A big welcome to THE WINNERS CLUB

It happened almost overnight. The Winners Club has changed from a dreary, drafty barnlike building to a lovely, inviting AA clubhouse.

"I never would have believed it could look this nice," one AA member said. "The people behind this obviously had a lot of imagination and a lot of vision."

The transformation at 5719 Mobud did indeed take the vision and the hard work of many dedicated AAs.

In June of 1983, talk grew serious about starting an AA club in northwest San Antonio.

"San Antonio is large enough to support ten AA clubs," said Shalon T., the Winners' fundraising committee chairman. And for a long time there was only Club 12 (the granddaddy of local AA clubs), bilingual Unity Club, and the groups.

There was a false start. "At the first location we picked, we believe the problem was that nearby retailers didn't want us there," Shalon said.

Then the search turned up the location on Mobud: former rendering plant, former garage, former water treatment plant. The club has a five-year lease on the building at \$800 per month.

An air-conditioning and heating system, a new ceiling, a coat of offwhite paint, drapes, lighting fixtures and furniture groupings appeared. With only days to go before the grand opening Feb. 18, chairman of the club's board of directors Alex G. coordinated the covering of the concrete floor with linoleum tiles and built a handsome speaker's podium. Jack L. acquired a loudspeaker system; Ray A. donated "smoke-eaters." The AAs who gave their time and contributed materials are many.

Winners Club charter memberships are available at \$150, either in a lump sum or in installments, in addition to the \$15 per month which a regular member pays. The club now has 70 members, of whom 50 are charter members.

However, the club is open at all times to all AAs, whether members or not. "We wanted it to be for the people who needed it, not just for the people who could afford it," Shalon said. "We felt very strongly about that."

The club's co-founders Len N. and Sunny M. have shunned official positions but have stayed busy in the background. Sunny has been ill of late, but Len has been coordinating the organization of groups that meet at the club.

"After all, that's the main reason we're here -- to give groups a place to meet," Len said.

Currently the Winners Club hosts 10 groups and 11 meetings. Many of the original members had their roots in the Colonies North group.

Volunteers are needed to keep the club open during the day, Shalon said. They need not be Winners members, she added.

The club is looking for a custodian to live on the premises and keep the facility open about 13 hours a day.

Meanwhile, work is not finished. The kitchen is next on the remodeling agenda. A room for discussion meetings and an Al-Anon room will be fixed up.

"We don't have an Al-Anon meeting yet," Shalon said. "We're waiting for someone to start one."

From ELVES S.:

The concept of alcoholism as an illness was entirely new to me when I first came to this program.

I had tried to stop drinking many times but had never succeeded, even though I wanted desperately to quit. I had begun to think that I was crazy, or had no will power, or maybe I was just "no good."

But now I realize that I was, and always will be, allergic to alcohol, just as the diabetic is allergic to sugar.

So far as we know today, alcoholism cannot be cured. But it can be arrested just as the diabetic can arrest his illness and lead a normal life so long as he continues to take insulin. Without insulin, of course, the diabetic may die.

The program works somewhat the same way. By staying away from the first drink, I can cope with my problem. The program is the "insulin" that lets me lead a normal life in spite of my illness.

A lot of people had tried to help me in the old days when I was still drinking. But they weren't alcoholics themselves. They couldn't put themselves in my shoes because they had never been through what I

had been through. They tried to be helpful, but they didn't really understand.

When I finally surrendered to the bottle -- when I knew I had to give it up -- I found people who didn't lecture me or tell me I should be able to drink like a gentleman. They simply demonstrated that they understood my problem. They told me they had been able to lick the problem of alcoholism in their lives and that I could do the same if I honestly wanted to.

They reminded me that I had to want sobriety for myself -- not because my relatives or my boss wanted it for me. They told me that I had a choice: I could keep on drinking if I wanted to, but I should understand that my problem would probably become worse. Or I could stop drinking, as they had, and lead the kind of life that I had once thought possible.

But only I could make that choice. No one could make it for me.

When I faced up to the facts, it wasn't too difficult a choice. The record showed that I couldn't control alcohol. It was controlling me. Once I admitted the fact, once I conceded the fact that I really was an alcoholic, it simply made sense to follow the example of my new friends.

In this program I have found not just sobriety, but happy sobriety. I don't feel that I have given up anything. I feel, instead, that I have gained a new way of life.

Formed 20 years ago, the "24" has been the birthplace of countless AA members. Hundreds of members have sobered up at the 24 and moved on to become active in other groups. The 24, although a small group, has a very ambitious program. Two speakers meetings and nine discussion meetings a WEEK, plus handling 50 to 100 12th-step calls a month, keep all members very active, and contribute to a lot of good sobriety.

In addition, the 24 holds a covered dish dinner the last Sunday of each month (\$2.50 for all you can eat) at 4 p.m., followed by a discussion meeting at 6:30.

The 24 is currently seeking speakers for the Wednesday 8:15 and the Saturday 10:15 p.m. speakers meetings. In exchange, the 24 has 10 speakers who will volunteer to speak at other groups. Call me at the 24 any night between 8 and 10 for scheduling.

The group's name means we stay sober 24 hours a day. A misconception that we're open around the clock has arisen because other 24-hour groups in Texas are. However, if anybody would volunteer, we'll put a call-forwarding on our phone so it can be answered 24 hours a day.

Let's "spread it around" so we can keep it. See you at the 24. . .

12-STEP CALLS

A1 D. reported that the cards listing persons willing to go on 12-step calls needs to be updated. There are many members who are not aware of the list, or who have filled out a card in the past and wish their name to be removed. The GSRs will take this up with their groups when the occasion arises. The GSRs can return filled out cards to the CSO.

AFTER-HOURS PHONE CALLS

This list of 12-step people will be included in the after-hours calls package. This "Procedures Guidelines" will be a packet of do's and don'ts for volunteers receiving after hours CSO calls. There will be a list of meetings broken down by areas, an A.A. directory, handy phone numbers and meeting information. Many of the GSRs talked to their groups and the groups were favorably responsive to this after-hour service. A1 explained that most of the after-hours calls to the CSO are general information calls, e.g. out-of-town A.A.s looking for a meeting, Alanon information calls, etc.

The GSRs are responsible for informing group members of their responsibility if they volunteer for this valuable service. A firm commitment is necessary from the member before he/she volunteers. The GSR will be the coordinator of the after-hours calls to CSO for the group.

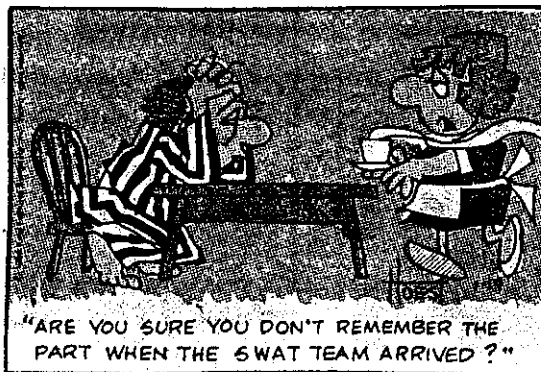

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THE PHONE IS RINGING

"I've been on the 12th-step list for years and have never been called on to make a 12th-step call."

"I tried to call AA last night and got an answering service."

Those have been frequently heard complaints at the Central Service Office. And because your group conscience has dictated it, these and other things are about to change.

The 12th-stepper file kept on Rolodex cards at the central office has seen too little use in recent years. Gradually, it has become a matter of whoever happens to be at the office calling whoever they happen to know to handle the 12th-step requests that the office receives.

But at this writing, AA members throughout the city are completing new 12th-stepper cards which will be instrumental in putting to use a practical, workable guide to local 12th-steppers.

And, after years of on-again/off-again debate, an AA member-manned phone system gets off the ground March 5. Local AA members, through their groups, have decided to take on the responsibility of handling phone calls to AA when the Central Service Office is closed.

Phone calls average about 3 or 4 per night. On a typical night, the AA member manning his or her home phone (to which AA calls had been forwarded) would perhaps receive:

- * A call from an out-of-towner wanting to know where he can attend a meeting;
- * A call from a woman who wants to know how she can "make" her husband stop drinking;
- * And possibly calls from persons wanting to talk about their own drinking problems.

If a 12th-step call is warranted, the new listing of 12th-steppers would come into play. The listing is numerically arranged by telephone prefix; if a call for help comes in from a person with a 696- (northwest) prefix and if that's your prefix and if you're on the 12th-step list, there is a good chance you will be called.

So, whether as a 12th-stepper or on phone duty, you now have two opportunities to carry the message and become a vital part of your AA community. Call us at the CSO if you have any questions.

AA BACK HOME

(AA is the same everywhere, yet different! San Antonio's rapid growth has brought many people to AA here who have much to share about AA "back home." In this new Nightcap feature, write and tell us how it was where YOU came from.)

When I came into AA out in West Texas, we didn't have different kinds of meetings. We just had plain old AA meetings. As other kinds of meetings were introduced by people moving into our town from elsewhere, the kind of meeting that we were used to became known as a regular meeting ("reg'lur meetin'"). This year I learned that the type of meeting we favored is known in fancier AA circles as a "podium participation" meeting. The chairman would call on people at random: "Jim Bob, git up here and tell us how it works."

Whether there were 5 of us present or 50, the person called upon would shuffle up to the podium. Even if he didn't feel like talking, he still felt obligated to get up and give his sobriety date: "My name is Bill and I'm an alcoholic and I've been sober since July 20 of this year and I pass." ("If a person don't get up and give his sobriety date, it just might be that he don't HAVE one," the hardnosed oldtimers maintained.)

When a man from up north came down to my little town and started a discussion meeting like he was accustomed to, several of us attended and liked it. One local oldtimer, a crusty old doctor who was set in his ways, did not. He decided to start another meeting at the same time as the new discussion meeting.

"A reg'lur meetin'," he explained.
