace of God."

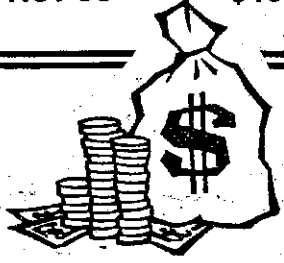
