ANONYMITY

"Since our Tradition on anonymity designates the exact level where the line should be held, it must be obvious to everyone who can read and understand the English language that to maintain anonymity at any other level is definitely a violation of this Tradition.

"The A.A. who hides his identity from his fellow A.A. by using only a given name violates the Tradition just as much as the A.A. who permits his name to appear in the press in connection with matters pertaining to A.A.

"The former is maintaining his anonymity **above** the level of press, radio and films and the latter is maintaining anonymity **below** the level of press, radio and films---whereas the Tradition states that we should maintain our anonymity **at** the level of press, radio and films."

FELLOWSHIP CAN BE COMFORTING

The close fellowship and camaraderie of AA can be a source of great comfort to us. We have only to be faithful in our attendance, and above all, in our participation and support.

No group or organization is any better than its component parts, and **we** are the components. We have only ourselves and each other to depend on. But, in my opinion, if we all do our parts, without selfish motives, this is sufficient.

I also believe that we can trust in the innate goodness of our fellow man and have a certain amount of idealism without sacrificing our common sense.

A resolve to do something is in itself not enough. A resolution that is not followed by action is worse than none at all. We are then assailed by a sense of guilt because we did not have enough guts to carry it through.

Even without attempting to influence anyone else, each of us can so order our own life to where we are comfortable with ourselves. If at the same time we set a good example, what's wrong with that?

THE OTHER SIDE OF THE COIN

With all due respect to P.M.'s (Riverside, IL.) opinions published in the GRAPEVINE, Oct. '81, and reprinted in the NIGHTCAP in the May '96 issue, I feel compelled to respond with a few of my own opinions---the "other side of the coin" you might say.

While it is true that a "dry" alcoholic usually is not contented or serene one, AA's method of recovery certainly involves **more** than working the steps and going to meetings. The "psychic change" mentioned on page xxvii of the Big Book is further facilitated by getting and using a sponsor to guide a newcomer through the Steps, introduce them to other experienced AA's and generally passing on wisdom gained from their sponsor and years of experience.

Getting a **HOME GROUP** and serving therein is also recommended. Eventually becoming involved in the service structure, i.e., CSO volunteer, COR, GSR, etc., is equally important---NOT to take the place of working the Steps!

And, enough cannot be said regarding developing a relationship with your Higher Power and learning to practice Step 3.

The main reason for my response, however, is to say that we members of AA are not doctors but are referred to those professionals on page 133 of the Big Book. Members with medical diagnoses of manic-depression, clinical depression, PTSD, schizophrenia, etc., require medication(s) in order to even sit in a meeting., read a book or talk with people. They ought not be ridiculed or made to feel guilty of their particular illness (in addition to alcoholism) by the fellowship.

Yes, Mr. or Mrs. P.M., my sponsor with 32 years of sobriety knew a young lady who was in her first year of sobriety when a "well meaning" AA member warned her that taking pills is not being sober. The girl promptly threw out her pills and within a short period of time proceeded to kill herself. "Masking the symptoms with a mood changing drug?" I think not.

Furthermore, many of us require surgery for various physical problems. Case in point: again,, my beloved sponsor required three back surgeries within a 5-year period due to a traffic accident. After MUCH suffering she finally (reluctantly) consented to take pain pills on order of her doctor. Sorry P.M., the Steps just couldn't take away the pain.

Finally, on page 140 (May 11) of the DAILY REFLECTIONS appears "with the help of AA and *extra counseling the pain of buried emotions was released*".

I do NOT believe psychotherapy should ever be used in place of the Steps, nor do I believe therapists should do 12th Step work, i.e., listen to a 5th Step and charge a fee for it (yes, it has been done). But again, we are not qualified to help a person who may NEVER have the "capacity to be honest" (page 58 of the Big Book).
