GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING MINUTES

OCTOBER 18, 1992

Jan T., Chairman, opened the meeting at 6:30 p.m. with the Serenity Prayer. There were 58 persons present including 10 GSRs/CORs. Julee read the Twelve Traditions. The minutes of the September meeting were accepted as printed in the NIGHTCAP and not read. The Financial Report was presented by Gerry G. in which he mentioned the inventory of CSO; a question on what is being done to reduce the inventory was asked. Gerry responded with: the order point has been lowered and a flier is out advertising lower prices on the slow moving literature. There were no other questions.

Volunteers for after-hour phone duty were obtained (see list below).

Committee Reports: H&I: Jerry S. stood in for Charlie R. and obtained volunteers to carry the message to various H&I's during the month of November (see list below). PI: No report. Jail: No report.

Old Business: Richard G., Chairman of the Nominating Committee, asked nominees to stand and introduce themselves. They are: George A., Joe C., Dee S., Mary Alice G., Russ B., Raymond F., John McQ., and Gerry G. Gerry G. withdrew his name as a nominee since only four slots will have to be filled. New Trustees will be elected at the November meeting.

Getting a portable sound system was discussed and it was decided to get along without it for the present.

CSO is waiting a reply from the letter to nursing homes. Copies of the letter were available for hand-out.

New Business: As asked by the Board, Knut H. asked the group what they wanted CSO to provide in the way of literature. The majority said they want mostly what sells.

Arley H. reported on the AAWs/CSO/Intergroup Seminar held in Mesa, Arizona, in September. One of the significant points of his report was that the Big Book will be coming out in sign language. It was brought out that Central Service Offices need Central Office Representatives (CORs) not GSRs. CSOs are a parallel to the service structure, not part of it. They are part of AA. Arley said that traditionally CSOs find money to be a problem and are run by little old ladies (except in San Antonio). There were a few questions asked and Arley referred them to the Central Office Guidelines put out by GSO.

John P. presented proposed agenda separating the GMM from the GSRs/DCMs. CORs would use first half of meeting; GSRs/DCMs the second half--he stated that most all cities have this problem. He called on Arley to expound and support this way of conducting AA business. There was much discussion and questions regarding funding and committees. Char McM. and Patty H. both asked for time to get together and discuss the new agenda. A committee will be formed and meet and bring its conclusions to the general membership.

Paul P. brought up the archives and pointed out the importance of a GV and Archives Committee. He offered to be the local Archives Committee Chairman.

After more discussion, Mike S. moved that Board members serve in one office only. A vote will be taken on this next month.

Announcements: Joe C. was appointed to serve out unexpired term for Rudy F. which ends 12-31-92. List of overstocked literature on sale.

CSO Report: Bonnie reported September phone calls totalled 727; 1488 NIGHTCAPS were posted, 10 returned; 85 GMM reminders were mailed on 10-13-92.

Paul P. volunteered to make coffee for the November GMM to be held on 11-15-92. There being no further business, the meeting was closed in the usual manner.

at a way to go! My first week on the job and I get to take a trip to Arizona. However, it was a rich and rewarding experience to be with alcoholics from all over the U.S. and Canada, I had been to Mesa many times before.

I am grateful for being given the opportunity to attend the 7th annual Central Office/Intergroup/AAWS Seminar. About 170 individuals were registered from both nations. The seminar was held at the Hilton Pavilion and this was a working conference which included 30 different workshops held in six sessions. We could only attend one workshop in each session, which created difficult decisions.

There were many old hands at this seminar. I'm referring to individuals who have been serving in their offices for 15, 20, or more years. Most of them seemed leery at first, perhaps, of the enthusiasm generated by the newer attendees. It was apparent that new, open ways of doing business bothered some. In fact, at one of the workshops one of them brought out the fact that she withheld information from the general membership, for their own good, of course. It was also obvious that some offices were not sensitive to nor heeded the input from the groups they serve. An important lesson is that the groups must maintain control of the CSO's at all time. Some of the attendees appeared to be apprehensive of the AAWS group there.

The New York gang really did a good job in trying to pull it all together. There is always some concern on how CSO's fit in with General Service Office. In this instance, the General Manager, AAWS, Inc., stated in no uncertain terms that Central Service/Intergroup Offices are a very important part of Alcoholics Anonymous. It was pointed out that Bill W. proclaimed over and over again as to the importance of Central Service/Intergroup Offices endeavors in carrying the message to suffering alcoholics. Long before the New York GSO beginnings, groups of alcoholics all over the country were putting together systems to answer questions and guide newcomers to meetings.

Overall there was an abundance of information

exchanged. It is really one of the few times that Central Service Office/Intergroup staff have an opportunity to learn how other offices operate. The most important piece of information that I came away with is that all of the offices represented in attendance, except for San Antonio, have Central Office Representatives or Intergroup Representatives that represent the groups to the CSO or Intergroup. Only San Antonio uses GSR's as the groups representative to CSO.

It was recommended that the entire AA structure is better served if each group has a GSR to represent the group to the District and Area. In metropolitan areas where there is a CSO/Intergroup in operation, groups should also have a Central Office or Intergroup Representative (see P-16, The AA Group, page 27, and The AA Service Manual 1991-1992 edition, pages S98 and S99).

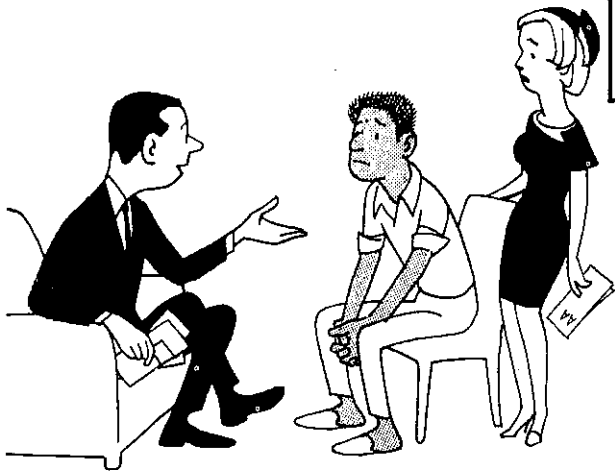

The Eleventh Tradition

Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion; we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio and films.

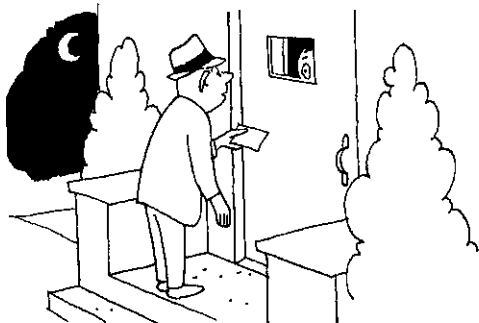


Ours is not a secret society...
we carry the message
anywhere we can—

But we must ever be aware
that self-appointed messiahs
speaking for A.A. through public
media can do us great damage!



Alcoholics who have recovered through our program are themselves the strongest attraction that A.A. has. When people are asked what led them to seek A.A. help, the answer given most often is: "An A.A. member." Their chances would have been slim if all of us had remained completely in hiding. But many of us have chosen to tell our friends, neighbors, employers, co-workers, doctors, or spiritual advisers that we are in A.A.—and when we do so, we are *not* breaking our anonymity in the meaning of this Tradition.



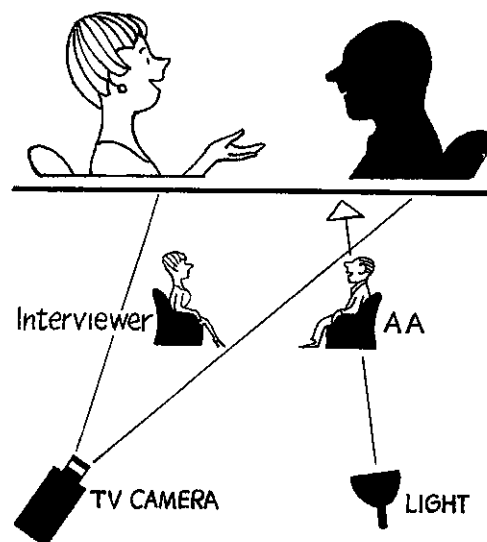
Suppose a sick alcoholic never has the good fortune to meet an A.A. How is such a person going to find us? The search will be difficult if the local group thinks *it* should be anonymous, too. The Tradition is talking about "*personal* anonymity," remember? Alcoholics will not be attracted to A.A. if they don't know that it exists or if they have distorted, unfavorable impressions of its members or its program.

Giving the general public an accurate picture of A.A. is the chief job of our public information committees. In addition, they often carry the message to certain groups—from police officers to personnel directors—whose work includes contact with active alcoholics.

How to Be Anonymous on Television

Information about A.A. is being offered to the public through all the communications media, in print and over the air. On radio, it's easy to guard members' anonymity, of course. But TV (not in wide use when the Traditions were written) is another matter. According to a Conference opinion, members are breaking their anonymity when they are identified on TV as A.A.'s and their faces are shown—whether or not their names are given. And yet this medium, with its vast audiences, cannot be ignored.

Different techniques have been employed to preserve anonymity on TV: masks; screens; back-lighting that shows A.A.'s only as silhouettes; camera angles showing them only from the back. The "shadow" method diagrammed here is simple, relaxed—and appropriate. For we are not selling personalities—we are explaining A.A. Personal anonymity breaks in the public media not only may discourage timid prospects; they may threaten the anonymity-breaker's own sobriety, by violating the spirit of the A.A. program and Traditions. . . .

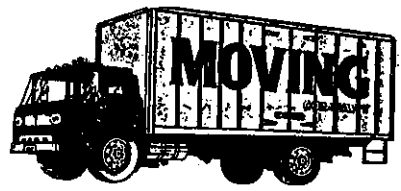
