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## THE MANY FACES OF FEAR

Recently, I was asked by a person who, obviously, knew nothing about the many facets of A. A., what the program of Alcoholics Anonymous means to me. I immediately answered: "The program of Alcoholics Anonymous is my "antidote" to the countless irrational fears that plagued my life for so many years, and contributed to my obsessive drinking."

Psychologists define "Fear" as an "uncomfortable or painful emotional response to all inner or outer threats." They distinguish between "innate" fears and fears which are "learned" or acquired. Even harmless things or events have the power to make us afraid. Fear can act as an energizer, as when it causes us to flee in panic; as an "inhibitor" when it causes to become depressed and to withdraw from our fellowman.

Not all fear is bad. Moderate, rational fear can be good. This is the type of fear that motivated me to study for a test; to step out of the way of an oncoming truck, to choose sobriety as my only road to survival. I hope I never lose my rational and moderate fears.

Immoderate, irrational fears are not good. They are self-defeating. They can cripple and destroy their owner. Had I not found AA, such fears would have destroyed me. I drank because I was afraid, and because I was a drinking alcoholic I was afraid to quit.

My fears had many faces. Anxiety, which is a persistent, nebulous fear of some unknown evil, was my constant companion. Guilt, which is the fear of punishment evoked by self-judgment, was no stranger to me. I lived with shame, which is the fear of being judged by others; and loneliness, which is the fear of being worth nothing, or meaning nothing to anyone. Underlying all those fears was the inhibiting, phobic fear of failure, so common to alcoholics, causing us to choose drunkenness rather than failure.

It is significant to me that Page 65 of the "Big Book" zeroes in on "Fear" as being at the root of most every character defect known to alcoholics. It speaks to me in an unmistakable language: "I get angry. I hate. I resent, because I am afraid." It tells me that IF I am willing to admit my many fears, share them and work myself, them, with the help of my Higher Power and through my application of some simple principles, Serenity will be within my grasp. I will never allow myself to be discouraged by my innate or acquired fears, for they can be the first step toward better things. They can lead me from hate to love, from resentments to understanding.

I know that I will always have my fears to deal with. Page 263 of "A. A. Comes of Age" reads: "The achievement of freedom from fear is a lifetime undertaking that can never be wholly completed. Only the self-deceived will claim complete freedom from fear."

I am always touched with deep humility when I discover that I have many well-wishers among my fellow AAs, and since I have received a congratulatory letter from Corpus Christi that also contains the names of others newly elected to offices at the South West Texas Area Conference in Austin in October, (a most outstanding one, I must say), your NIGHT CAP editor would like to share the following letter with all of you.

"Dearest Edna:

Congratulations on your election to the job of Alternate Area Chairman for 1976-77. I am glad you agreed to serve and know you will gain and contribute much. Both you and the new Southwest Texas Area Conference Chairman, Raul M., have long served AA in any capacity asked.

You mentioned at Austin that your nomination was a shock out of the blue. Well--- join the club! I had the same shock two years ago in Victoria when Kate Nominated me to serve as Chairman. And I had serious misgivings as to my ability to handle it. But the cooperation I have found among the people with whom I worked during these past two years has been the most stimulating and encouraging experience; and this is what makes it possible to rise above our own insecurities and self-imposed limitations.

In 1974, at the suggestion of Tony, Clyde and Skeeter, our newly elected group had a meeting in Kerrville in February with the new area committeepersons to get acquainted with each other and formulate plans for our first workshop preceding Tony's trip to New York. This was a new procedure and to me was one of the most valuable things we did to get started. We were able to gain information and suggestions from the Area Committee people which we would not have otherwise had. Also, our group never met for anything with an A. A. meeting being part of the agenda. That year Gene and Bland S. invited us for dinner at Starlight and their regular Saturday night meeting gave us a memorable A. A. weekend.

The benefits of that meeting had been so good, we decided to duplicate the procedure and in February 1975 we met in beautiful San Marcos. We all felt a little more at home with what we were doing by this time, and a lot more at home with each other. So we were able to get down to the business at hand and accomplish much in a short time. And again, we were able to attend the regular Saturday night San Marcos A. A. meeting. All this helped us to work together more smoothly and to have some personal contact these two years with groups we hoped to serve.

Nothing in my A. A. experience has given me more of a sense of security about our wonderful A. A. fellowship than the past two years as Chairman of the Southwest Texas Area. It is here I have found assurance that the affairs of Alcoholics Anonymous are truly the business of the members of Alcoholics Anonymous. Not the business of some board constituted by a bunch of community do-gooders, not the business of the United Way or some church or governmental agency. But the business of US, THE MEMBERS, THE RECIPIENTS OF LIFE THROUGH ITS GREAT PRINCIPLES AND FELLOWSHIP. And with people like you, Raul, our New York Delegate, Gene D., and the others willing to continue to assume this responsibility, the affairs of our great Fellowship will remain the business of its members. This is our hope for survival.

When I first came into AA, I was afflicted with Echolalia - that's what the science boys call parrot talk: a repetition of noises without any understanding of what they mean.....Anon.

THE THIRD ABSOLUTE: UNSELFISHNESS

At first, unselfishness would seem to be the simplest of all the Absolutes to understand, define and accomplish. But we (alcoholics) have a long road to travel. Our's was a real mastery of the exact opposite during our drinking days. Careful thought will show that unselfishness in its finest sense, the kind for which we must strive in our AA way of life, is not easy to reach or to describe in detail. In the final analysis, it must gain for us the selflessness which is our spiritual cornerstone, the real significance of our anonymity.

Proceeding with the question method of digesting the Absolutes, we suggest you ask yourself over and over again in judging what you are about to do, say, think or decide, "How will this affect the other fellow?" Our unselfishness must include not merely that which we do for others, but that which we do for ourselves. I once heard an old-timer say that this is a 100% selfish program in one respect, namely; that we had to maintain our own sobriety and its quality before we could possibly help others in any maximum degree. Yet, we know that we must give of ourselves to others in order to maintain our own sobriety, and in a spirit of complete selflessness with no thought of reward. How do we put these two things together?

Well, for one thing it points up that we gain in direct proportion to the real help we give others. How many of us make 12th Step calls because we think we need it to stay sober? Those who think only of their own needs, who reflect little on the big question of helping another person, are missing the boat. We know, for we used to make calls the same way we took vitamin pills. Then, one day in my early sobriety, I was asked to call on a female with a fellow AA. At that time there wasn't enough gals to go around, and the men were called on to help.

Never will I forget my anxiety on the way to that call! After nearly two hours of earnest talk I left one of the noblest women I will ever meet, equally worried about whether we had helped or hurt her or, perhaps, accomplished nothing at all. Some of her questions stayed with me. I thought of better answers later on, and returned to see her several times.

We are helped on our long journey to unselfishness by our great mission of understanding, which sometimes seems as precious as our sobriety. But the quality cannot be confined alone to that which we do for others. We must be unselfish even in our own pursuits of self preservation. Not the least of our aid to others comes from the example of our own lives. If there is any protection against that first drink that equals our thought of what it may do to us, it is those whose unselfish love guided us in the beginning, and those whom we in turn guided later on. This brings to mind the last verse of a poem: "I must remember as I go

Through sober days, both high and low,  
What I must always seem to be  
For him who always follows me."

11. Sought through threats and tears to force my will upon him, asking only that he do exactly as ordered. (And no back-talk).

12. Having fallen on my face as a result of these steps, I finally woke up to the fact that I'd better start living the Al-Anon Way!
