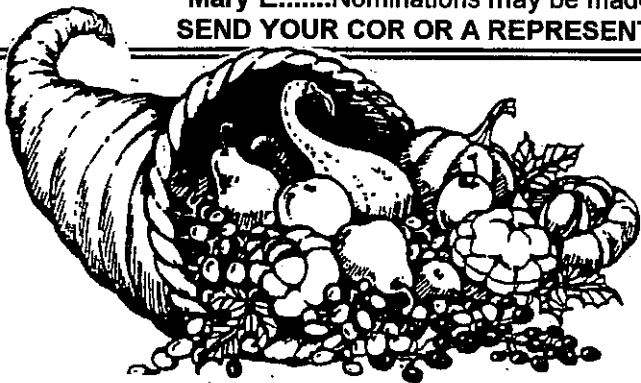
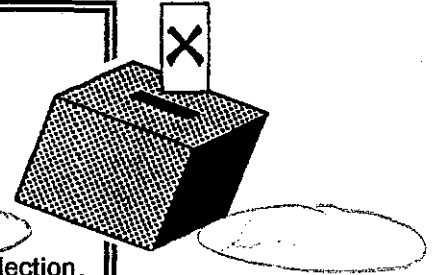

Gratitude: Language of the Heart

Gratitude is a must for us - not only feeling grateful, but showing we are grateful. But how does one ever show true gratitude for A.A.?

As grateful alcoholics learning to live with a subtle, progressive and lethal illness, we have a fighting chance on a day-to-day, hour-by-hour basis to be of some use to ourselves, our families and our communities. We may even achieve magnificent and beneficent things if we chose.

The grateful A.A. member learns bit by bit what life is all about. We learn to live without lies, without conning people and especially, without trying to be somebody we're not. In essence, we unlearn all the "skills" we had developed in order to justify our addictive behavior.

Then too, grateful alcoholics attend several meetings a week, to let others know we care, to welcome the newcomer with friendship and understanding, and to pass on the message of how to live without taking a drink.

Grateful A.A.'s know that we must give away the priceless gift of sobriety if we are to keep it. The experience of the paradox of giving to receive occurs whenever we involve ourselves, at any level, in A.A. service. Some of us may have special talents to offer as expressions of our gratitude, but we can all lovingly give away our sobriety in the simple act of sharing. We can also give our attention to others who would (and sometimes desperately need to) share with us.

And finally, grateful alcoholics thank their Higher Power. Many A.A. members develop a systematic daily spiritual program. They discipline themselves to seek God through prayer and meditation, to achieve conscious contact, and thus achieve an understanding of God. But, if adequate thanks sometimes seem beyond our capabilities, one can simply say, "Thank You for what You have given, for what You have taken away, and for what You have left me."

MINUTES OF THE OCTOBER COR MEETING

10-17-99



Dewey S. opened the meeting with a moment of silence, the Serenity Prayer and read the COR Guidelines. Steve R read the Traditions. The sign-up sheet was passed around. Dewey reminded everyone to come to next months meeting for the election of 4 Board members.

Burt moved to accept the Minutes as printed. They were seconded and approved. It was reported the copy machine at Central Office is not doing well. Steve R suggested Xerox might have a copy machine at a reasonable fee for a non-profit business.

Financial report: Virginia B. gave the report. Group contributions and sales were up from last month. Annual insurance payment was made in September. NightCap printing and mailing expenses was for 2 months.

NightCap Report: Bill H. stated subscriptions were up by 72. He suggested each CORs get 1 person to subscribe and suggest at their Groups that a subscription be given to sponsees.

Phone Duty Report: David W. reported the need for help with the sign-up sheet for volunteer after hours phone duty during October and November. He handed out phone duty instructions. The committee is making updated phone packets with a new 12- Step volunteer list and asked for help getting volunteers for the list. During the up-date, almost 30% of volunteers were lost for a variety of reasons. Board members will be e-mailed a copy of phone duty calendar so phones will not be unmanned. David reminded CORs Kim would be rotating out as the Volunteer Phone Duty Chairman in December and asked for names of people who might be interested in this position. Guidelines were passed out. David expressed the appreciation of the Board and CSO for the great job Kim has done as chairman of this committee.

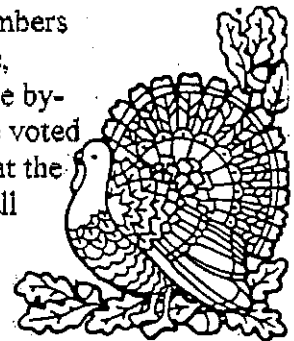

Making A.A. Tick

It began to dawn upon A.A. that group responsibility would have to reach much further than the meeting hall doorstep on Tuesday and Thursday nights only. Otherwise the new man approaching our door might miss his chance, might lose his life.

Slowly, most reluctantly, groups in densely populated areas saw they would have to form associations, open small offices, pay a few full-time secretaries. Terrific outcries went up. To many, this really meant destructive organization, politics, professionalism, big expense, a ruling officialdom, and government. "Believe us," they argued, "a local central office could cost metropolitan A.A. members fifty cents a month apiece. That could turn into a damned head tax—what about our A.A. Tradition of no 'fees or dues'?"

Of course these exaggerated fears never materialized. We have lots of good intergroup associations now, voluntarily supported. The new man is getting a better break. Prompt phone service is planting the seeds of recovery in other thousands. Local meeting directories are issued, public relations attended to, regional gatherings and dinners set up. In short, intergroups do those area chores that no single individual or group could. They unite regions; they make AA tick.

WHAT IF YOUR FIRST CONTACT WITH A.A. WAS AN ANSWERING MACHINE?

Every day an alcoholic who still suffers reaches out to us for the first time by phone. Since the A.A. Hotline requires answering 24 hours a day, and the Central Service Office is only open 9-5 Monday through Friday, that first phone contact is often with an after-hours telephone volunteer, a member of our fellowship, like you. **Phone service work is full-fledged twelve-step work**, our first opportunity to "carry the message". Believe it or not, answering service operators previously took those calls that were often a first link to recovery! We know that only another alcoholic can reach the one who still suffers. Our collective decision to take on this responsibility was made in September of 1997. Ongoing fine-tuning has made phone service work both convenient and rewarding.

The "Telephone Service Committee" was created to serve as the response team during hours that the Central Service Office is closed. A variety of shift times are available (5-10PM week nights, 9AM-1PM weekends, etc.). Six months continuous sobriety is suggested for volunteering, but that can be waived with backup support from a sponsor. The duty-time itself is easy. *This is the only Twelve Step work you can do in your pajamas!!*

The A.A. Hotline number is automatically transferred from C.S.O. to your home phone. You simply answer your phone, "Hello, may I help you?" during your shift. Only the C.S.O. and phone committee will have your home phone number, and you do not have to make Twelve Step calls either on the phone or in person. There is a list of Twelve Step Volunteers that you use to refer someone who needs more attention; the alcoholic who still suffers or the fellow member on the verge of a slip. The amount of involvement on a particular call is up to you. You will find, however, that the majority of your calls are meeting information requests from court-referred, new arrivals, or visitors to our city. Yours will be the first friendly voice they hear!

Instructions, guidelines, and related program reference numbers, such as Alanon, are included in your volunteer packet. Experienced phone committee volunteers are available for advice. You are not in it alone. **There is an ongoing urgent need for Telephone Service Volunteers.** The signup sheets are filled monthly. Without this critical twelve-step work our A.A. Hotline would be answered by impersonal voice mail. What if your first contact with A.A. was an answering machine?

Call the CSO 9am-5pm Monday-Friday @ 828-6235, Telephone Service Committee Chair, Kim C. @ 522-0488, or David W. @ 738-0307, to ask questions or to take a shift on an individual basis. Ask your C.O.R. or G.S.R. if your group is involved. When someone reaches out for help, let the hand they find be yours.

The 12-Step Call List - Be Part of the Solution!

When someone reaches out for help by phone, they call the San Antonio Central Service Office 24Hr Hotline at 828-6235. They will talk to either the C.S.O. or an after-hours phone service volunteer. The alcoholic who still suffers will then be referred to someone on our **Twelve Step Personnel** volunteer list. The list of Twelve-Step volunteers willing to take referral calls from the Central Service Office has been around a long time. These are alcoholics committed to carrying the message. They are the backbone of our first-line response when the alcoholic reaches out for help. *If you wish to be part of the solution, to "give-it-away-to-keep-it", sign up for the Twelve-Step Personnel volunteer list. Here is what it you can expect when you decide to participate:*

- 1) You agree to allow either the Central Service Office or an after-hours Telephone Service volunteer to call you during the hours you specify when a caller needing help is in your area. The call could be any time of day or night. You can, however, limit the times during which you will receive calls.
- 2) You agree to talk to alcoholic callers, drunk or sober, as the situation arises. You are not necessarily required to go out on a 12-Step call. You are helping the phone volunteer *keep the main line clear* by taking over callers like the "alcoholic who still suffers" or the member on the verge of a "slip".
- 3) If you decide to make a 12-Step call in person, follow the suggestion to take another recovering alcoholic with you. It is also advisable to visit only callers of your own gender.
- 4) Your phone number and the entire Twelve Step Personnel volunteer list is confidential, and *will not be given out to any caller*. The caller's number will be passed on to you. You will call back and take it from there. The call can be made anonymously by blocking Caller I.D.
- 5) When you sign up, you can list restrictions to what type of calls you are willing to deal with (referrals are made to the same gender), the times during which you will take calls, or any special skills (such as Spanish speaking). You can add, delete, or modify your entry at any time by notifying the C.S.O. or your C.O.R.

This is the core work suggested in our Twelfth Step, the "intense work with other alcoholics". If you haven't checked your entry on the list in awhile, please do so to be sure all info is current. Be sure you have included your zip code, as the list will also be sorted by zips soon. Thanks for helping to "carry the message" in the San Antonio area!

Tom L., Ramon M., and Sandy W. will be featured speakers. They will have Judges and probation officers there to attempt to explain to them AA's involvement. The CFC Committee holds its meetings on the 1ST Wednesday of the month Club 12 at 102 Thames at 7:00 PM.
