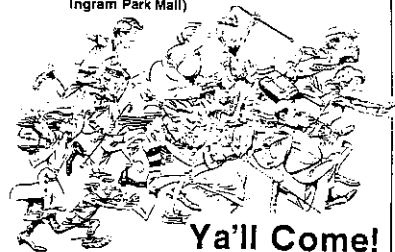

GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING MINUTES

August 20, 1989

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by Wilson P., Chairman, with the Serenity Prayer; followed by Mary Anne K. reading the 12 Traditions. Fifty-seven persons were in attendance, including nine new GSRs. The new "Check-in" sheet was passed around; literature on the table was pointed out and all were encouraged to take copies back to their group. The Statement of Participation was read; the minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. Telephone volunteers were obtained as shown, below.

Standing Committee reports were as follows: Wayne B., Finance, reported on the July Balance Sheet and Income Statement for CSO, explaining all sections and answering questions; commended CSO staff on bookkeeping methods. Hoyt S., Hospitals & Institutions, obtained volunteers to take meetings to the various places for the month of September (see list below). Don N., Public Information, (has replaced Tom B.) gave an indepth report on his committee's activities for the past month; reminded all of the monthly meeting held on the 2nd Wed., of each month at Club 12, 6:30 p.m., and they also need more volunteers. John B., Jail, asked for more volunteers--announced that they will now be taking meetings to three different jail facilities; a new expense item for the jail is coffee; old Grapevines are still needed. Someone announced that more women volunteers are needed also--there are only two women taking the AA meetings and the jail has requested two meetings for the women inmates on Tuesday nights, one right after the other.

OLD BUSINESS: The CSO Board of Trustees have decided not to charge for the NIGHTCAP at least through this year because of the additional group contributions and the individual contributions received. It was announced that GSRs will receive International Conference registration information in September, from New York. All DCM's and GSRs will hold a re-districting meeting immediately following this meeting.

NEW BUSINESS: Announced that new GSRs should be elected in September so they can attend the Southwest Texas Area Conference in October.

CSO REPORT: 1408 issues of the August NIGHTCAP were mailed with 32 being returned because of wrong address. Cards were sent to GSRs reminding them of the General Membership Meeting. 1360 telephone calls were received in July; CSO is changing to a different answering service as of August 28.

DCM REPORTS: 1-A: Absent; 1-B: Absent; 1-C: Jean B. reported on her district's meeting held prior to this meeting. 1-D: Absent; 1-E: Mary Anne reported a district meeting will be held at St. Vincent de Paul's on September 22; 1-F: Yolanda F. reported they had elected a secretary, treasurer, and are working on district procedures; will have a workshop at the Unity Club on October 7 at 3 p.m.

CHARGING FOR NIGHTCAP

Last spring the Central Service Office Board of Trustees reviewed the CSO's ability to continue free distribution of the NIGHTCAP. (See the April 1989 NIGHTCAP.)

It was concluded that declining contributions from local AA groups was the main factor which caused the issue to be called into question. With significantly improved group and individual contributions, we knew the problem would solve itself.

Our plea for increased monetary support from the groups did not go unanswered. Contributions improved substantially in June and July. Hopefully, this new level of support will be sustained.

Based on your generosity, the Board of Trustees has dropped the issue for this year. A further review of the situation will be made in early 1990.

JEWELS FROM THE JAIL

Literature carries the message 24 hours a day. The ladies at the jail have spoken to me of the feeling they sometimes have, at 2 or 3 a.m., when they have felt completely abandoned by family, friends, and even God. Then, they remembered a pamphlet, pulled it out to read, and were alone no more! So, we want to thank all of those who contribute to the jail fund. Many of us in AA are "double winners," and we are also grateful to have an Al-Anon carry her program's message along with us.

One of the promises in the Big Book is "The feeling of uselessness and self-pity will disappear." This is especially true in carrying the message to those who cannot come to meetings. There are approximately 70 female inmates who participate in AA meetings. These are divided into two groups of 30 to 35 women. Each group was meeting every other week. On Tuesday, July 25, 1989, the Assistant Director was there and he requested that we hold two meetings that night, one for each group. We found out last week that the results were so good, that we are now holding back-to-back meetings EVERY Tuesday night.

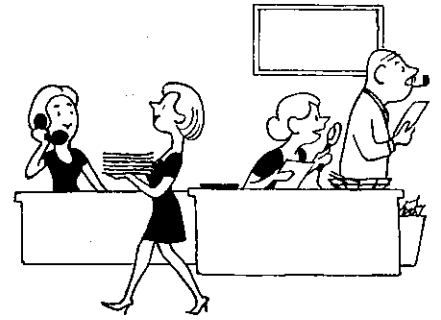

The Ninth Tradition

*A.A., as such, ought never be organized;
but we may create service boards or
committees directly responsible to those
they serve.*



The words "Let's keep it simple" were the last Bill W. heard from his fellow founder of A.A., shortly before Dr. Bob's death in 1950. Aware that "it" meant our *recovery* program, Bill later wrote, "We need to distinguish sharply between spiritual simplicity and functional simplicity. . . . When we get into questions of action by groups, by areas, and by A.A. as a whole, we find that we must to some extent *organize* to carry the message—or else face chaos. And chaos is not simplicity."

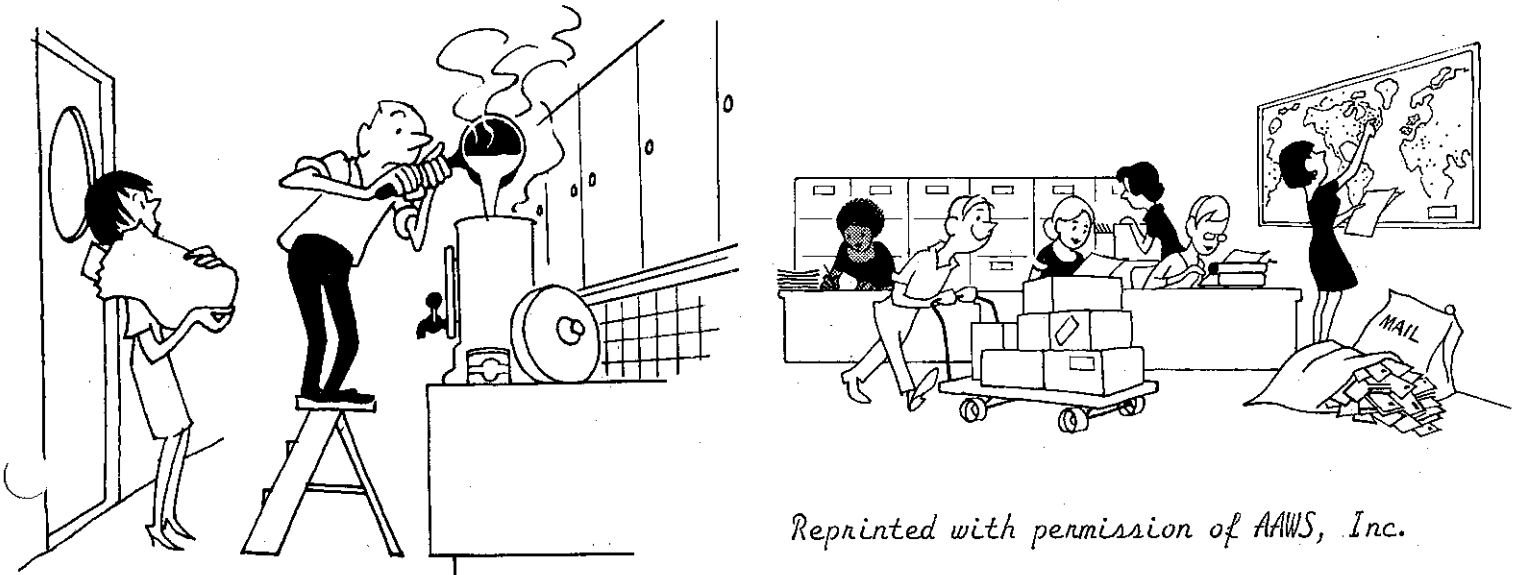
When Tradition Nine speaks of "A.A. as such," it goes to the heart of the A.A. experience, to the "spiritual simplicity" of one alcoholic's saying, silently perhaps, "Help!" and another alcoholic's answering, "I know how you feel. We're here to help you." Such a relationship couldn't be organized. Or could it?

A nonmember familiar with modern business procedures might examine the A.A. practice of sponsorship and see it as a haphazard operation. How about computerizing it? Then an A.A. behind an intergroup desk might say, "So you want help? First, you need the right sponsor. We have personality profiles of all our sponsors fed into our computer. We'll match you up to the best one for you if you'll just fill out this questionnaire. . . . Where are you going? Come back!" *That* would be an attempt to organize "A.A. as such." (Please—nobody get any ideas!)

But in "action by groups," we find that we do need some degree of organization. If everybody thinks somebody else is going to make the coffee, what's the result? No coffee! To avoid such a disaster, one or more members agree to be responsible for preparing meeting refreshments. All the way from coffee-brewers to trustees on the General Service Board, those who take part in A.A. service work are assuming responsibility—not taking on authority. (Here, Traditions Two and Nine interlock.) Group officers are responsible to the members of the group; intergroup committees, to the groups in one locality; institutions committees, to A.A. groups in treatment facilities and correctional facilities; area committees, to all groups in their areas; Conference delegates and committees, to all groups in the U.S. and Canada; the General Service Office and Board and the board's committees, to all groups and members everywhere.

In an average business corporation, the board has final power to determine company plans and policy. Our board of trustees serves in a custodial capacity; trustees vote at the Conference—but as individuals, with one vote apiece. In industry, branch offices jump when the home office speaks. Our G.S.O. is just a clearinghouse of A.A. information, offering *suggestions* based on experiences reported to it by groups.

And yet, with so small a degree of organization, A.A. miraculously does work! One reason may be that Tradition Five applies to each A.A. committee and board as directly as it does to each A.A. group. By cleaving to this "one primary purpose" in all its activities, the Fellowship retains "spiritual simplicity." To diffuse that purpose, to embroil A.A. in issues apart from its true concern, would create dangerous complications. . . .

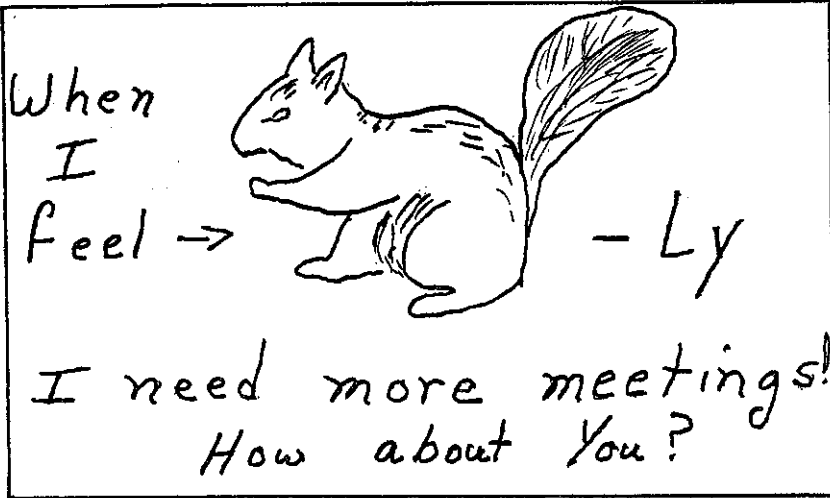
We also have book covers with the Service Symbol or Serenity Prayer on the front.

Come in and browse--the coffee pot is always on and we usually have cookies or cake, thanks to our faithful and great volunteers!

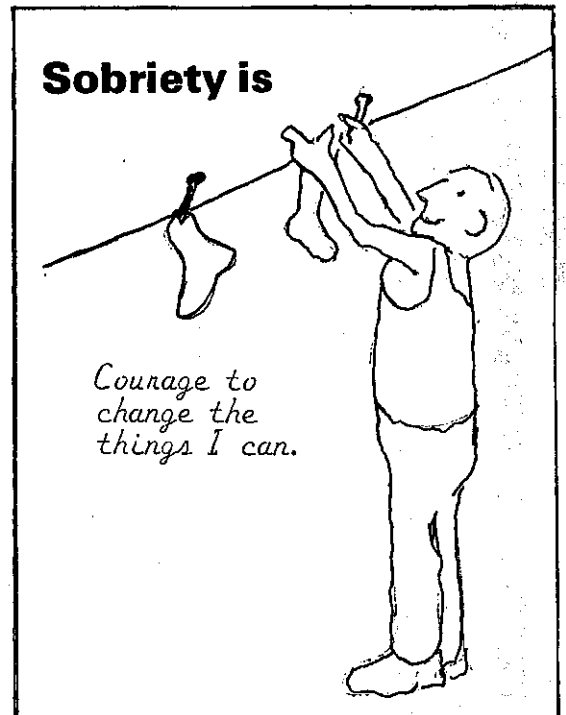
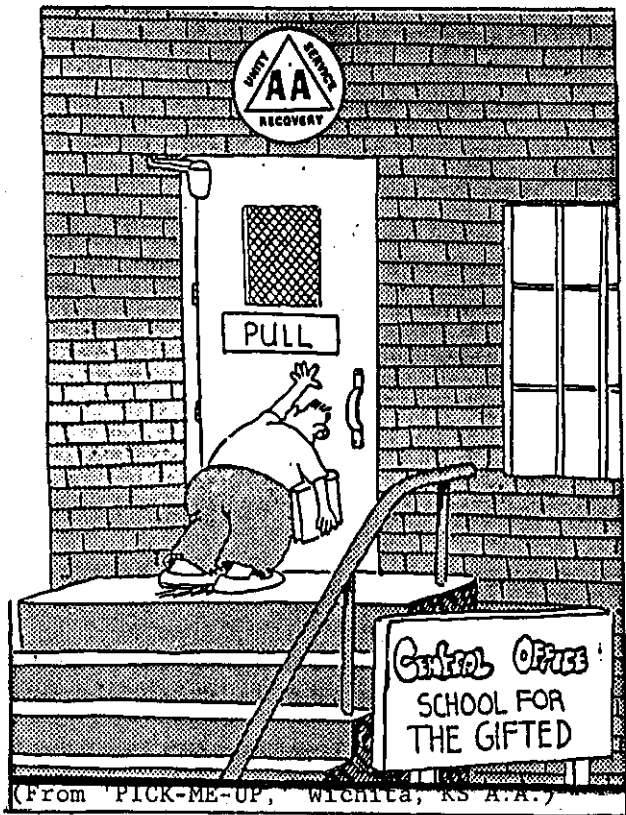
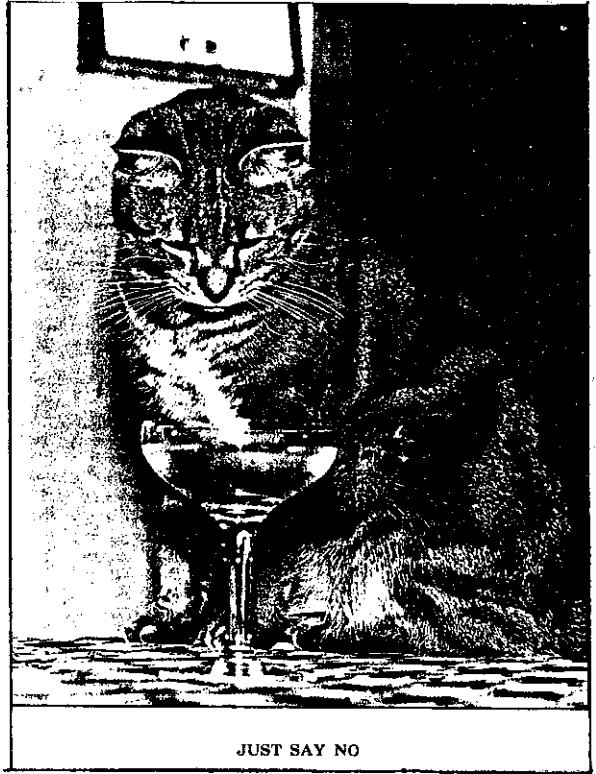
