NEWS FROM NEW YORK:

- * A new biography of Bill Wilson has been approved and will be published this fall.
- * A proposed A.A. pamphlet for gay alcoholics has been scrapped. It was felt that A.A. would be engaging in a controversy were such a pamphlet to be published.
- * A new A.A. Service Manual has been approved. It will include a strong recommendation that A.A. groups offer financial reimbursement for expenses incurred by GSRs and DCMs at service conferences and workshops.
- * The Southwest Regional Forum will be in Dallas in December of 1985.
- * Contributions to the General Service Office in New York are up and there is every reason to be optimistic about the future of A.A.

So reported Jim R. of Harlingen, the Southwest Texas area delegate to the General Service Conference. Jim made a report at the Winners Club on May 19 after his trip to the conference in New York City.

Jim was one of 91 delegates at the conference. The annual conference makes recommendations to A.A. World Services, Inc. and to the Grapevine, Inc.

It is also found on Page 196 of the book Alcoholics Anonymous Comes of Age, where it tells how A.A. first became aware of the Serenity Prayer.

A. A. BACK HOME

A.A. is the same everywhere, yet different! San Antonio's rapid growth has brought many people to A.A. here who have much to share about A.A. "back home." In this new Nightcap feature, write and tell us how it was where YOU came from! -- Editor

I recently moved to Texas from the cold, cold north. The meetings in Cleveland, Ohio, where I came into A.A., are conducted quite differently from here. Eighty percent of the meetings are "lead" meetings. They are not run by the clock. Every meeting starts, or tries to start, on time, but it is hard to say when they will end.

In Cleveland, no matter when I went to a meeting, I went with great anticipation, knowing that I was in for a real good, enlightening evening.

Upon entering a meeting hall, one is greeted by two to four official greeters at the door welcoming you. If you are new to that particular group, the greeter will soon find somebody to take care of you.

Coffee is served before -- not during -- the meeting. The chairman introduces the speaker for the evening, whose "lead" consists of: how it was, how he came into the program, how it is now, and how he is working his program. Many people down here think a "lead" meeting would be largely a drunkalog. This is not so.

After the lead is through, the chairman makes a few comments and then opens the meeting for members to make comments. Every lead is not good, but it is still someone's story. But always something could be had from the comments made afterwards.

At the close of the meeting, the fellowship began. Coffee and donuts, or whatever, was served, and this always turned out to be a happy time. Nobody was rushing out the door; nobody looked at their watches. After all, when we were in the bars, the only time we looked at the clock was when it was close to the closing hour and we were trying to get as many drinks as possible beforehand.

I was so impressed with every meeting I went to in the North, including Canada,

Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey. Everywhere I went, I was welcome, people were happy, help was at hand -- if only to say, "Gee, you sure look good tonight." Such a feeling of fellowship in all the halls. No somber faces. No one allows you to think that a meeting is a chore. It is something to look forward to.

There are discussion meetings, which are conducted pretty much the same way as here, with one big exception: 99% are closed. Large groups are broken down, so that no discussion group at a particular meeting exceeds six or seven people. Again, help is always at hand.

I may have gone into many meetings a stranger, but I never left one a stranger. With my home group, which I tried to attend on a weekly basis, if I missed more than one meeting I was contacted by someone who called to say, "How are you?" just to let me know they cared.

My home group was the West Side Women's, the oldest women's group in the world. A closed women's group, men were invited to be guest speakers.

Secretaries of groups call you for 12th-step work. Not too much volunteering: You're just told that you will be asked and you don't say no.

Kitchen help and greeters are also asked, not volunteered. And again, who in A.A. ever heard of "I'm too busy."?

There is a tremendous fellowship in A.A. in Cleveland, Ohio. Newcomers are encouraged to take part in the fellowship as well as the meetings. Many coffee shops are favorite A.A. hangouts, and you can usually find someone there to talk to if you need help.

I am so glad that I lived in Cleveland on September 11, 1976 when I needed help!

A. A.'s Beginnings Here: Collected Correspondence

PART THREE in a continuing series taken from letters exchanged with New York.

San Antonio AA finally had become an established, stable entity by April 1945, according to a letter that Rosalind Netting wrote to the New York office. Rosalind wrote that the group here was comprised of eight men and two women. Among the members was Frank Bassinberg, who had come from a group in Baltimore, Md.

By October of 1945 a Central Office had been established and stocked with literature. AA here had a mailing address, (Box 644), a phone number (Fannin 2523), and meeting rooms at 207 Fourth St. AA meetings were held on Tuesdays and Fridays at 8 p.m.

San Antonio AA members went to Laredo in 1945 to help Jack Yeaman start a group there. "That is a border town and a hard-drinking one," San Antonio wrote to New York.

In October of 1945 Marie C. Basenberg became secretary of the San Antonio Group. She wrote to New York that San Antonio AA members recently had the pleasure of meeting "Sgt. Roy Y-----, who is now on his way East. We all thought a lot of him." (Editor's note: Roy Y., the first AA in Texas, now lives in Kerrville.)

By January of 1946, group membership stood at 35; Mrs. Ann Huber and Frank Basenberg were listed with New York as contact persons.

In October of 1946, a new San Antonio Group secretary, Penny McCoy, wrote New York to inquire what the duties of a group secretary were.

Penny also noted, "The wives of the alcoholic members are so grateful and thankful for all the grand things that have happened to them that they are anxious to help. . . they want to organize some sort of club."

Peggy Trejo, who became group secretary in 1947, wrote in July of that year to New York to say that the locals had voted to start "an auxiliary of our non-alcoholic relatives."

New York, in letters that followed, shared some ideas with the San Antonians and encouraged them to contact other cities that had groups which were later to become Al-Anon.

In 1948, the San Antonio Central Office stationery carried the slogan, "Fastest-Growing Group in Texas."

A big event that year to which San Antonio AA members flocked was a meeting in Austin on June 18-20 which Bill and Lois Wilson attended.

By the fall of 1949, there were five groups in San Antonio. The groups, their locations, and their secretaries were:

1. Alamo Heights Group, Alamo Heights Methodist Church, Penny McCoy.
2. Club 12 Group, clubroom at 203 E. Josephine St., Jack Doyle.
3. Downtown Group, meetings at the Sahara Club, 503½ W. Commerce, Jim Secrest.
4. Suburban Group (for men only), Gunter Hotel, Walter Payne.
5. Colored Group, meets in homes of members, Julius Cameron.

The Central Office had moved to 919 Travis by September of 1949. Open from 9 to 5 weekdays, the office coordinated 12th step activity among all the groups. Central Office secretary was Otto L. "Doc" Biles, a major figure in San Antonio AA activity.

A weekly general meeting for all AA members in the San Antonio vicinity was held on Tuesday nights at the Municipal Auditorium beginning in September of 1949. The weekly general meetings were sponsored by the five groups in turn.

Elizabeth Harrell, then the San Antonio Central Committee Chairman, wrote a letter to all local AA members, saying, "The rapid growth of AA in San Antonio has necessitated the expansion into several groups. However, only when all AAs within a city gather regularly in furtherance of their common purpose can the fullest strength and combined power of AA's program of living be put to work for all."

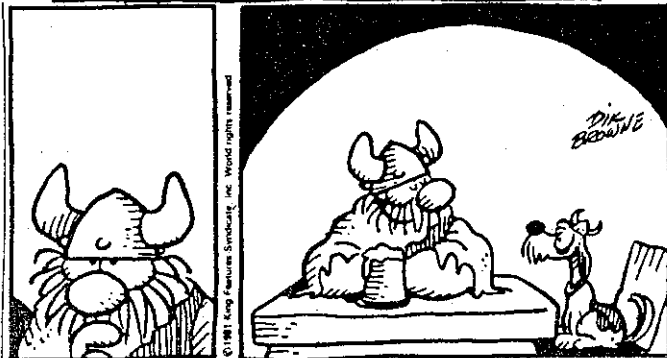
