A.A.'S BEGINNINGS HERE: COLLECTED CORRESPONDENCE

PART FOUR in a continuing series taken from letters exchanged with New York.

The San Antonio Light ran a front-page article on Sunday, January 22, 1950 about San Antonio's two A.A. clubrooms. A copy of the article was included in the packet of letters exchanged with New York. The article is reprinted here:

(headline:)

WATER WAGON BARS POUR MAINLY JAVA

San Antonio's two most exclusive and swank clubrooms are those used by Alcoholics Anonymous, a bunch of self-styled retired drunks helping each other remain in retirement.

Each has a bar. Explained a member: "Every A.A. likes to put his foot on a rail."

But the liquid that flows like wine across the bars is coffee -- strong, hot and usually straight.

One is the Sahara Club, the dry spot for the Downtown A.A. Group, at 1221 N. Navarro St., and the other is Club 12 at 203 E. Josephine St.

Both are spacious, beautifully and luxuriously furnished, and convivial. Said a proud member:

"Most people think of our clubrooms as a place where a bunch of drunks are trying to get over a jag."

But the rooms are usually full of sober men and women who have discovered a new way of life they like and want to share with others.

Many of them are talented, intelligent, witty and gay. One remarked:

"We have more fun than people -- or even drunks."

The membership of the two clubs, totaling about 140, includes writers, artists, business men, and persons of above average intellectual levels who realized in time alcoholism was their personal failure and tragedy.

The only requirement for membership is an honest desire to stop drinking. One member explained the success of the A.A. program:

"A drunk who is drinking won't listen to anyone except a drunk who has quit drinking."

They refer to themselves as retired drunks and alcoholics. As one explained,

"Once an alcoholic, always an alcoholic."

A.A. members don't go on the wagon -- that's for social drinkers. They go "on the program". And they say no matter how long an A.A. has been on the program, he is still just one drink removed from a drunk.

It's the first--not the last-- drink they don't take. Their non-drinking is on a 24-hour basis. They believe any man can fight the battle for just one day -- with no remorse for yesterday and no dread of tomorrow.

Club 12, named for the 12 steps which form the A.A. program, is on the country club order. It has a golf course at its front door and a large picture window of the main clubroom overlooks a swimming pool.

There are poker dens and a "quiet" room. The "quiet" room is where persons seeking help are taken for friendly talks and discussions of mutual problems.

An auxiliary is composed of wives whose help is necessary for the successful application of the program.

Every alcoholic carries a disc in his pocket with his loose change. On it are his name and the date of his last drink.

The clubs are operated for A.A., a non-profit group, as a business and as a center of social activities. Each Tuesday their meetings are open to the public and each Friday only to members and problem drinkers interested in joining.

"Backsliding is like cheating at solitaire. A.A. is a lifeboat. If you jump out, it's sink or swim back to it," a member explained.

The first complaint they receive from a drunk who wants to "retire" is:

"I don't know what to do with myself."

That's where his "sponsor" comes in.,

Under the wing of his sponsor, the new member discovers self-respect and confidence. Soon, he knows the true meaning of the sign above the rostrum of the A.A. meeting room:

"But For the Grace of God." (end of article)

St. Peter said, "That's worth 9,983 points. You're in."

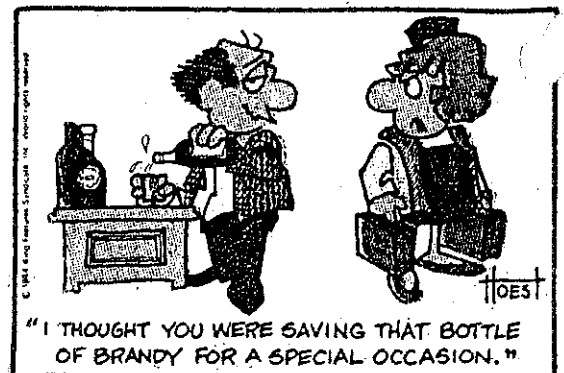

Roy Y. Remembers: A Talk with the First A.A. in Texas PART I

Roy Y., born in San Antonio in 1906, went on to carry the message of recovery from alcoholism across the United States.

Roy, now of Kerrville, was the first A.A. member in Texas.

"I hopped a freight train from Texas to Los Angeles when I was 17; I died in California, and I was reborn in Houston," Roy said.

It was a new A.A. convert from Ohio named Larry Jewell who came to Houston and shared the message of recovery with Roy.

Roy tells how it happened: "I spent my last 15 cents for a cot in a flophouse. It was dark and I was scared. That night I prayed for God to show me the way.

"And I promptly forgot about the prayer.

"The next day I heard about A.A."

Roy's introduction to the fledgling fellowship came when a former employer told him about articles on A.A. that were to start running in the Houston Press. The articles had been written by Larry, who was a newspaperman and one of the earliest A.A. members in Ohio.

Larry's six articles on A.A. were a condensation of the Big Book and were later sent out by the New York office as an introduction when many inquiries about the fellowship were received from across the nation.

Larry, who was frail and ill, had come to Texas for health reasons. And it was through the newspaperman's influence that Roy became the first A.A. in Texas to get sober and stay sober. Roy's sobriety date is September of 1940.

As Roy looks back, he realizes that he was not himself that day after his prayer in the flophouse.

He had stopped by to see his former employer fully intent on giving the man a big snow job and talking him out of a few bucks.

Instead, Roy recalls being astonished at hearing himself saying, "Luke, this drinking thing is worse than ever. I have tried to put on the brakes and I can't."

It was at that time that Luke told Roy about "this new thing called A.A."

which was to be the subject of the newspaper articles.

After he read the articles, Roy relate "I realized there was another guy like me. Up to that time I had thought that I was the only person like me."

The articles had instructed interested persons to telephone "Mr. Anonymous" at the newspaper office. It took Roy a week of trying to reach the mysterious Mr. Anonymous, who turned out to be Larry.

Roy said, "Bill Wilson and I used to discuss the 'casualties' of A.A. Larry, the newspaperman, turned out to be one of the casualties. He was a brilliant man. And nobody contributed more to A.A. in the beginning."

Roy explained that Larry got disgruntled with A.A., stayed away, and wound up drunk.

Roy, however, carried on with the same zeal with which he had begun.

"A whole bunch of us would descend on this poor guy lying in bed minding his own business, not bothering anybody, with his aspirin and bay rum on the bedside table," Roy said, chuckling. "On a Friday night we might have 10 or 12 prospects rounded up. By Monday morning it would be back to Larry and me."

The first meetings in Houston were held in a rented room in the YWCA.

"The rent was \$1.50 a week. At one point we were \$18 behind in our rent," Roy said.

"In those days, nobody had a car, nobody had any money. Larry was our leader. We had no format by which to hold a meeting, so meetings were developing in all kinds of different ways all across the country.

"Our meetings were divided into two parts. In the first part, Larry did all the talking. He gave the inspirational part of the meeting. Then the women, alcoholic or not, would go into another room and the men would have a discussion."

When some friction developed in the group, someone suggested that Roy split off from the original group and form a new group.

Roy chuckled as he remembered saying, "Oh, I couldn't do that. I wouldn't do anything to hurt A.A."
