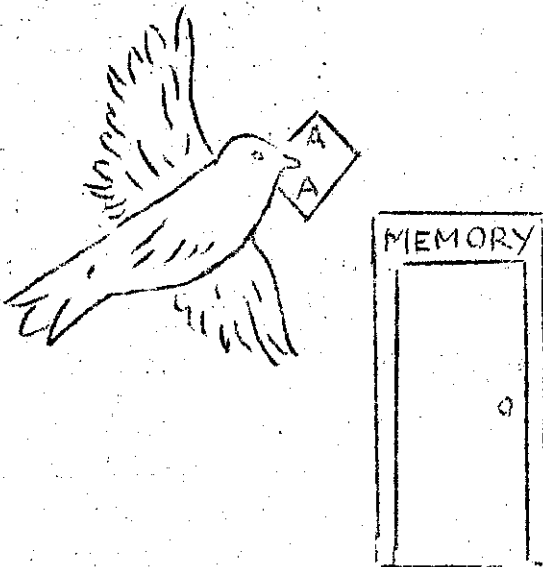

FIRST IMPRESSIONS - 21 YEARS AGO  
The occasion - the 9th Annual State Conference of Alcoholics Anonymous at Hotel Texas in Fort Worth. The time- June 11 - 13, 1954 - most significant. With great wisdom and foresight, the Conference Committee had appropriately chosen to start these sharing sessions on the very first anniversary of this practitioner's date of sobriety in the Fellowship.

Fascinating and therapeutic as all the sessions proved to be, the main reason and principal attraction for a record registration of more than 1500 people, was the presence of our Co-Founder, Bill W., accompanied by his own sponsor, Ebby.

MC-ing us off to a fast opening was San Antonio's Joe M.- already among the " oldtimers". Generating interest reached a high pitch when our own Kate R. (you all know 9-9-49), chaired a meeting that completely squelched the then still popular fallacy that " girl-types can't be alcoholics".

Up to the time of this Conference, Bill had spent most of his time traveling around to State and Regional affairs. Now, on a final swing, Fort Worth was among the last stops on his schedule. Introduced to thunderous applause at the Saturday night banquet, this inspired and imposing man immediately won the devotion of all present, when he refused to be regimented. With becoming simplicity he announced: " The program says here I am supposed to talk on the Twelve Traditions, but I am not going to do any such thing."

Then, in the language of the heart, Bill told us the story of his almost hopeless journey toward recovery from alcoholism. He held the audience of AAs and Ala-nons spellbound-in dead silence- punctuated only by that special, merry AA laughter. He established identity between himself and all AAs by recounting things he had done to bring about his recovery- the same things we were finding it advisable to do then - the same things we do today.

The love and dynamics of that man's presence left this neophyte with lessons, examples and first impressions that remain vivid-and valid-today, not the least of which was his autographing the program of the little gal at our house, Merle, who still was over a year and a half away from continuing sobriety, very simply, " With Gratitude ,Bill".

And the same mother soil nourishes faith, courage, duty and honor. Humility means a total lack of conceit. There is in true humility no connotation of servility. Only the slave must be servile; only the free can be humble. Humility is: Ready to compromise a policy - never a principle...the eye of judgement turned inward, seeing clearly its own faults... it cannot in honesty and dare not in arrogance, judge the failures of others... Humility lowers man to his proper size without degrading him, increases his stature without inflating him. Modesty is born of knowledge; humility is conceived in wisdom. A. A. IN ANOTHER WORLD

Have you ever had the privilege of visiting an AA group inside a prison? I had this gratifying experience for the first time in January, 1975, when Cy G., Marion B., and Art C., and I visited the Progressive Group at Central Unit of TDC. I'll never forget my first impressions, and I've felt the same way everytime I've visited since: Here was a new world of AA wonders, a side of AA love I'd never seen before.

At Huntsville, we were welcomed by the Prison AA Counsellors, served a fine steak dinner in the Staff dining room, then they guided us toward the inmates' AA Group. Guards unlocked, then re-locked behind us several sets of huge iron doors and we walked past many other guards before joining the prisoners in the Prison Chapel. They seemed so grateful that we had come to share in AA fellowship with them. I was grateful, too, knowing that our just being there helped them. But it helped me most of all... Our situations could have so easily been reversed.

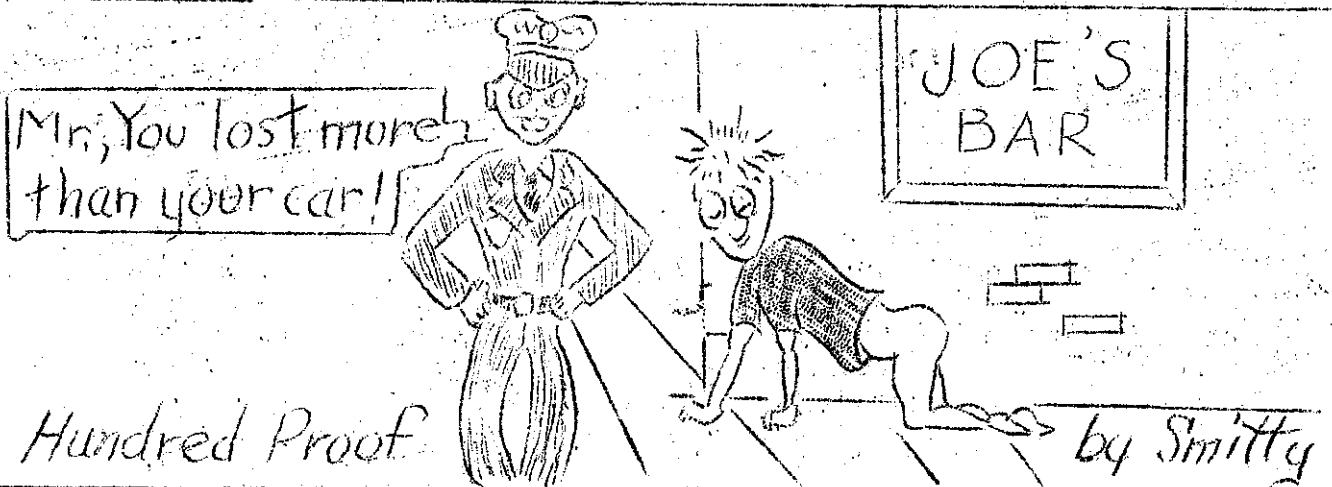
I also had a feeling of deep humility to discover that so little sharing of myself could bring smiles and laughter to those men's grim faces. I felt very inadequate, trying to tell them what alcohol had done for - and to - me. In a sense, I felt as if they were serving my time, that maybe I should stay in there with them for awhile. For there is no doubt in my mind - a Higher Power -- kept me outside of those bars. I just hadn't been at the right place at the right time while drunk - to get caught. In parting, some of them merely touched our coat sleeves, others seemed grateful to reach out and shake hands with a "free world" AA Member. They seemed to find a great and special meaning in our just saying, "Goodbye, we'll see you again soon."

So if you haven't had the opportunity of visiting an AA prison group, I urge you to check for details with your Penal Committee. You'll never regret it. You'll see how precious your freedom is in this entirely new world of AA. These prisoners can't bring the message to us, we have to carry it to them. Their homes are locked cells; our's outside in a "free world." But you and I only gained our complete freedom when we stopped drinking through the AA Program. I am grateful to God that I was able to walk inside Huntsville Prison - sober and free. Think about it! Dorman K.

A FAITH TO LIVE BY

This is my birthday month, but the past six years are only a part of my AA life. In September, 1946, I was first told about AA. It seemed too good to be true, but as the wife of one who drank too much, too often and too different, I was willing to reach out for anything that could help us as a family. So...I became an Al-Anon.

It was great! Hungry for knowledge, I gave it the works; read extensively, went to meetings, cooked and served food and worked with new Al-Anon members. In these years, we had some quite long-term happiness, but drinking seemed ever to return. Other unhappinesses struck at me and my security. By death, departure and other avenues, I lost people I loved and badly needed. I did not ask why do these things happen but rather why am I a failure - as wife, mother, friend, person? I had no answer. I felt I was of no use to anyone, especially myself. Self-pity, fear, resentments took over, but I did find a solution: I'd very simply drink myself to death! Quietly and persistently, I sought my goal. Beer I'd learned to like after marriage; in a short time, I was up to several gallons a day. Waging my private war, I wouldn't admit then, or later when I added Vodka to my diet, that I had a drinking problem. Hospitalization, alcoholic paralysis, blackouts, etc., did not change me. I would not pray for help to my Higher Power, whom I've always called God, for fear he would help me. I did not want to live. Each day I drank more, ate less, got sicker and hoped to die sooner.

April 8, 1969 I was hospitalized once more. The 9th was my daughter's birthday; I couldn't face her. I'd already spent a Thanksgiving, Christmas, and her wedding day in hiding there, so I fled to the hospital to hide again. A few weeks later, talking to a fellow patient, I looked deeply into the darkness of her eyes, eyes like a black, bottomless pit. But there I saw a reflection of myself, and remembered I had a choice. I admitted I was an alcoholic-I made a decision-I prayed to God to live! I would like to share the gift an A A member from Longview gave me. He told me that if I always had - A faith to live by - A purpose to live for - and - A SELF to live with, I could be happy, as an alcoholic, or an Al-Anon. The new self I live with today is a happy one. Thanks for letting me share my experience, strength and hope with you, and a Happy Birthday to all of you who share this month's birthdays with me. AA WORKSHOP A BLAST

If you were not among the 96-or more- AAs and Alanons in Victoria April 5-6, you

really missed an interesting and informative 10TH PRECONFERENCE WORKSHOP. For early arrivals, a Friday night meeting at Victoria's Clubhouse, speakers chosen from the floor, started things off with a bang. After Registration Saturday morning, Eve S. Conference Chairman, Corpus Christi, conducted a "Let's get Acquainted" period, reviewed the Workshop's purpose and agenda, then the workshopers went into action.

Reports were made by Area Committeepersons, a Financial Report by Clyde M., Secretary, Victoria; special rehabilitation programs, such as REAP in Austin, explained, and questions from the ASK-IT-BASKET discussed pro and con. On the question of our Prison Programs, their importance was stressed: To share our sobriety, gratitude and Hope with men and women alcoholic prisoners is our duty to Alcoholics Anonymous.

After lunch, Kate R., San Antonio, presented a most concise, thorough interpretation of The Twelve Concepts of Service. Kate pointed out that world leadership, assumed by the General Service Board, primarily rests on the shoulders of Committeepersons and GSRs who discharge their duties well, observing the 12 Traditions, and do not "pass the buck." Next, reports by persons too numerous to name, and a most lively discussion of the "Role of Members Who Wear Two Hats", Chaired by "Two-hatter"

Gordon B., Corpus Christi, ended with the concensus of opinion: "If the job threatens your sobriety - quit it. If not, hang in there!" Nolte S., Seguin, Chaired an "UN-Instructed Workshop". AA Literature - "Is there too much of it - is it being substituted for person-to-person AA contacts?" was discussed by Jean W., CSO Secretary, San Antonio. Sponsorship - "Is it slipping or only changing?" sparked an hour's discussion. To our great disappointment, a film, "Bill Discusses AA Traditions," did not arrive. Sunday morning, Gene D., San Antonio, gave us food for thought on the 12 Traditions, describing them as "tools for personal recovery," but UNITY - our common welfare - must come first. He told how NOT following the Autonomous path laid down by our forbears caused DISUNITY and got six men drunk; defined anonymity as: Humility at work. Tony F., Victoria, S. W. Texas Area Delegate, gave a wrap-up of plans, information and ideas he will carry from this Preconference Workshop to GENERAL SERVICE CONFERENCE in New York, and thanked us for our help.
