MAY 21, 1989

The meeting was called to order at 6:35 p.m. by Wilson P., Chairman, with the Serenity Prayer. The Twelve Traditions were read by Don C. Fifty-three persons were present including 5 new GSRs. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved with no additions or corrections. After-hour telephone volunteers were obtained as shown below.

Standing committee reports were as follows: Wayne B., Finance, gave his usual thorough and comprehensive report and answered questions. Paul B., Hospitals & Institutions, (Vice-Chairman), obtained volunteers to take meetings to various H&I's for the month of June (see list below). Tom B., Public Information, reported that his committee answered phones after the Bill W. movie; the Health Fair at SAC was represented by PI; they were at the UTSA Student Health Fair and invited to return next year. Also, volunteers went to the following places since the last GMM: McArthur High School, Mexican American Unity Council, Fort Sam Houston, Brady Green Clinic, Kelly AFB (on a monthly basis). They are to speak at an Area Parole Convention this week and will speak at the Jewish Family Service at DWI classes. They are also getting responses from churches. ### THE MAKINGS OF A GOOD G.S.R.

Two or three years' SOBRIETY is generally the required minimum. ACTIVE MEMBERSHIP in a home group--yours--is also important, and your G.S.R. should HOLD NO OTHER OFFICES in any group.

When well-known people publicly break their AA anonymity, some A.A.'s express delight. "Helps erase the stigma attached to being an alcoholic," is the most often heard defense of such Tradition breaking.

And isn't that just dandy!

If such breaks become prevalent, people may even forget there ever was a stigma attached to alcoholism. Of course they may also forget there ever was AA, as we know it--the most successful program ever, for helping alcoholics recover from the mental, physical, emotional, and spiritual destruction of their disease.

What some seem to forget is that the anonymity tradition is there for those who have not made it to AA yet, as well as for those who have. And surely it is one of the most appealing "attractions" AA has.

It would be interesting to know how many of those who think anonymity breaks are a good thing would have wanted it spread about that they were alcoholics when they first came to the program. Or even now!

"But that's different," they'll exclaim. But!!!!

If breaking anonymity publicly became commonplace and acceptable within the fellowship, there would be no reason to retain that Tradition, would there? Not at any level, neither for the old timer or the newcomer. Ane that, in turn, would eliminate the "protection" we all have against others breaking our anonymity at will, because the basic principle of anonymity itself would no longer be a part of the AA program.

The Traditions are either good, or they are not. They apply to all, or they apply to none. Not just in "special cases," but in all cases. If it became acceptable to break any one tradition they are all in danger.

People who break their anonymity at the level of press, radio, films, and TV have the "freedom" to adhere to tradition or ignore it. They are not to be condemned, but neither are they to be commended or idolized.

There may be something to the claim that knowing about them and AA may encourage others to try the program. However, there is a preponderance of evidence that the opposite is true.

AA may not be perfect, but it is a darned sight better than whatever is second best. The "Program of Recovery" and the Traditions make it so.

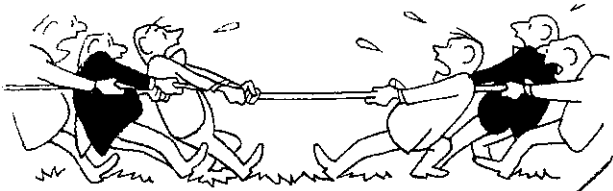

### The Sixth Tradition

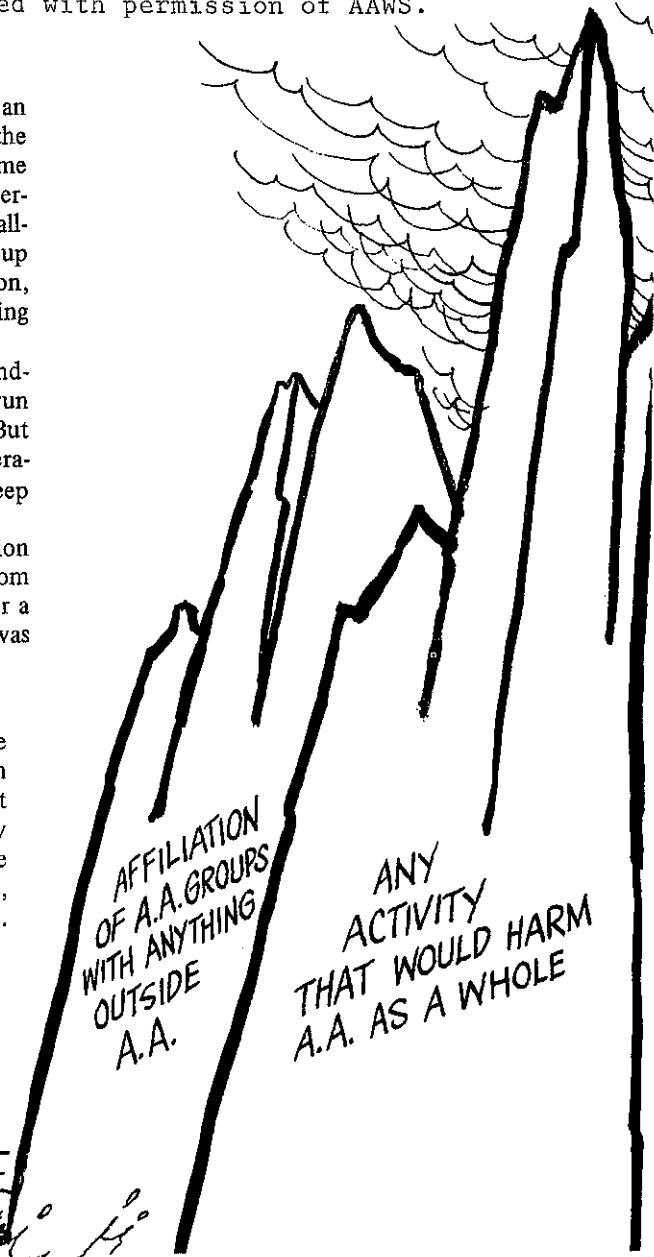
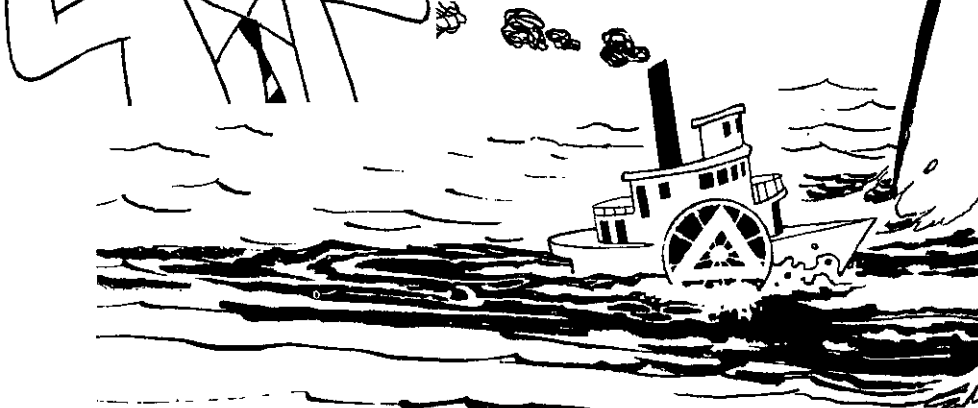
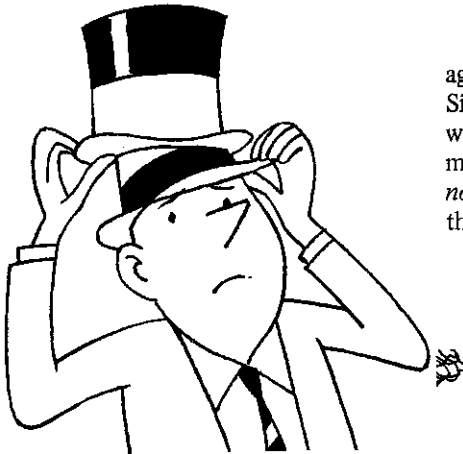
An A.A. group ought never endorse, finance or lend the A.A. name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property and prestige divert us from our primary purpose.

The "related facility" may be an outside group combating alcoholism—or an enterprise that A.A.'s want to start. It was the latter that most often confronted the young Fellowship. Outside agencies were pretty scarce in those days, and some members thought A.A. should cover the whole alcoholism field. Led by a "super-promoter" (as the "Twelve and Twelve" describes him), one group built an all-purpose center, including a section for drying-out treatment. Picture any group tackling such a project! Arguments over cost, architecture, staff, fees, medication, and rules might even make the local paper. (And pity the poor newcomer straying into the group—"We'll get around to you in a minute.")

Though that ambitious center failed, some individual members have since founded successful clubhouses, rest farms, halfway houses, etc. The enterprises are run by these A.A.'s and patronized by other members or prospective members. But money and property are involved. Therefore, it has proved wise to keep the operation of the facility completely separate from that of any A.A. group, and to keep "A.A." or terms like "Twelfth Step" out of the name.

Toward outside agencies dealing with alcoholism, the A.A. policy is "cooperation but not affiliation." A group cooperates, for example, by welcoming referrals from clinics or by sponsoring A.A. groups in institutions. But in one area, money for a rehab was solicited at an A.A. meeting—implying affiliation. In another, A.A. was listed among beneficiaries of a United Fund drive. . . .

A.A. members employed by outside agencies "wear two hats"—but Tradition Six cautions any such members against wearing both at once! On the job, they may be alcoholism counselors; they are not "A.A. counselors." At meetings, they're just A.A.'s, not alcoholism experts.



There are two major danger areas. But our course has been charted and the hazards clearly marked. If we steer clear of them, we should have smooth sailing...

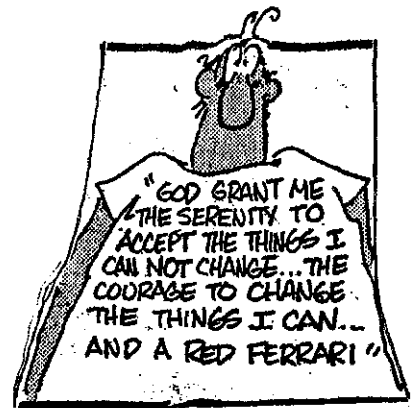

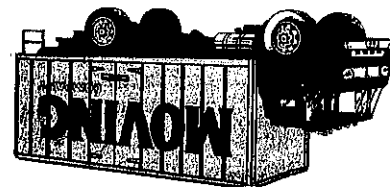
