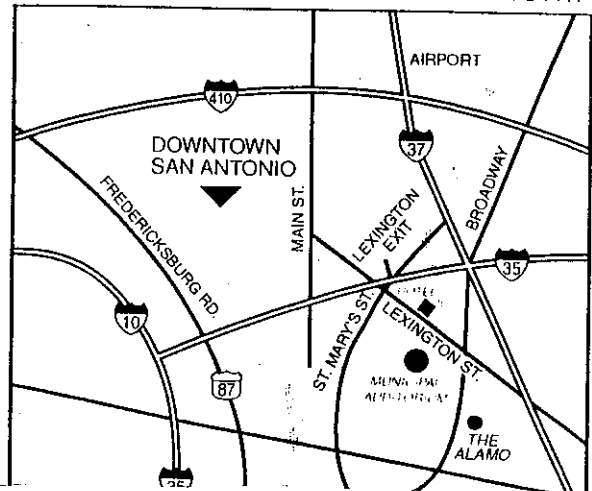

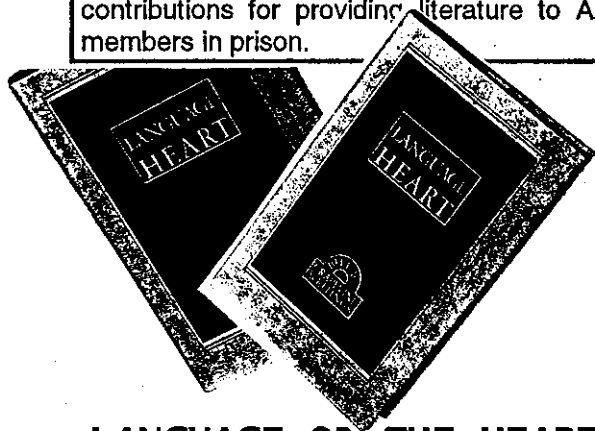

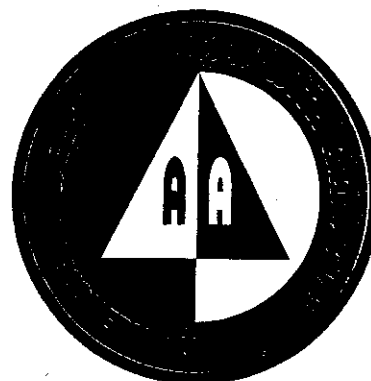

Bill W., on that historic day in the Akron hotel lobby, did not leave a note with the desk clerk to the effect that he would be waiting in his room reading the papers in case an inquiring alcoholic stumbled in wanting help. Today, though, much Twelve Step work is conducted on just such a premise. "Let the bum find us" is a disturbingly pervasive attitude, and it is contrary to every historic and traditional principle established in the early days of A.A.,

The Big Book itself is the result of a monumental, thoroughly unlikely series of events designed to *actively* share what had become "the great news" for our founders. Initial motives, dreams of money and fame, are beside the point. The only important point is that our visionary predecessors courageously tackled an audacious enterprise, which gave us this incredible gift of real living.

Today, some critical, unknowledgeable AA's strongly oppose local public information use of the media and efforts to communicate with the public in person. They shout accusations of tub-banging, book-thumping evangelism at best, and charge promotion and Tradition violation at worst. Such members are seemingly unacquainted with co-founder Bill W.'s words "obviously, AA had to be publicized somehow," and the fact that the most powerful magnet cannot attract the desired object without first being within specific proximity to it.

The words "attraction rather than promotion" in the Eleventh Tradition, referring to our public relations policy, assume that we *have* a public relations policy to begin with. Because our reason for existence is "to stay sober and help others to achieve sobriety," our own hard-won sobriety depends in great measure on finding means of reaching the public. The still-suffering alcoholic *is* the public until we get the message to him.

The long form of the Eleventh Tradition says we ought to avoid sensational advertising and instead depend upon our friends to recommend us. Those who do not bother to inform themselves do not know that we have, historically and practically, found it necessary to cultivate and value such friends. In the *Twelve Concepts for World Service* (page 54) Bill says, "We need to be on still better terms with medicine, religion, employers, mental hospitals, courts, governments, prisons, and all enterprises in the alcoholism field. We need increasing goodwill of editors, writers, television and radio channels.

These publicity outlets need to be opened even wider." To this list we can add educators, because of the continuing appeals for information from grade schools, high schools and colleges.

Somebody must responsibly contact these people: God doesn't come down and whisper in the ears of editors, TV station owners and others, telling them to get out some AA material. If that were the standard method, He would not need us. If we timidly refuse to discharge that responsibility, how can we hope to reduce the stigma on alcoholism and lessen its lethal potential for others?

Shortly after Bill W.'s well-known spiritual experience, the thought came to him that he might be able to help some of the thousands of still-suffering alcoholics, and that they in turn could help many others. AAs everywhere seem to have lost sight of the fact that, instead of fewer alcoholics out there yet to be reached, there are now many, many more.

Others in the field of alcoholism are "explaining" AA to vast numbers of people daily---because we are refusing to do it. If you've never listened to non-member professional explain AA, you're not keeping abreast of the state of the art. Your imagination will not even come close to the distortions and misinformation that sometimes occur.

But these professionals are not to be faulted; *we* are. Even Congress came close to receiving a document about us written by non members and described by a GSO staff member as "a dog." By the grace of God and some dedicated public information footwork, GSO was given an opportunity to rewrite it before it went to Congress.

A traveling member recently discovered to his dismay that AA in a large Eastern city was all but a secret society. While there, he went to work tirelessly, against considerable opposition, to set up some exceedingly successful PI projects. Today in that city, thanks to the traveler's efforts, many citizens know some basic facts about AA.

With so many other enterprises,, both public and private, in the field of alcoholism today, we are experiencing a widespread reduction in our usual Twelfth Step opportunities. For our own well-being and continued sobriety, we must search out every possible avenue for conducting the public information phase of Twelfth Step work.

There are well-meaning individual zealots who go out on their own with blaring sensationalism and over dramatization to "tell the AA story."

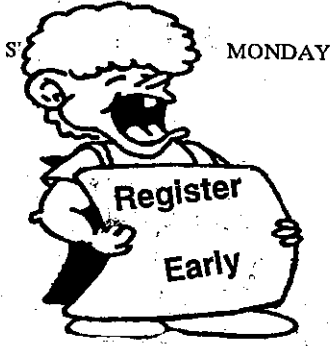
Such persons can, in one fell swoop, destroy years of careful, painstaking efforts to portray AA as a dignified, sensible, explanatory, and informative way. When there is an active, responsible local PI committee that maintains close liaison with the community and local media, the probability of such harmful acts is minimized and everyone benefits: the community, the Fellowship as a whole, and most especially the potentially offending member, who will be given a chance to recover sufficiently before making his service available..

The obvious recommendations for an AA meeting the public are a neat, clean appearance, an absence of offensive language, and a non-critical attitude. These are vital to "attraction," but they are just the beginning of desirable qualifications. We do not appreciate vague, distorted descriptions of our Fellowship by outsiders, so we should take precautions against doing this ourselves. We should know our AA history and principles through diligent study and familiarization with *all* our material, especially the Traditions. Through them, "each member becomes an active guardian of our Fellowship." And "moved by the spirit of anonymity, we try to give up our natural desires for personal distinction as AA members." With the public particularly, we practice the humble recognition that the only thing of real value we possess is our message.

It is my hope and prayer that instead of failing to be altogether responsible, instead of just minimally meeting the trickle of "requests" that come in, we can put some real meaning into "I Am Responsible" and "Let It Begin With Me." An honest appraisal of individual responsibility reveals something considerably beyond waiting for the answering-service phone to ring (and it is ringing less and less often). The pledge "When anyone, anywhere, reaches out..." does not require the reacher to *know* beforehand that he needs AA--nor to say so to my satisfaction. As far as possible, I must help him discover that it is AA he is reaching out for. "I want the hand of AA always to be there" means that I will try to make AA visible and available wherever "there" happens to be--in schools, medical societies,, the prisons, the media, or wherever and however suffering people with my illness can be found. "And for that: I am responsible."


