GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING MINUTES
AUGUST 19, 1990

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by Bob T., Chairman, with a moment of silence followed by the Serenity Prayer. The Twelve Traditions were read by Tom. There were 62 persons present including three new GSR's. After the "Statement of Participation" was read, the minutes of the previous meeting were accepted as printed in the August issue of THE NIGHTCAP. Bob announced that due to Doug G.'s resignation from the CSO Board of Trustees, he will need to be replaced by election. Tom McM., Chairman of the Nominating Committee, explained the qualifications required to serve as a Trustee and announced one nominee--Larry Y. He told the group that the election will be held at the next meeting and at that time, nominations will be accepted from the floor.

The Financial Report was presented by Al D., who gave a thorough and concise report. Volunteers for After-Hours Phone Duty were obtained (see list below). H&I Committee Chairman, Eileen, requested that persons wanting to volunteer their group for various H&I's to call her direct; she gave her telephone number. This was for volunteering prior to the regular GMM. (See list below for September volunteers.) Don N., PI Committee Chairman, reported that they are getting requests from high schools now and will need more volunteers. The Tuesday night Medical Center Hospital psychiatric ward meetings are still going. Med Ctr now wants a 2-hour meeting once a month for staff training in recognizing alcoholism. Fred D. explained the Brady Green Clinic PI program and asked for volunteers to be interviewed by third-year medical students. These are held on Wednesday afternoons. Anyone interested, call CSO and leave your name and phone number. John B., Jail Committee Chairman, thanked everyone for their old Grapevines and explained their use. He needs male volunteers who have at least 1 year of sobriety and no felonies. Asked that they call CSO and leave name and phone number.

There was no old business.

New Business--Mary O., Assistant Manager, CSO, explained the cost and need for the after-hour folders to be returned (see article elsewhere in this issue).

CSO Report: 1484 copies of THE NIGHTCAP were mailed for August; 29 returned. 1,213 telephone calls received during July. Signed a new 3-year lease with rent reduced from \$741 per month to \$570; landlord will repaint, change ceiling tiles, clean drapery, and install light in stockroom area.

DCM Report: Richard O., 1-B, reported that 1-D will have a workshop on Sponsorship on August 25 and that 1-A had a picnic on this date; also the next DCM meeting will be held on Saturday, September 8, 10 a.m.

Announcements: 1. CSO will be closed on Labor Day, Monday, 9-3-90. 2. Colonies No. Group GSR announced a new meeting that begins at 11:59 p.m. on Wednesdays, 10226 Ironside. Other 10 p.m. meetings were announced. 3. Raul M., Spanish Intergroup Liaison, announced that their July meeting had 70% representation; now have an alternate DCM for 1-F. July 25th the PI Committee recorded a tape at KCOR; new Spanish Intergroup procedures will be forthcoming. He explained that Texas is divided into two zones for Spanish Speaking AA's--north and south. Yolanda F. is the delegate for the South Zone. He presented a new meeting directory. 4. Mac McL. announced that a PI/CPC Workshop will be held on Saturday, 15 September from 1 to 4 p.m. at the First Christian Church in Devine.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 7:15 p.m. with the Lord's Prayer

TRASHING THE TRASH

When I arrived here, I was of no use to anyone, myself included. For me, AA has been like a fix-up program for garbage cans. I was so full of smelly trash (self-pity, hopelessness, disgust, hatred, guilt, etc.) that no thoughts of happiness or freedom could even fit. I wore self-disgust as dents and dirt on the outside by having no respect for my appearance and cleanliness. My skin was so thin till I knew all my trash and sins were visible and oh so painful whenever anyone came close.

By the Grace of God (whom I only feared before), I was given the chance to learn the AA way of life. It was at the meetings where the tools to clean up the visible and clear out the trash were given me. As you people loved me, garbage and all, I came to believe this Higher Power may want me too. With this new-found sense of worthiness, I began to clean the outside with soap and water and try to look presentable; my complexion began to lose the grey look of depression and to shine with the glow of hope.

Once the fog began to clear, the message of living the Steps and reading the Big Book began to replace the trash inside with the desirable feelings of love and understanding and a willingness to learn how to get what you had that I wanted. I have learned from you how you worked through your bouts of depression and self-centeredness, and that my growth depends upon keeping the trash out in the open--not buried inside.

Five years has changed my dented and my scratched, filthy, smelly trash can full of garbage into a mostly clean and neat person full of love and filled with the desire to help others find their own Higher Power and share the tools you have given me.

IS THERE FUN AFTER SOBRIETY?

There certainly has been for this recovering alcoholic. More fun and excitement than I could ever imagine.

My husband, Tom, and I were fortunate enough to have been passengers on a sober cruise to Alaska, following the International Convention in Seattle this past July.

Our ship, the Regent Sea, had its very first experience with servicing nearly 400 members of Alcoholics Anonymous, including some of our families. The crew was not totally prepared for us. However, they soon became aware of our needs and were quite accommodating.

Naturally, the first order of business was to keep those huge coffee pots, throughout the ship, going all day long. There were frowns of disbelief in the beginning but awareness soon set in--yes, we really do drink that much coffee!

The food was delicious and constant. As a matter of fact, more of me returned to San Antonio than left! Our chef learned to cook our food without alcohol and was pleasantly surprised to discover it was still palatable. Of course, our favorite of the food service specialists was the baker. He stayed up to his elbows in sugar and chocolate the whole 7 days.

Our cruise director, Freddie, felt overly sensitive to us in the beginning, not knowing what to expect. During one of his comedy acts he was asked to tell some drunk jokes. Freddie's comment, "You're kidding, I've been avoiding them all week." He was quite astonished to find us a most receptive audience.

Were there AA meetings? With nearly 400 sensitive, self-centered people in recovery, what else? Of course, there were meetings! Many meetings were also held for our family members. We kept the daily newsletter busy publishing all of our meeting schedules and the intercom continuously voiced reminders for us. AA had a main meeting scheduled each day just before dinner in the main lounge. The lounge was quite comfortable and convenient with space for our coffee and bartenders and waitresses to serve our cokes.

We had some speaker meetings and some discussion (California call-up) meetings. One of our speakers was Clancy I. We became close to many people not only from around the country, but from around the world. It was our common problem that brought us together, but it is our common solution that

keeps us together. It is a bond that holds true no matter where we gather.

Tom and I attended a meeting while we were docked in Juneau. We called the AA help-line and were picked up and taken to a meeting in the valley. Their meetings were just like ours, different faces, but the same spirit.

We docked at four Alaskan ports and took various tours around the countryside. I must tell you that I have seen some of this country before and never saw the beauty I was privileged to see through these new eyes Alcoholics Anonymous has given me. I felt engulfed by breathtaking sights everywhere!

After 7 glorious days, our trip came to an end with many beginnings of new friendships. Freddie's parting comment to us-- "The crew's not going to know what to do next week without a meeting. We'll have to have a meeting about not having a meeting."

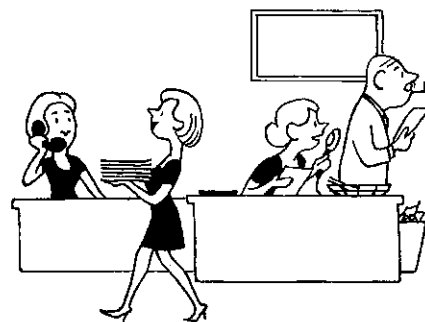

The Ninth Tradition

*A.A., as such, ought never be organized;
but we may create service boards or
committees directly responsible to those
they serve.*



The words "Let's keep it simple" were the last Bill W. heard from his fellow founder of A.A., shortly before Dr. Bob's death in 1950. Aware that "it" meant our *recovery* program, Bill later wrote, "We need to distinguish sharply between spiritual simplicity and functional simplicity. . . . When we get into questions of action by groups, by areas, and by A.A. as a whole, we find that we must to some extent *organize* to carry the message—or else face chaos. And chaos is not simplicity."

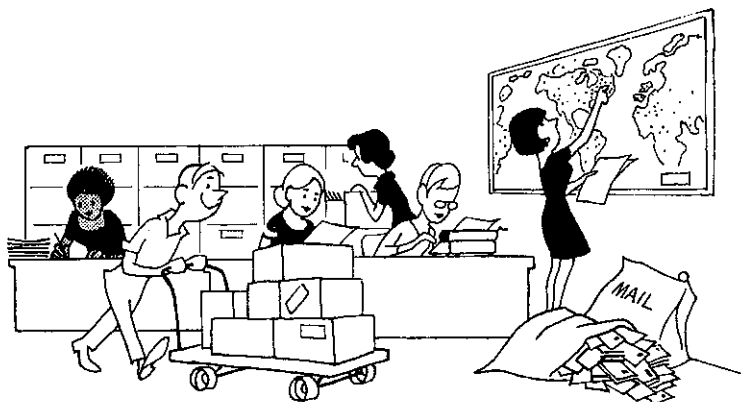
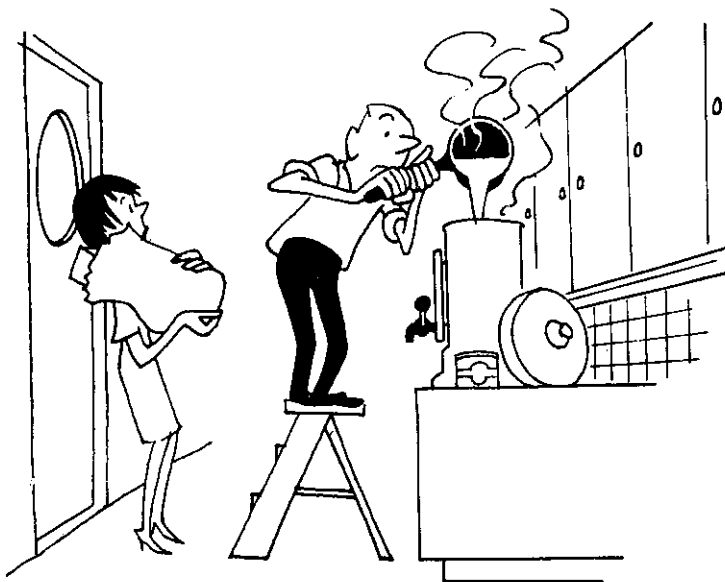
When Tradition Nine speaks of "A.A. as such," it goes to the heart of the A.A. experience, to the "spiritual simplicity" of one alcoholic's saying, silently perhaps, "Help!" and another alcoholic's answering, "I know how you feel. We're here to help you." Such a relationship couldn't be organized. Or could it?

A nonmember familiar with modern business procedures might examine the A.A. practice of sponsorship and see it as a haphazard operation. How about computerizing it? Then an A.A. behind an intergroup desk might say, "So you want help? First, you need the right sponsor. We have personality profiles of all our sponsors fed into our computer. We'll match you up to the best one for you if you'll just fill out this questionnaire. . . . Where are you going? Come back!" *That* would be an attempt to organize "A.A. as such." (Please—nobody get any ideas!)

But in "action by groups," we find that we do need some degree of organization. If everybody thinks somebody else is going to make the coffee, what's the result? No coffee! To avoid such a disaster, one or more members agree to be responsible for preparing meeting refreshments. All the way from coffee-brewers to trustees on the General Service Board, those who take part in A.A. service work are assuming responsibility—not taking on authority. (Here, Traditions Two and Nine interlock.) Group officers are responsible to the members of the group; intergroup committees, to the groups in one locality; institutions committees, to A.A. groups in treatment facilities and correctional facilities; area committees, to all groups in their areas; Conference delegates and committees, to all groups in the U.S. and Canada; the General Service Office and Board and the board's committees, to all groups and members everywhere.

In an average business corporation, the board has final power to determine company plans and policy. Our board of trustees serves in a custodial capacity; trustees vote at the Conference—but as individuals, with one vote apiece. In industry, branch offices jump when the home office speaks. Our G.S.O. is just a clearinghouse of A.A. information, offering *suggestions* based on experiences reported to it by groups.

And yet, with so small a degree of organization, A.A. miraculously does work! One reason may be that Tradition Five applies to each A.A. committee and board as directly as it does to each A.A. group. By cleaving to this "one primary purpose" in all its activities, the Fellowship retains "spiritual simplicity." To diffuse that purpose, to embroil A.A. in issues apart from its true concern, would create dangerous complications. . . .
