GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING MINUTES

April 15, 1990

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by Arley H., Vice-Chairman, with the Serenity Prayer. John P. read the Twelve Traditions. The Check-In Sheet was passed around and new GSR's or COR's were asked to introduce themselves. There were 54 members present including six new GSR's and one alternate GSR. The "Statement of Participation" was read; the minutes of the previous meeting were accepted as published in the April issue of THE NIGHTCAP, so were not read. The financial report was presented by Al D. and showed a profit for the first 3 months of the year to be approximately \$2,200. Volunteers for After-Hour phone duty for next 5 weeks were obtained (see list below).

Committee reports were as follows: H&I, Eileen G-V, reported a new institution--SAAM Shelter, and obtained volunteers to carry the message to all H&I's (see list below). PI, Don N., reported that few showed up at last meeting; this committee has been very active in Health Fairs and Schools for the past month. The next committee meeting will be held on May 9 at Club 12. John B., Jail Chairman, reported in absentia that more female volunteers are needed. The Convention Committee report was presented by Jim W. He reported that we did very well at the Weekend in SA and the money is still coming in. Net profit as of now is \$11,500.28; we spent \$4,082 for coffee; collected \$1,686 for coffee; spent \$725 for the dance, collected \$1,980 for the dance. Total attendance: 1,028 paid; 174 came on scholarships. The El Tropicano is reserved for next year but the meetings will probably be held in the Municipal Auditorium. Vangie, Chairman, commended all the GSR's for their work with the convention.

OLD BUSINESS: Proposal to divide the meeting room into nonsmoking/smoking section was presented; Christi H. moved and Rosemary B. seconded--vote was unanimous. The nonsmokers will have the section closest to the outside door, which is to the right of the podium.

Members were reminded to pay for the coffee that they drink at this meeting; after-hour volunteers were urged to stay home and not use an answering machine when on duty.

Doug G. reported that 27 people have signed up for the charter plane to Seattle, but a few more might be taken if they call Rennert Travel and ask for Amy.

Mike is on the bid committee for the 1991 Texas State Young People's Convention and asked for volunteers to help with this committee at their next meeting.

NEW BUSINESS: None.

CSO REPORT: Received a total of 1,092 telephone calls during the month of March; 1397 copies of the April issue of THE NIGHTCAP were mailed; only 16 returned. Reminder cards were sent to GSR's for the General Membership Meeting. CSO sold \$1,075.10 in books, trinkets, etc., at the Convention; plus \$850. in T-Shirts. Wayne B., CPA, is preparing the Tax Return for CSO, free of charge. Had a buzzer installed so employees can hear persons coming in front door when working in the back of office. CSO will be closed May 28 for Memorial Day.

## GUARDING ANONYMITY THE SPIRITUAL FOUNDATION OF A.A.

*We are sure that humility, expressed by anonymity, is the greatest safeguard that Alcoholics Anonymous can ever have.*  
*12 Steps & 12 Traditions, p. 187*

### ANONYMOUS--More Than a Word

*The word "anonymous" constitutes half of AA's name and appears frequently in its Twelve Traditions. The word is 4,000 years old and comes from the Greeks. An means "without"; onoma means "name"--together they form "without a name."*

*In ancient Greece, as elsewhere, political pamphlets appeared that were unsigned, on anonymous, a practice that saved the authors from possible imprisonment or worse. Later, in the monasteries and cloisters of Europe, the practice of having novitiates surrender their own names for new ones became entrenched. The purpose: to encourage the loss of self and to facilitate unselfish service to others.*

*In our time, the principle remains strong. In AA Comes of Age, the late Bill W., AA co-founder, wrote, "Moved by the spirit of anonymity, we try to give up our natural desires for personal distinction as AA members both among fellow alcoholics and before the general public. As we lay aside these very human aspirations...each of us takes part in the weaving of a protective mantle that covers our whole society and under which we may grow and work in unity."*

I came to AA by way of a treatment center  
in 1981. Through that program, I realized  
that I was an alcoholic--actually, a "low-  
bottom" drunk. It was suggested that I go to  
Alcoholics Anonymous. At the time, I did not  
know what AA's requirements were. But after  
going to lots of AA meetings--closed discussion,  
open discussion, speakers, steps and traditions  
meetings--I've come to realize the importance  
of the Third Tradition.

Even after 32 years of drinking, I did not  
want to accept the fact that I was an alcoholic  
because I felt that nobody would accept me as  
a drunk. There were many times when I had a  
desire to stop drinking, but who would accept  
me. Thank God, this blessed Fellowship did!

Recently, there have been many articles in  
the AA Grapevine about "Is AA Changing?"  
Since I've been a member of AA, there are more  
younger and dually addicted people at the  
meetings. When I hear people identify them-  
selves as "an alcoholic and a drug addict,"  
it seems to me that they have a personality  
or ego problem.

Thank God for "Principles before person-  
alities." I've shared this feeling with both  
my pigeons and my sponsor--an oldtimer, and we  
all believe that the primary purpose of the  
Fellowship will never die. The Third Tradi-  
tion will always be effective when practiced  
in our meetings and our recovery.

The AA message deals with "getting sober,"  
not "getting clean." (I get clean at home in  
a bath tub--I get sober at AA in a meeting!)  
Rarely have we seen a person fail who has  
thoroughly followed our path--the Traditions  
and principles of the AA Program. The path  
that leads us to live a new way of life, one  
day at a time.

# The Fifth Tradition

*Each group has but one primary purpose  
... to carry its message to the alcoholic  
who still suffers.*

Every newcomer learns (some of us the hard way) that the business of staying sober must have top priority. If we fail at that, we can't succeed at anything else. The Fifth Tradition tells us that groups should remember *their* "one primary purpose."

Often, unthinking enthusiasm puts a group off the main track. One, for instance, offered an "expanded A.A. program" that included helping newcomers to find jobs. Tradition Five doesn't frown on the individual A.A. who tells another about a good opening. But when the group turns itself into an employment agency, newcomers may get confused about *their* primary purpose. A.A.'s function is to help them get sober—then they can find work for themselves.

Using discretion, a member may lend a few dollars needed for a meal or a hotel room, or may even invite a broke alcoholic to be a temporary houseguest. But the A.A. group as a whole is not a friendly finance company, nor a welfare department, nor a housing bureau.

Even when acting on their own, as individual members, A.A. lay people certainly shouldn't award themselves honorary medical degrees and hand out diagnoses and prescriptions and amateur analyses of other people's neuroses. Exactly because this personal failing is so common, the A.A. group in all its dealings should be extra careful to emphasize that it is not invading the medical field. Through the personal experiences of its members, it is qualified to carry only one message: how an alcoholic can recover in A.A. That's all.

Yet one group recently felt itself equipped to set up an "alcoholism information center." The temptation is understandable; it was even stronger at the time this Tradition was written, because public ignorance about alcoholism as an illness was more widespread than it is now. Since then, other agencies have sprung up to assume the task of educating the general public on alcoholism. That is not A.A.'s purpose, but these agencies also are trying to help the active alcoholic. They are our friends—and Tradition Six marks the boundaries of the relationship. ...

No matter how different

our own

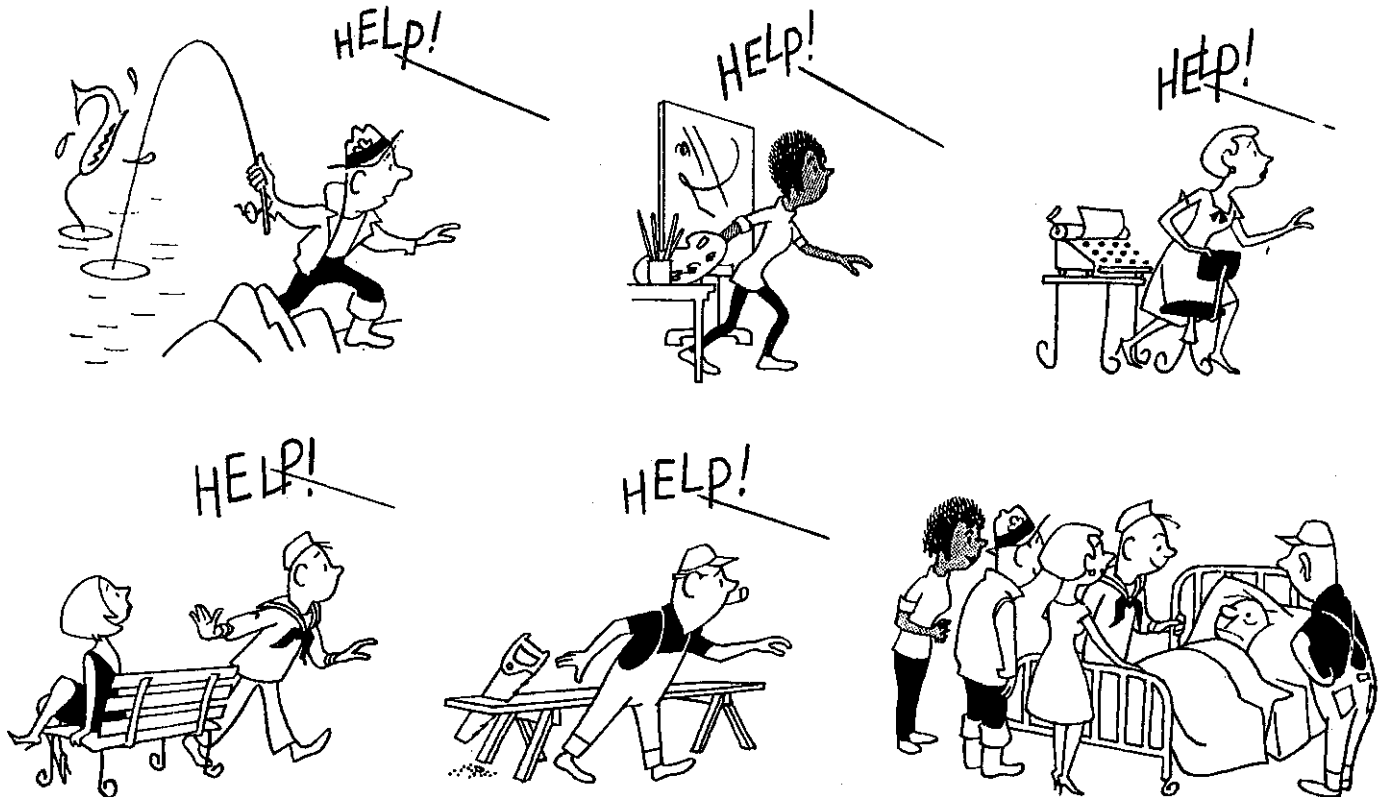

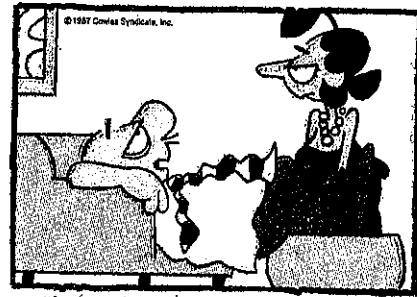

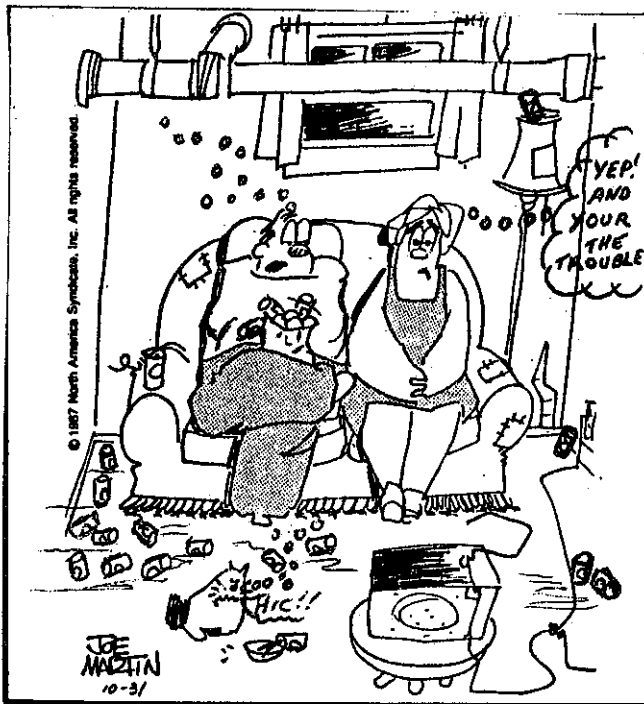
