GSR Meeting Minutes

(June 23, 1985, 7 p.m., Club 12)

Donna T., Chairman, introduced new GSR's: Jerry S., House of Yuki, Joe L., Northeast Group, Joan L., Alternate, Oblate Group, Susan R., Mobud Thursday Step Study, Chris B., Alternate, Freedom Group, Linda G., Gratitude Group, Leann S., Alpha House, and Carla G., Brookhollow Group.

Administrative Reports: Janis H. reported that Sunny M. is working hard to put the books on the computer. The current month's report indicates a deficit. Hospitals & Institutions: No report. Penal: Don S. reported for the visits to the men's unit at Huntsville. Two visitations took place this last month; volunteers are needed for the last weekend in July. Carolyn P. reported that 2 or 3 women will go to Huntsville to speak to the female prisoners. Public Information: Absent, no report. Editorial: no report.

Old Business: Janis H. reported the 12 step list for phone volunteers has been updated. She confirmed the experiences of phone volunteers that indeed the list did contain deceased or drunk persons. However, the new list is active 12 steppers only.

New Business: Volunteers for the VA Hospital's Friday orientation will be furnished as requested. Mr. Vara, Mental Health Officer for Bexar County, presented to the GSR's information on the procedures to follow to obtain a commitment. His office number Monday-Friday, until 5:30, is 220-2536, after hours number is available at the CSO. Mr. Vara explained that two papers are needed: (a) physician's certificate of medical examination and (b) a petition for committal. Physician's certificates can be obtained during office hours from Dr. Sparks, County psychiatrist, or at the Medical Clinic, 227 Old Gilbeau Road. Mr. Vara suggested using Medical Center Hospital emergency room if de-tox has already been tried. He pointed out that the V.A. will not take a court commitment, only the state hospital. He also suggested that it is best to have the family sign the petition for commitment. The court cost is \$126.50; physician's fee not reported.

Jane, from the Crisis Stabilization Center (de-tox), 1217 N. Frio, also addressed the GSR's. She informed the group that 15 voluntary beds are available for detox for males and 9 beds for females. A physician is on duty from 6 p.m. Friday through 6 a.m. Monday. A recent meeting with police department officials may yield more beds for detox in the future. Jane suggested taking the individual to detox rather than calling the police.

Janis H. requested groups to contact the CSO for any deletions or additions of meetings as the meeting directory is being updated.

A mini-conference, set for August 31, was approved by the GSR's. Aggie Park has been secured for the barbque and two speakers. GSR's have agreed to support the conference by ticket sales.

A 3-day annual conference, set for February 7 - 9, was voted on and approved except for two dissenting votes. More information to follow.

SAME SONG - SECOND VERSE!

That question comes out in the Ask-it-Basket, is often the topic for discussion at district meetings and any where service is discussed. HOW CAN WE INTEREST MORE PEOPLE IN SERVICE? There may be another side to that question: Why aren't more people interested in service?

CHORUS: Bring a newcomer with you.
Have a traditions meeting

It doesn't rhyme, I wonder why? (It also does not work very well). Is there a better way? Is there another way?

Yes, there is an alternative and it is vastly more than that. It is Service Work in A. A. There you will find release from care, worry and boredom. Your imagination will be fired. Life will mean something at last. The most satisfactory years of your existence lie ahead. Thus we find Service Work and so will you.

That may be taken from page 152 of the Big Book (but I wouldn't bet on it!).

The pertinent question is, WHY? Tradition Eleven says our public relations are based on attraction rather than promotion. That refers to our method of reaching the drunk outside of the fellowship. Attraction is a powerful magnet. With it we pull drunks out of the bedroom closet in a Dallas penthouse; the same attraction brings them out from under a bridge in Houston. Our members come from the most varied backgrounds and they come to this fellowship all over the world. We must be very attractive to draw over a million alcoholics ... so then is Service Work not attractive? Probably not. If service work were the Area Conference would be held in Madison Square Garden. Workshops do not draw the crowds, like Bingo games at Club 12 or dances at the Jamboree. The atmosphere at a dance is one of fellowship and convivialty. Is it not that way at a service function? If it is not, perhaps we should examine ourselves. Is our demeanor not attractive? Do we put the newcomer at ease, even though he can't dance and doesn't know the terminology, err, I mean the words to the song? Is the newcomer a wallflower at a workshop? If we are truly attractive to the newcomer

they would beat the door down to get in!

CHECKLIST

Symptoms Leading to Relapse

1) **EXHAUSTION:** Don't allow yourself to become overly tired or your general health to become poor. Good health and enough rest are important. If you feel well you are apt to think well. Feel poorly and your thinking is apt to deteriorate. Feel bad enough and you might begin thinking a drink couldn't make it any worse.

2) **DISHONESTY:** This begins with a pattern of unnecessary little lies and deceptions with fellow workers, friends and family. Then come important lies to yourself. This is called rationalizing - making excuses for not doing what you want to do, or for doing what you know you should not do.

3) **IMPATIENCE:** Things are not happening fast enough. Or, others are not doing what they should or what you want them to do.

4) **ARGUMENTATIVENESS:** Arguing small and ridiculous points of view indicates a need always to be right. "Why don't you be reasonable and agree with me?"

5) **DEPRESSION:** Unreasonable and unaccountable despair may occur in cycles and should be dealt with and talked about.

6) **FRUSTRATION:** At people and also because things may not be going your way. Remember, everything is not going to be just the way you want it.

7) **SELF-PITY:** "Why do these things always happen to me?" "Why must I be an Alcoholic?" "Nobody appreciates all I'm doing for them."

8) **COCKINESS:** Got it made -- no longer fears using alcohol -- going into drinking situations to prove to others you have no problem. Do this often enough and it can wear down defenses.

9) **COMPLACENCY:** "Drinking was the furthestest thing from my mind." Not drinking was no longer a conscious thought either! It is dangerous to let up on defenses because everything is going well. To have a little fear is always a good thing. Some AA members believe more relapses occur when things are going well than when we have problems to deal with.

10) **EXPECTING TOO MUCH FROM OTHERS:** "I've changed - why hasn't everyone else?" It's a plus if they do change, but it is not your problem if they do not. They may not trust you yet, and may still be looking for further proof. You cannot expect others to change their lifestyle just because you have changed yours.

11) **LETTING UP ON DISCIPLINE:** This can stem either from complacency or boredom. You cannot afford to be bored with your program.

12) **FORGETTING GRATITUDE:** You may be looking negatively on your life, concentrating on problems that still are not totally correct. Nobody wants to be a pollyanna, but it is good to remember where you started from and how much better life is now.

13) **"IT CAN'T HAPPEN TO ME"** - This is dangerous thinking. Almost anything can happen to you and is more likely to if you become careless. Remember you have a progressive disease, and you will be in worse shape if you relapse.

14) **OMNIPOTENCE:** This is a feeling that results from a combination of the above. You may have all the answers for yourself and others. No one can tell you anything. You ignore the suggestions or advice from others. Relapse is probably imminent unless drastic changes take place.

REMEMBER: We all have another drunk left in us...but do we have another recovery?

About Alcoholism

John Coakley Lettson (1792), a gifted Quaker physician, biologist and social reformer, had outstanding powers of observing the human condition. He was perhaps the first to consider alcoholism per se as a disease. In 1786, he read a paper before the Medical Society of London, later published in the Proceedings of that Society. In a description of the treatment of dyspepsia, in people who have indulged in hard drinking, he intimates that he is aware that alcoholism occurs in women as well as in men, and that he knows that it is more likely to develop in those whose situations in life have undergone a change. He also describes anorexia, pyloric stenosis secondary to peptic ulcer, and pancreatitis in alcoholics.

Dr Thomas Trotter (1804) was another early medical writer on alcoholism, and was the first to provide his students with a more complete catalog of alcohol-related disorders and diseases. He cites a list of conditions induced by repeated drunkenness in a little book first published in 1802. These include apoplexy, epilepsy, hysteria, fearful dreams, madness, melancholy, inflammatory disease of the liver, gout, schirrus, jaundice, dyspepsia, dropsy, emaciation, impotency, diabetes, premature old age, and in children... dullness, drowsiness, and stupidity. Discussing the anorexia of alcoholism, he writes "even when some appetite remains, the food gives no support" - an excellent description of alcoholic cachexia.
