# GSR Meeting Minutes

CENTRAL SERVICE OFFICE COMMITTEE MEETING  
CLUB 12, October 19, 1986

The meeting was called to order at 7 p.m. by CSO Chairperson, Dave S., with the Serenity Prayer. Forty members were present. Literature was handed out for the individual groups. New GSRs, Dick N., Reality Group Alternate, Cheryl, Lambda Group, Pete, Santa Fe Group, Paula, Alternate, Sharon, Alamo Heights Group, and Mary, Northwest Group were introduced. Visitors were Juan S., Morning After Group, Virginia G., Windcrest Group. The 12-Traditions were read; the minutes from the last meeting were read and approved.

Administrative Board reports were as follows: Financial--Wayne B. reported that CSO had a loss of \$600 in Sept., but showed an overall gain of \$9,200 since the first of the year. September group contributions were higher than they were in August plus salaries and literature costs helped to make the deficit. Hospitals and Institutions--Cindy B., new Chairman, reported that she has been in contact with Our Lady of the Spirit Rehab Center. They have a meeting on Sunday at 6 p.m. at 1505 S. Hackberry. They need help. Editorial--Dee S. reported that about 1000 Nightcaps were sent out in September, also stressed that we need correct addresses since it costs 22¢ each time one is returned. Mailing--Absent, no report. Public Information--Absent, no report. Penal--Dave S. suggested that funds be collected at each group for literature for penal institutions.

OLD BUSINESS: Handicap ramp for CSO--no action taken as yet, but will be looked into.

NEW BUSINESS: New lease for the CSO office for 3 years was approved. New copier for CSO was approved. Four new CSO Admin. Board members will be elected in November to start their 2-year term on Jan. 1, 1987. Help was requested for the hearing impaired.

CENTRAL OFFICE/WORLD SERVICES SEMINAR

This seminar was recommended at the 50th Anniversary in Montreal, Canada, 1985, and was held in Chicago, September 5, 6, 7, 1986. The seminar began with John B., President, AA World Services, presenting the subject, "PROBLEMS & SOLUTIONS" and then gave the following example:

The 60-30-10 Plan was discussed--General Service Office's purpose is to carry the message and maintain an office, staff, publications, and programs. These functions need money to operate. This money comes from group contributions and literature sales. When group contributions do not meet GSO's expenses then literature sales have to cover this shortage.

Cost of services	\$2,929,000.00
Group contributions	2,411,000.00
Déficit (short)	518,000.00

After presentations were made, seminar attendees broke up into several groups for workshops to discuss briefings given. The consensus was that AA groups be contacted for defraying the cost of GSO's expenses. They felt that selling literature alone, was not the answer to our dilemma since we are not in the publishing business. Individuals and groups must be motivated to carry out our tradition that we are "self-supporting, declining outside contributions."

Contributions by all members is imperative if AA is to survive. If everyone of the over one million members donated at least \$0.25 more in the basket, GSO's total expenses could be covered. Most of us still put \$1 in the basket, not thinking that it doesn't go very far (even cigarettes, coffee, and donuts have gone up but we still buy them). It was also stated that contributions are a form of Twelve-step work.

The following strong recommendations and suggestions, plus unanimous consensus, was that literature sales alone was not the answer. In the final analysis, the Seventh Tradition is not being followed, as 45 to 50 per cent of AA literature is sold to outside agencies. We strongly need to go back to being self-supporting. Central Service Offices and Intergrup Offices need to reach out more to the groups. We are not in competition with one another. CSO belongs to the people of AA and are to serve the groups and complement each other. More involvement by members with workshops in CSOs are needed. Many CSOs are already doing this and are very successful. We need to stop complaining about the newcomer not knowing what to do and teach him to carry the message to the still sick, suffering alcoholic. This is the strength of our program and we must not forget that it saved our lives. GSO stated there was too much complacency with older members sitting back and saying "AA WILL SURVIVE," "LET SOMEONE ELSE DO IT." It takes footwork to carry the message and this is the responsibility of the entire membership, CSO, Staff, Board, GSRs, DCMs, Delegates, and Trustees.

"AM I RESPONSIBLE?" It is our responsibility to listen to the people we have elected as our "trusted servants." If they are not fulfilling their responsibilities then it is our responsibility to inform them otherwise we are as guilty as they are of breaking our traditions.

The AA structure is weakening and like The Washingtonians, we may disappear. Unity was emphasized over and over and that we must not forget OUR PRIMARY PURPOSE which is to help the still suffering, sick alcoholic as we were helped by those who came before us.

S P O N S O R S H I P

(Sponsorship continued)

What about sponsorship? How many sponsors do I need? What is the primary purpose of a sponsor? These are questions which merit careful study before answering. A newcomer to AA is usually welcomed with applause, a desire chip, and all kinds of suggestions on how to stay away from that first drink, but rarely do we assign a temporary sponsor or AA contact as suggested in our pamphlet "Questions and Answers on Sponsorship."

It is suggested that the secretary of the group (or other officer present), as a sponsorship activity, should have a list of volunteers of seasoned AA sobriety, and make a committee of "temporary sponsors." The secretary, or any officer present, should introduce the newcomer to their AA contact. This is the first stage of sponsorship in the AA program. The purpose of this "temporary sponsor" is to keep in touch with the newcomer during the early stages of recovery or until the newcomer chooses his or her own sponsor.

There are no fast rules on how many sponsors you should have, a well-rounded, seasoned member as a sponsor may guide you to personal recovery, overcoming domestic situations, and maybe some service work-- if his "house" is in order. The sponsor will usually introduce the newcomer to other members of AA in other groups and thereby break the feeling of isolation. Then, the newcomer can begin to enjoy the fellowship of AA.

There are no set rules on sponsorship. It is recommended that men work with men and women work with women. My experience in sponsorship has taught me a lot about me; in helping others I am the one that receives the most help. These are my personal guidelines on how to sponsor:

- A. God keeps them sober, I don't.
- B. Share the program of AA, not my way.
- C. Guide them to dependence on God as they understand him, not my God.
- D. The answers are inside of you, I don't have your answer.
- E. Leg work required:

- 1. Call me before you make a decision.
- 2. Talk to your God constantly.
- 3. Go to meetings.
- 4. Read and study the Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous.
- 5. Help another alcoholic.

# THE TWELVE TRADITIONS

1. Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon AA unity.
2. For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority--aloving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern.
3. The only requirement for AA membership is a desire to stop drinking.
4. Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or AA as a whole.
5. Each group has but one primary purpose--to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.
6. An AA group ought never endorse, finance, or lend the AA name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property, and prestige divert us from our primary purpose.
7. Every AA group ought to be fully selfsupporting, declining outside contributions.
8. Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever non-professional, but our service centers may employ special workers.
9. AA, as such, ought never be organized; but we may create service boards or committees directly responsible to those they serve.
10. Alcoholics Anonymous has no opinion on outside issues; hence the AA name ought never be drawn into public controversy.
11. Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion; we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio, and films.
12. Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our Traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.

\*TRADITION ELEVEN: Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion; we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio and films. Alcoholics who have recovered through our program are themselves the strongest attraction that AA has. When people are asked what led them to seek AA help, the answer given most often is: "An AA member." Their chances would have been slim if all of us had remained completely in hiding. But many of us have chosen to tell our friends, neighbors, employers, co-workers, doctors, or spiritual advisers that we are in AA--and when we do so, we are NOT breaking our anonymity in the meaning of this Tradition.

Suppose a sick alcoholic never has the good fortune to meet an AA. How is such a person going to find us? The search will be

difficult if the local group thinks it should be anonymous, too. The Tradition is talking about "personal anonymity," remember? Alcoholics will not be attracted to AA if they don't know that it exists or if they have distorted, unfavorable impressions of its members or its program.

Giving the general public an accurate picture of AA is the chief job of our public information committees. In addition, they often carry the message to certain groups--from police officers to personnel directors--whose work includes contact with active alcoholics.

Ours is not a secret society...we carry the message anywhere we can--But we must ever be aware that self-appointed messiahs speaking for AA through public media can do us great damage!
