MONTREAL UPDATE

San Antonio's Montreal Trip Committee has decided to pursue only travel arrangements to the 1985 International AA Convention in Montreal. Persons will be free to make their own hotel accommodations.

The committee has received a firm commitment from Eastern and Delta Airlines for a single roundtrip fare of \$379. We would need at least 100 people to make the trip in order for us to qualify for that excursion fare.

There is a possibility of a lower fare, depending on the number of people going and other conditions.

The Central Service Office needs a firm commitment in the form of a \$100 deposit by Feb. 1, 1985 from those planning to travel with the group. The \$100 can be paid in installments, in one lump sum, or by credit card. (Contact CSO for details.)

The balance of the air fare (\$279)

will need to be at the Central Office by May 15, 1985. After Feb. 1, those wishing to make reservations will be on a "space available" basis. Refunds due to cancellation after May 15 will be subject to a cancellation penalty.

The tentative travel schedule is: Leave San Antonio on July 2 or 3 at 8:09 a.m., change planes in Atlanta, and arrive in Montreal at 3:53 p.m. The return trip would be: Leave Montreal on July 7 or 8 at 2:10 p.m., changing planes in Atlanta, and arriving back in San Antonio at 9:39 p.m. The dates are not firm at this time, as the committee felt those who are going would like to make the final decisions.

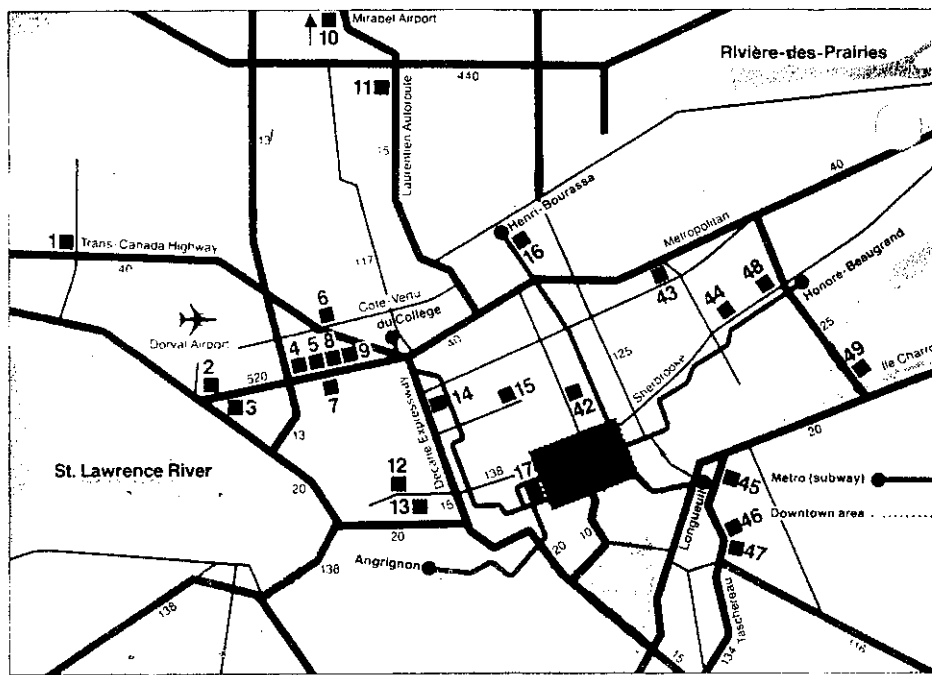

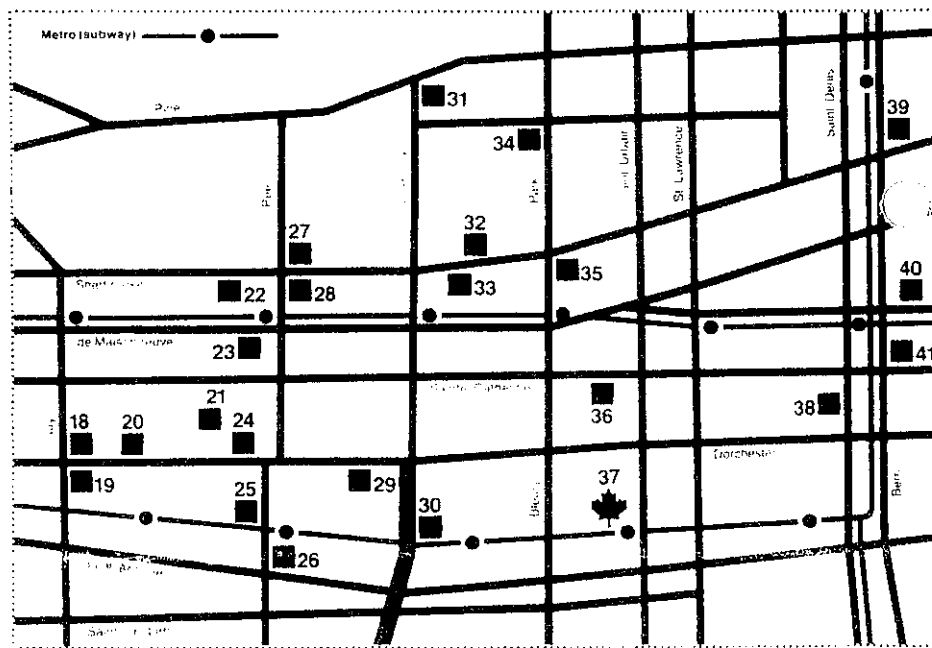
