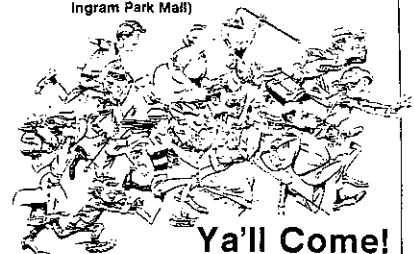

GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING MINUTES

OCTOBER 15, 1989

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by Wilson P., Chairman, with the Serenity Prayer. The Twelve Traditions were read by Donna T. The Check-In Sheet was passed around and two new GSRs introduced themselves. After the "Statement of Participation" was read, the Secretary read the previous meeting's minutes which were approved and stand as read. After-hour telephone volunteers were obtained for November (see list below). There were 64 persons in attendance.

Standing Committee reports were as follows: Wayne B., Finance, gave a very detailed and comprehensive report of CSO's current finances, after which he resigned from his position after 3½ years of service. Hoyt S., Hospitals & Institutions, asked for volunteers to carry the message to various H&I's for the month of November (see list below). Don N., Public Information, reported that 11 volunteers were at their last meeting, held at the Unity Club; Medical Center Hospital wants a regular public information meeting to be held there. HEB had an employee Health Fair and AA was represented. The committee will start giving out business cards in place of meeting directories. Tom has sent letters to High School counselors. Char McM. reported that 1000 letters were mailed out inviting the clergy of an open forum on Oct 26 and she has 50 people to make follow up calls. Thanked all the groups that had volunteered. Jim B., Nominating, reported in Ray A.'s absence, that this committee has a slate of nine to vote on to replace the three Trustees that will go off the Board at the end of this year. They are: Shalon T., Doug G., Olivia C., Richard G., Lou I., Charlie K., Don B., Raymond F., Lalo A.

OLD BUSINESS: Registration forms have been received for the International Convention and Doug G. announced that 45 people have signed up for the plane charter.

NEW BUSINESS: Clara H., GSR for the SASH Group, thanked everyone for their support and announced that after Christmas the group plans to move back to the gymnasium and that they hope to get it airconditioned. The Christmas party will begin at 6:30 p.m. on Monday, December 11, 1989.

CSO REPORT: 1391 copies of the October NIGHTCAP were mailed with 28 being returned because the addressee had moved; CSO received 723 telephone calls during office hours with 303 reported by the answering service for a total of 1026 during the month of September. Reminder cards were mailed to all GSRs and CORs for the GMM on 10-15-89; CSO will be closed for Thanksgiving.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

For some time now I have been concerned about a particular situation that I see throughout some meetings. Namely, long-time members taking an inordinate amount of time to expound upon their pet theories and ideas. It usually take 10 minutes or so to go through the preamble, Chapter 5, and then any announcements to the group. If after a subject has been chosen, 2 to 3 people take up the next half hour, that leaves 20 minutes for however many others are in the room. At the meetings where I have been present, that can number 20 to 30 people.

Please, everyone, none of us come to these meetings because we're well. Part of the healing begins in sharing. Allow those of us who are making a tentative stab at sobriety to have a chance to say our names at least, and formulate a coherent sentence. If I wanted to hear extemporaneous speeches I would go to Toastmasters.

If people are glancing at their watches, you've probably talked too long. If people get up and leave, you've probably talked too long. If most of the people in the room do not have a chance to speak, you've talked too long. If no one comes up to you after the meeting and says, "that was an interesting thought, I'd like to hear more of your ideas," you've talked too long.

Give those of us who are not verbally skilled a break. Speak from your experience, your strength, your hope. Not from the intelligence you have gleaned from a book.

If you want to talk and you have much to say, volunteer for speakers meetings. A discussion meeting should include the exchange of ideas among people. I do not go to a discussion meeting to be lectured to.

Just for today I will be agreeable. I will look my best, speak in a well-modulated voice, be courteous, and considerate.

The following are excerpts from a letter received from San Antonio State Hospital Superintendent, Steven B. Schnee, Ph.D., 9-25-89.

"...I have been notified that erroneous information is being spread by word of mouth among the local AA Chapters that our chemical dependency programs...will close in the near future. That is far from the truth. We are, in fact, fine tuning and refocusing these services slightly different than in the past.

"Over the next 2 years, we are expected to heighten our rehabilitation efforts without additional financial resources and to accomplish this, we must ensure that only those clinically needy and appropriate patients are admitted into the hospital.

"We have requested the assistance of local county officials and community resources by not committing/recommitting people who only need detoxification... SASH will be transitioning its chemical dependency services... to an increased focus on the dually diagnosed (mentally ill and chemically involved). The admissions component will be reduced from 30 beds to 15 beds with Goyens Rehab reduced from 60 to 45 beds.

"We will continue to be a major provider of rehabilitation services for the seriously chemically involved (alcoholics), but we cannot cover the full array of vitally needed services with the funding provided to us.

"We deeply appreciate the support and involvement of the local AA groups and hope you will assist us in providing this information to the local chapters."

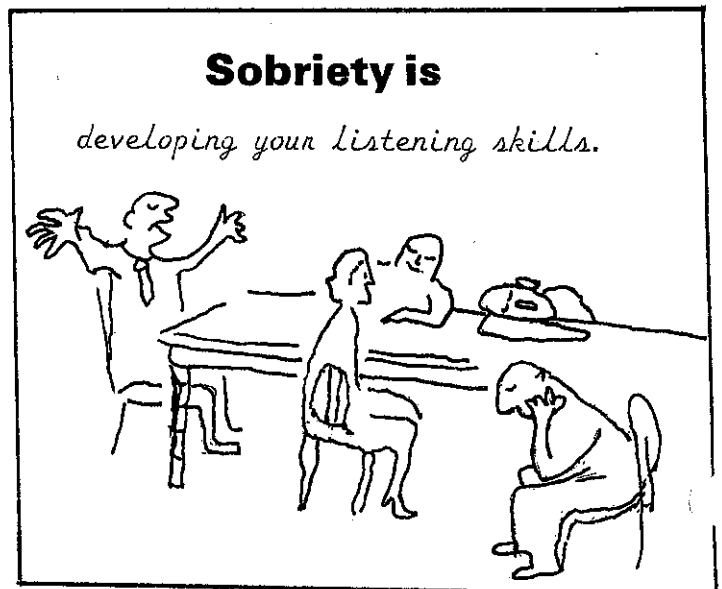
DIFFERENT COURT CARDS, and court-like
cards from hospitals and treatment centers,
have appeared at some meetings. These cards
ask for the signers last names and phone
numbers, and sometimes call for verification
of the sobriety of the card-holder, and a
statement to the effect that the card-holder
attended the complete meeting.

While AA wishes to cooperate wherever
possible without affiliation, our Traditions
clearly indicate that signing a card is
strictly voluntary on our part. Signing our
full name and adding a phone number would
seem to be a break in anonymity, which can
be required of none of our members.

In addition, signing a card such as
those described above could set the signer
up for a summons to court, to testify rega
ing the meaning of the signed card. We must
try to avoid such an event, both for our
personal well-being and for the sake of our
Fellowship.

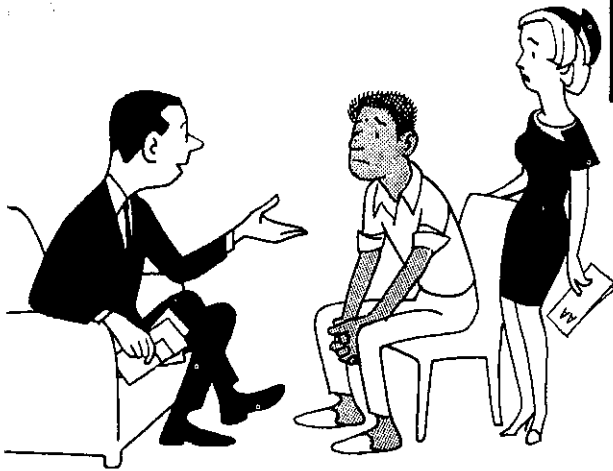
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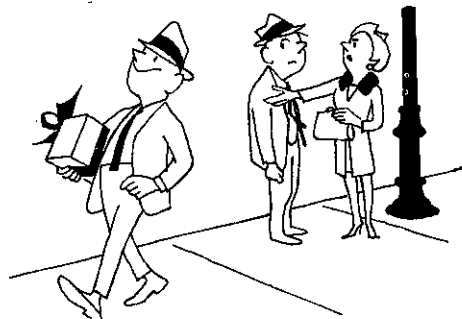
The Eleventh Tradition

Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion; we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio and films.

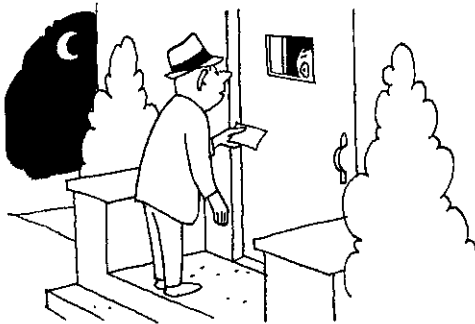


Ours is not a secret society...
we carry the message
anywhere we can—

But we must ever be aware
that self-appointed messiahs
speaking for A.A. through public
media can do us great damage!



Alcoholics who have recovered through our program are themselves the strongest attraction that A.A. has. When people are asked what led them to seek A.A. help, the answer given most often is: "An A.A. member." Their chances would have been slim if all of us had remained completely in hiding. But many of us have chosen to tell our friends, neighbors, employers, co-workers, doctors, or spiritual advisers that we are in A.A.—and when we do so, we are *not* breaking our anonymity in the meaning of this Tradition.



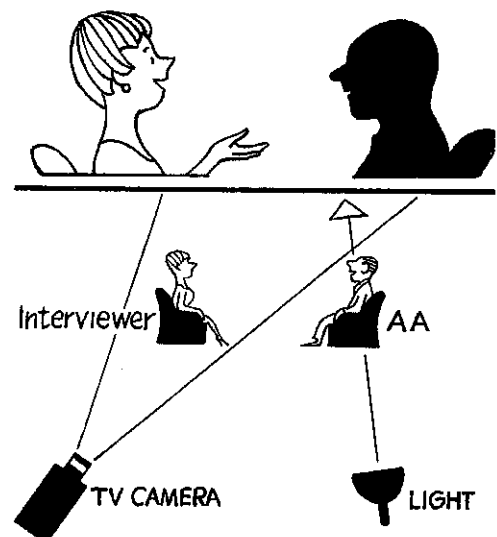
Suppose a sick alcoholic never has the good fortune to meet an A.A. How is such a person going to find us? The search will be difficult if the local group thinks *it* should be anonymous, too. The Tradition is talking about "personal anonymity," remember? Alcoholics will not be attracted to A.A. if they don't know that it exists or if they have distorted, unfavorable impressions of its members or its program.

Giving the general public an accurate picture of A.A. is the chief job of our public information committees. In addition, they often carry the message to certain groups—from police officers to personnel directors—whose work includes contact with active alcoholics.

How to Be Anonymous on Television

Information about A.A. is being offered to the public through all the communications media, in print and over the air. On radio, it's easy to guard members' anonymity, of course. But TV (not in wide use when the Traditions were written) is another matter. According to a Conference opinion, members are breaking their anonymity when they are identified on TV as A.A.'s and their faces are shown—whether or not their names are given. And yet this medium, with its vast audiences, cannot be ignored.

Different techniques have been employed to preserve anonymity on TV: masks; screens; back-lighting that shows A.A.'s only as silhouettes; camera angles showing them only from the back. The "shadow" method diagrammed here is simple, relaxed—and appropriate. For we are not selling personalities—we are explaining A.A. Personal anonymity breaks in the public media not only may discourage timid prospects; they may threaten the anonymity-breaker's own sobriety, by violating the spirit of the A.A. program and Traditions. . . .

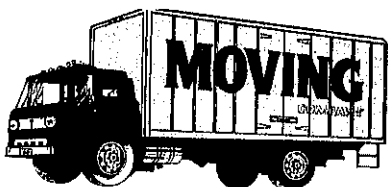
