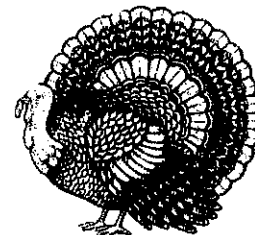

GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING MINUTES

OCTOBER 21, 1990

The meeting was called order at 6:30 p.m. by Bob T., Chairman, with a moment of silence followed by the Serenity Prayer. The Twelve Traditions were read by Tom. There were 65 persons present including six new GSR's. After the "Statement of Participation" was read, the minutes of the previous meeting were accepted as printed in the October issue of the NIGHTCAP. The check-in list was circulated.

The financial report was presented by Al D. Volunteers for After-Hours Phone Duty were obtained (see list below). In the absence of Eileen, H&I Chairman, Bob T. requested volunteers for carrying the message to H&I's (see list below). Don N., Chairman of PI Committee, reported that the previous week was Alcohol Awareness Week and several college campuses had booths set up with volunteers distributing AA literature. Jail Committee Chairman, John B., has resigned and introduced the new chairman, Flynn J. He reported that they need more volunteers and asked that they call CSO and leave name and phone number.

Old Business: There are now 15 nominees for the 4-slot trustee election to be held at the November meeting: Nominees are George A., Universal City Group, Nick C., Stahl Road Group, Rudy F., Santa Fe Group, Raymond F., Goliad Group, Alex G., Sunrise Group, Charlotte H., Abundance Happy Hour Group, Mary Anne K., Valley Hi Group, Bill McM., Alamo Heights Group, John P., Marymont Group, Kathy P. Marymont Group, Rich R., Park North Group, Sam R., Sunrise Group, Charlie R., Goliad Group, Bill T., Sunrise Group, and Jan T., Freedom Group. Nominees that were present stood and gave a short talk about themselves. George A. was appointed to serve out the 2-month unexpired term of Don C.; however, this will not effect his nomination or qualification to serve a full term. Mary Anne K. is filling an unexpired term also which does not disqualify her from running again on her own.

New Business: Mary O., Assistant Manager of CSO, requested more volunteers for the 12-Step List and people able to make calls during the day. Changes to meetings and groups should be in CSO by November 15 for the new meeting directory to be published in December.

CSO Report was given by Dee S., Office Manager, including 1521 copies of THE NIGHTCAP were mailed for October; received a total of 1,117 telephone calls in September; landlord has finished painting office and cleaned drapery at no expense to CSO.

DCM Report was given by Brenda H., District 18 DCM. She gave Flynn a list of jail volunteers; recognized Knut H., for his work as Interdistrict Secretary and introduced Char McM. as new Interdistrict Secretary-Treasurer. Tom B. explained the CFC functions in the area with prisons opening up in Three Rivers, Bastrop, and Wackenhut at Kyle may become available. Yolanda F., DCM for District 1-F, announced a Spanish Workshop to be held on Saturday, November 17, at 3210 W. Commerce from 12:30 to 4 p.m.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 7:20 p.m. with The Lord's Prayer.

TO THE FAMILIES AND FRIENDS, WE EXTEND OUR SINCERE SYMPATHY AND OUR PRAYERS THAT THEIR BEREAVEMENT MAY BE TEMPERED BY REFLECTIVE THOUGHT UPON HAPPINESS SHARED.

I believe each of us reaches that turning point where just "not drinking" is no longer enough. How can one person make a difference? I also believe that I am unique and want to do things only I can do, in addition to the usual surface service work.

I have found some ways to help me have a personal relation with the idea of gratitude in action.

Speak to the oldtimers at meetings. They need to be reminded that progress takes time.

Speak to the newcomer at meetings. They need to know they are welcome and that somebody cares.

Budget your money so you can contribute to each meeting--more to your home group (that home group is where your action usually begins).

Call your sponsor and talk about the things that are uncomfortable to discuss in meetings; also, the things you are dying to discuss in meetings. Could be you'll unknowingly help your sponsor find an answer to his or her own questions.

Ask your Higher Power how you may be of service each day as you add the day before to your sobriety chain. Say "Thank You!"

When each birthday comes, consider how much money you have not had to pay on drinking sprees and damages. Share some of that savings with your Central Office and the General Service Office in the form of a birthday contribution. (Do you know what these offices are and what they do?)

When your Higher Power asks you with a nudge, "I wonder how so and so is?" If you have their phone number, call them; if not, inquire about them at meetings.

These are all things that no one can do for you. Sure, anybody can, and a lot of people do these things--yet only you can do and say the things your intuition tells you to do. You are the only YOU your Higher Power has.

The 13 Oct 90 meeting was opened with the Serenity Prayer at 10 a.m. by Mac M., Chairperson (DCM 1-A). Sec-Treas., Knut H. (DCM 17) read the minutes of previous meeting and gave financial report. Minutes were accepted as read. Members in attendance were: Mac M., DCM 1-A, Richard O., DCM 1-B, Knut H., DCM 17, Brenda H., DCM 18, Yolanda F., DCM 1-F, and Tom M., DCM 1-G. Others attending were four members of the Correctional Facilities Committee: Tom B., Chairman, Glen A., Secretary, Olivia C., Treasurer, Lynne G., member CFC, and Char M.

Mac read the letter he had written to Wayne P., GSO General Manager.

Mac said he had the 1989 SWT Area Conference "lessons learned" book compiled by that committee but had not had the opportunity to digest it. Discussion followed regarding the 1991 SWT Area Conference.

The issue of the sobriety chip was discussed and Knut provided each DCM of the proposal put forth by District 5-B at the recent assembly.

Yolanda asked for support in getting the Grapevine translated into Spanish and gave a number of reasons for this request. She will write to the Area Delegate and contingent on its contents will ask the San Antonio DCMs to sign it in November. Yolanda also explained how the Hispanic structure of AA works and how closely it adheres to the Traditions & Concepts.

Tom B., CFC Chairman, stated his committee's desire to work with the districts and gave a brief history of the CFC committee and its break in affiliation with the Jail Committee. The Jail Committee does its work in the local city and county jails and CFC works primarily with prisons in order not to duplicate responsibilities. Tom explained the application process for entering TDC facilities and the requirements (2 years sobriety and no felony convictions). He answered questions from the floor and provided copies of the CFC guidelines.

Knut H. resigned as Secretary-Treasurer and Char M. was elected as his replacement.

The next SA Interdistrict DCM meeting will be a breakfast meeting at the Seven Oaks Motel (Austin Highway) at 9 a.m. on 10 Nov 90.

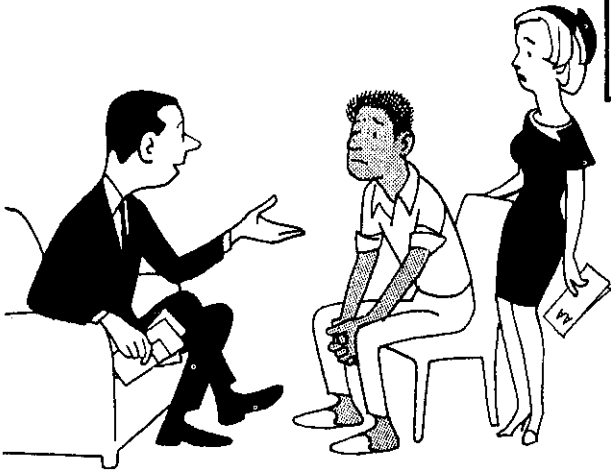

The Eleventh Tradition

Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion; we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio and films.

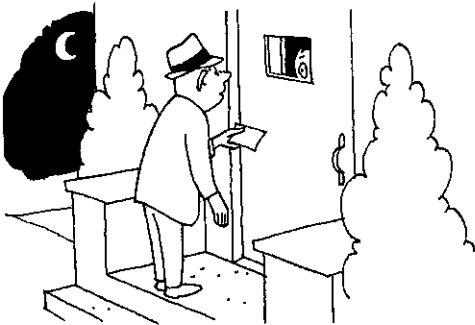


Ours is not a secret society...
we carry the message
anywhere we can—

But we must ever be aware
that self-appointed messiahs
speaking for A.A. through public
media can do us great damage!



Alcoholics who have recovered through our program are themselves the strongest attraction that A.A. has. When people are asked what led them to seek A.A. help, the answer given most often is: "An A.A. member." Their chances would have been slim if all of us had remained completely in hiding. But many of us have chosen to tell our friends, neighbors, employers, co-workers, doctors, or spiritual advisers that we are in A.A.—and when we do so, we are *not* breaking our anonymity in the meaning of this Tradition.



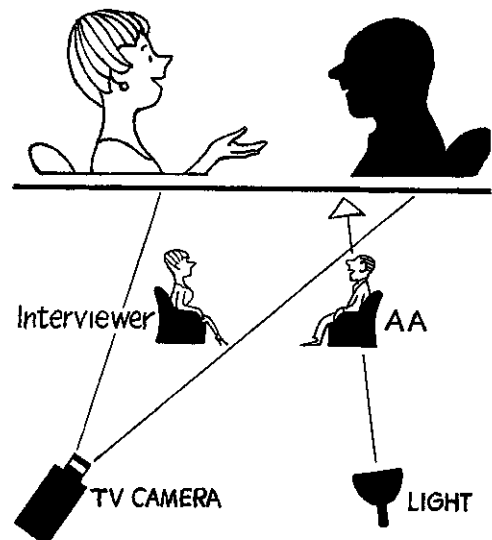
Suppose a sick alcoholic never has the good fortune to meet an A.A. How is such a person going to find us? The search will be difficult if the local group thinks *it* should be anonymous, too. The Tradition is talking about "*personal* anonymity," remember? Alcoholics will not be attracted to A.A. if they don't know that it exists or if they have distorted, unfavorable impressions of its members or its program.

Giving the general public an accurate picture of A.A. is the chief job of our public information committees. In addition, they often carry the message to certain groups—from police officers to personnel directors—whose work includes contact with active alcoholics.

How to Be Anonymous on Television

Information about A.A. is being offered to the public through all the communications media, in print and over the air. On radio, it's easy to guard members' anonymity, of course. But TV (not in wide use when the Traditions were written) is another matter. According to a Conference opinion, members are breaking their anonymity when they are identified on TV as A.A.'s and their faces are shown—whether or not their names are given. And yet this medium, with its vast audiences, cannot be ignored.

Different techniques have been employed to preserve anonymity on TV: masks; screens; back-lighting that shows A.A.'s only as silhouettes; camera angles showing them only from the back. The "shadow" method diagrammed here is simple, relaxed—and appropriate. For we are not selling personalities—we are explaining A.A. Personal anonymity breaks in the public media not only may discourage timid prospects; they may threaten the anonymity-breaker's own sobriety, by violating the spirit of the A.A. program and Traditions. . . .

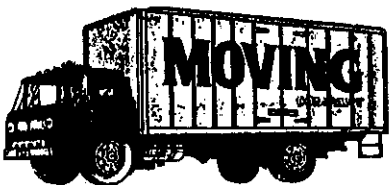
