GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING MINUTES

APRIL 16, 1989

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by Wilson P., Chairman, with the Serenity Prayer. The Twelve Traditions were read by Arley H. Forty-seven persons were present, including 5 new GSRs and 3 Alternate GSRs. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved as read. After-hour telephone volunteers were obtained as shown below.

Standing Committee reports were as follows: Wayne B., Finance, gave a very comprehensive report. Hoyt S., Hospitals & Institutions, obtained volunteers to take meetings to various H&I's for the month of May; also reported that the Salvation Army has changed their meeting time from 8:15 to 7 p.m. and so has Humana Metropolitan Hospital. Tom B., Public Information, reported that his committee has lots of activity coming up; his committee will answer phones during the TV movie "The Bill Wilson Story" and will preview the service announcements at Channel 12 before this is shown on April 30. Also asked that if any after-hour volunteers get calls regarding PI to please let CSO know. John B., Jail, absent but had no report. Jim W., Convention, reported that about 900 people attended the Weekend in SA with AA convention with expenses of 10,900.00 and income of 18,361.00--will furnish exact figures at next month's meeting. Jack S., Mail, absent but report is in CSO report, below.

OLD BUSINESS: Chairman reminded groups of article regarding subscription fee for the NIGHTCAP since group contributions have steadily decreased for the past 3 months.

NEW BUSINESS: Jim B., SW Texas Area Chairman, spoke to GSR's regarding the need for a State Convention Chairman when it is held here in 1992. Jim W. was nominated and was elected by acclamation. He then reported on the Pre-General Service Conference--the Area Newsletter is now mailed to each GSR quarterly; SWT Area declined to join the State Penal Committee. Don T. has been elected as the DCM for District 1-D. Chairman, Wilson P., announced that Richard P. has resigned from CSO and Mary O. is the new employee. Reminded GSR's that redistricting of groups complaints should go to DCM's, not CSO. Darlene B. is having to resign from Board of Trustees because she is moving to Austin. The Nominating Committee will present nominations at next meeting.

CSO REPORT: Phone calls for March totaled 1,089; 1362 April NIGHTCAPS went out in March; thank-you letters written to all convention speakers and Al-Anon Office; reminder cards sent to all GSRs.

DCM REPORTS: 1-A: Donna T. announced the audio/visual materials workshop to be held on May 13; (see announcement elsewhere in this issue). 1-B: Sam R. announced the next GSR meeting for his district will be on Sat, Apr 22, 9:15 a.m., Club 12. 1-C: Jeanne B. announced that a planning meeting for the workshop will be held on Apr 29, 12:30, Winners Club; also the Archives Committee wants history of groups and Area workshops should be attended by all GSRs. 1-D: Don T. is the new DCM and so far has collected some money. 1-E: Absent. 1-F: Absent.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: CSO will be closed on Monday, May 29, for Memorial Day. The International AA Convention in 1990 will be held in Seattle--plans for chartering a plane from San Antonio.

NEW GROUPS+MEETINGS+CHANGES



The Fifth Tradition

*Each group has but one primary purpose
... to carry its message to the alcoholic
who still suffers.*

Every newcomer learns (some of us the hard way) that the business of staying sober must have top priority. If we fail at that, we can't succeed at anything else. The Fifth Tradition tells us that groups should remember *their* "one primary purpose."

Often, unthinking enthusiasm puts a group off the main track. One, for instance, offered an "expanded A.A. program" that included helping newcomers to find jobs. Tradition Five doesn't frown on the individual A.A. who tells another about a good opening. But when the group turns itself into an employment agency, newcomers may get confused about *their* primary purpose. A.A.'s function is to help them get sober—then they can find work for themselves.

Using discretion, a member may lend a few dollars needed for a meal or a hotel room, or may even invite a broke alcoholic to be a temporary houseguest. But the A.A. group as a whole is not a friendly finance company, nor a welfare department, nor a housing bureau.

Even when acting on their own, as individual members, A.A. lay people certainly shouldn't award themselves honorary medical degrees and hand out diagnoses and prescriptions and amateur analyses of other people's neuroses. Exactly because this personal failing is so common, the A.A. group in all its dealings should be extra careful to emphasize that it is not invading the medical field. Through the personal experiences of its members, it is qualified to carry only one message: how an alcoholic can recover in A.A. That's all.

Yet one group recently felt itself equipped to set up an "alcoholism information center." The temptation is understandable; it was even stronger at the time this Tradition was written, because public ignorance about alcoholism as an illness was more widespread than it is now. Since then, other agencies have sprung up to assume the task of educating the general public on alcoholism. That is not A.A.'s purpose, but these agencies also are trying to help the active alcoholic. They are our friends—and Tradition Six marks the boundaries of the relationship. . . .

No matter how different

our own

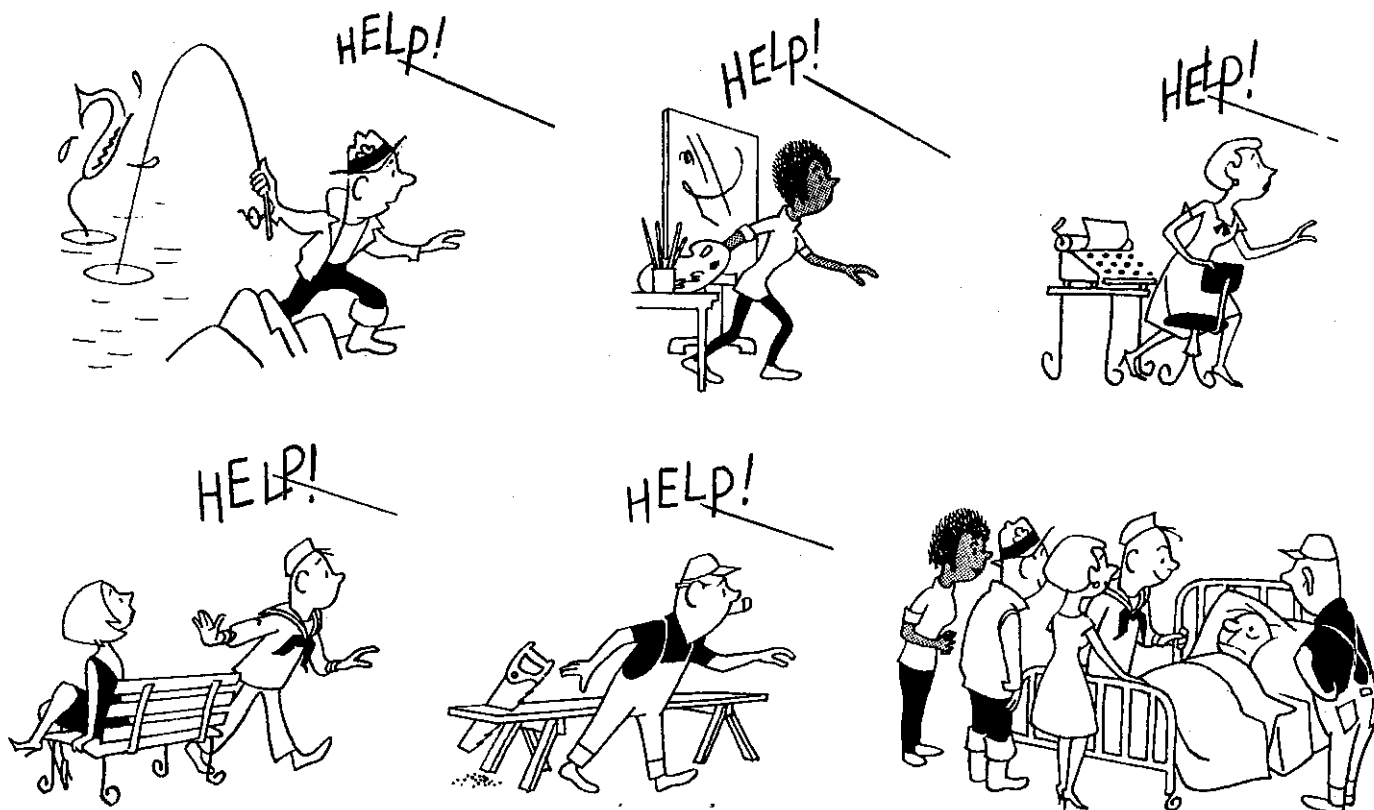
