GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING MINUTES

MAY 20, 1990

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by Bob T., Chairman, with the Serenity Prayer. Eddie read the Twelve Traditions. There were 56 members present, including four new GSRs and two new Alternate GSRs. The "Statement of Participation" was read; the minutes of the previous meeting were approved as published in the May issue of THE NIGHTCAP. The financial report was presented by Al D. which showed that group contributions were down considerably; interest earned on CD was explained. Volunteers for After-Hour phone duty for next 4 weeks were obtained (see list below). Some discussion followed regarding updating 12-Step list.

Committee reports followed: H&I, Eileen G-V, reported that the San Antonio Children's Rehab Center wants meetings brought in on Monday or Wednesday. Children are from 12 to 23 years of age. SASH wants four after-noon meetings per week brought in, plus the regular Monday night meeting. This will be discussed at group level and a decision will be made at the June meeting. Volunteers are needed to serve on this committee. (See list below.) PI, Don N., reported the Young, Sober, and Free Group spoke to 12 groups at three highschools last month. Volunteers are needed for the Military, Service Organizations, and Medical Subcommittees. The next PI Committee meeting will be held on June 13. Jail, John B., absent; however, it was reported that the women's meetings are coming along okay; also need more men volunteers. Convention, Vangie H., absent.

OLD BUSINESS: 1. New meeting place for this meeting recommended by the Board of Trustees is St. Patrick's Church--other suggestions were requested. This will be decided at the June meeting. 2. Books have not been closed on the Weekend in SA Convention--have to wait for the May bank statement.

NEW BUSINESS: 1. Raul M., Intergroupal Hispana Liaison, gave brief history of the Spanish Intergroup Office. They want to establish better communication with CSO. There are four Spanish Intergroups in the State and one is in the process of being formed in the Valley. Assemblies are held which are similar to the Area Workshops. The Spanish Intergroup has a monthly membership meeting on the last Sunday of each month at 3210 W. Commerce. Not only GSRs but any interested AA member is welcome to attend. Elias S. is the office manager; now have 12 AA groups and they contribute to CSO, Area, and GSO. The City of Houston will host the International Spanish Convention this year on August 30, 31, and September 1. The Intergroup has various committees, but they do not duplicate the functions of the CSO committees. 2. A new meeting directory will be printed in June. Need all meeting changes, etc., to be in CSO by May 31, 1990.

CSO REPORT: CSO received a total of 1,028 telephone calls during the month of April; 1414 copies of THE NIGHTCAP were mailed for May; 20 were returned; reminder cards sent to all GSRs to attend the General Membership Meeting. CSO's tax return has been completed by Wayne B., CPA, free of charge. New meeting directory will be published in June.

DCM REPORTS: Mac McC., 1-A, reported they are working on educational program for service work and have 100% of his groups registered in New York. Richard O., 1-B, reported they are working on education program also. Knut H., 1-C, absent, but John reported they are working on defining the district's role. Brenda H., 1-D, absent. Jon K., 1-E, absent. Yolanda F., 1-F, reported they are taking books and other literature to SASH. Tom McM., 1-G, absent.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: Aggieland Convention will be held August 24, 25, & 26.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 7:45 p.m. with the Lord's Prayer.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

I am writing this letter in response to the article on members claiming to be "drug addicts" as well as "alcoholics." I start my talk in meetings with "I'm Bill, and I'm an alcoholic." I say this after 3 years as a grateful alcoholic, because I've found a power greater than myself where there was once a "God-shaped hole." I hit bottom with a whiskey bottle. I felt an intolerance to wine drinkers, they were too "debutante" and to beer drinkers, they were too crude. Drug users, although I dabbled, I believed to be too irresponsible and flighty. I had an ego problem.

Upon coming into AA, I've gained experience in coming to believe that all these were but symptoms of a spiritual malady that could be filled thru using the 12 Steps. A spiritual awakening is occurring within me as a result. The promises are coming true. It all started with the "desire to stop drinking." I suggest the doubter read the example in the TWELVE STEPS AND TWELVE TRADITIONS, Tradition Three, which begins "On the A.A. calendar, it was Year Two."

I have heard many proclaim a fear of AA being "watered-down." This is a worthy concern, as long as I recognize that, "After all, isn't fear the true basis of intolerance?" (TWELVE STEPS AND TWELVE TRADITIONS, Tradition Three.)

THE OTHER SIDE OF SELF-SUPPORT

"Don't worry about paying rent; we're just happy to have an AA group in our church hall."

The two earnest AAs, however, looking respectable in their business suits, immediately declined the clergyman's generous offer.

"Thank you, Reverend, but our Traditions tell us that our group ought to be fully self-supporting. We are grateful for your kindness, but we must pay our own way." And so began a verbal contract with my husband, who was the clergyman, and the founders of what was to become my home group, which met at my church for many, many years.

As time went on, I became more conscious of the full meaning of Tradition Seven, which tells us that every AA group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions. From the beginning, my group declined outside contributions by insisting on paying a fee for the use of the hall, despite the tempting offer of a free ride. The two AAs might have rationalized: "Maybe we should let the church support us. After all, it may be rough getting this group off the ground. We may not be able to afford the fee." But they didn't.

It pleases me to know that my group did not let the church support them in the beginning and this impressed the church. What many of us AAs do not realize, including me (until I "married into the church") is that many of our AA meeting halls are the property of poor, small parishes who struggle to stay open. When my church offered free rent to AA, they were offering the tremendous maintenance costs that a small working-class parish must pay. Like most unendowed churches, we exist from month to month waiting for the pledges to come in. The weekly ten dollar pledge from a church member is vital for paying the clergyman's salary, mortgages, utilities, water, janitor services, paper towels, light bulbs...well, you get the picture.

The words "fully self-supporting" have new meaning for me, examined from both sides. In the past, it seemed reasonable to offer a "donation" to a church in other groups I belong to. A charitable and well intended pastor or institution would suggest a token "rent" and the group would readily accept the offer. We believed that we were observing the Seventh Tradition. But a token is not rent. A token is a partial payment.

I have seen more than one group who paid token rents be asked to leave a facility; the AA group became a financial liability. Other reasons to ask a group to leave might have been superseded if the group had been fully self-supporting.

There are numerous costs to maintaining a site that are not usually factored into even a "full" fee: the wear and tear and replacement of chairs and tables; plumbing, floors and carpets; dirt and smoke damage to ceilings, walls, and windows; heating cost overruns when a group forgets to turn down thermostats and close windows; the cost of paper products, garbage bags, and collection; and the cost from damage, loss, and theft. To a group that feels comfortable in paying a token amount, the burden falls on the church members. My AA group was firm in its commitment, thank God, to be self-supporting.

I have heard it said at a business meeting that "we don't need to raise the amount of our donations toward the rent (after 5 years) because the church hasn't asked for more." Now is that the spirit of Tradition Seven? If we are fully self-supporting through our own contributions, as our Preamble reinforces, then should we put the church in the position of begging money from us? Or should we spare them that indignity and offer rent increases on a regular basis?

Long ago, Bill W. observed, in the groups and in himself, the peculiar phenomenon of our tight-fisted approach when we pass the hat. Way back in the fifties, some groups would say, "Please, if you have it, dig in. The group needs the money to pay the rent. We don't want to 'hear' any noise from loose change, so we won't object to any folding money you choose to drop in!"

Thirty-some years and a quadruple inflation rate later, we tight-fisted alcoholics--who squandered thousands--still see the one dollar bill as the upper limit of our contribution. Speaking for myself, I find no problem with paying a therapist \$80 an hour once a week for my other mental health program. The AA program which saved my life and offers me every bit as much help and healing as my outside program gets the short end of the financial stick from me--a dollar at best. Translated into realistic terms that means: Am I willing to spend the equivalent of a cup of coffee to save my life?

Well, all of these new perspectives on th

...ing of our Twelve Traditions have come from two sources: my life as a clergyman's and my Twelve Step and Twelve Traditions meetings. My eyes are opening to these inspired and brilliant plans for living. The Steps ensure the mental and spiritual growth of the individual; the Traditions ensure the growth of the group.

I have learned another lesson about being a good AA tenant from my experience "on the other side." I learned what a nasty job it is to pick up discarded cigarette butts from lawns and walks, because I am a groundskeeper at my church. Guess who spent many years tossing away butts as I approached a church, a meeting hall, a movie theater? It never mattered that someone would have to pick up after me. Now that 'someone' is me. Yes, it's been a valuable lesson being on the other side.

THE BUCK BARRIER

Our local AA community is experiencing a significant shortage of money; the amount being contributed by groups may not be enough to sustain all services to them. So, we focused on this problem....

A popular ice cream bar costs almost \$1.50. A pack of cigarettes costs almost \$2. A glass of wine or one mixed drink in a pub or nice restaurant would cost \$2.50, \$3, \$3.50 or more. Going to a movie costs \$5.50 or \$6.

Yet, when it comes to being self-supporting through our own contributions and helping provide a very important life raft for others, suddenly we say, "I put a dollar in the basket; what more do you want from me?"

There has been a psychological barrier to contributing more than a dollar at 7th Tradition time, as if there is a law you can't or shouldn't contribute more--even though everything else in America now costs much more...

We would like to invite other groups to discuss these matters in group business meetings (group conscience meetings) and to perhaps vote on a group level to 'Break the Buck Barrier!'

BID COMMITTEE MEETINGS

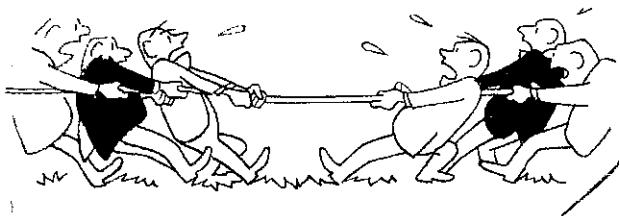

The Sixth Tradition

An A.A. group ought never endorse, finance or lend the A.A. name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property and prestige divert us from our primary purpose.

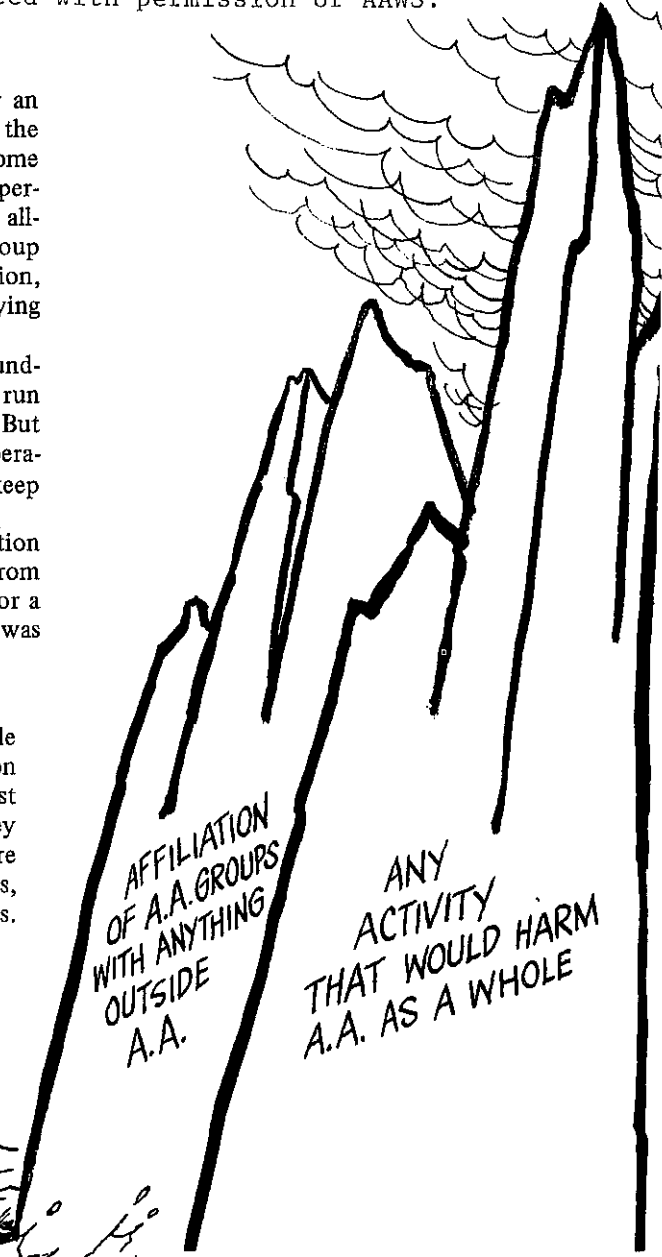
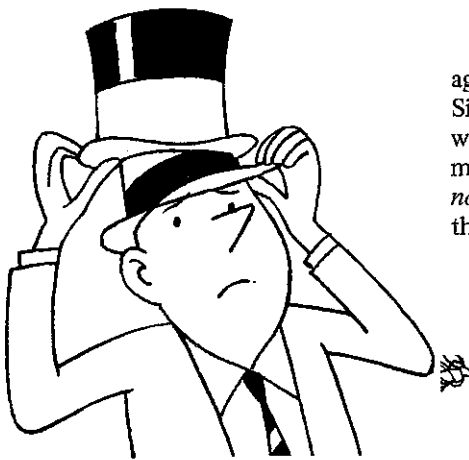

The "related facility" may be an outside group combating alcoholism—or an enterprise that A.A.'s want to start. It was the latter that most often confronted the young Fellowship. Outside agencies were pretty scarce in those days, and some members thought A.A. should cover the whole alcoholism field. Led by a "super-promoter" (as the "Twelve and Twelve" describes him), one group built an all-purpose center, including a section for drying-out treatment. Picture any group tackling such a project! Arguments over cost, architecture, staff, fees, medication, and rules might even make the local paper. (And pity the poor newcomer straying into the group—"We'll get around to you in a minute.")

Though that ambitious center failed, some individual members have since founded successful clubhouses, rest farms, halfway houses, etc. The enterprises are run by these A.A.'s and patronized by other members or prospective members. But money and property *are* involved. Therefore, it has proved wise to keep the operation of the facility completely separate from that of any A.A. group, and to keep "A.A." or terms like "Twelfth Step" out of the name.

Toward outside agencies dealing with alcoholism, the A.A. policy is "cooperation but not affiliation." A group cooperates, for example, by welcoming referrals from clinics or by sponsoring A.A. groups in institutions. But in one area, money for a rehab was solicited *at an A.A. meeting*—implying affiliation. In another, A.A. was listed among beneficiaries of a United Fund drive. . . .

A.A. members employed by outside agencies "wear two hats"—but Tradition Six cautions any such members against wearing both at once! On the job, they may be alcoholism counselors; they are *not* "A.A. counselors." At meetings, they're just A.A.'s, not alcoholism experts.



There are two major danger areas. But our course has been charted and the hazards clearly marked. If we steer clear of them, we should have smooth sailing...

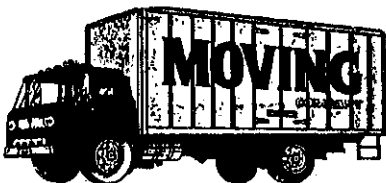
